

**TREMENDOUS GAIN IN TAX RETURNS FOR YEAR 1913**  
Official Statement Shows an Increase of \$17,456,490 for the Year 1913 Over Last Year.  
**INCREASE HIGHEST IN HISTORY OF THE CITY**

**Total Assessments Aggregate \$172,239,477, Against \$154,782,987 for the Year 1912.**

An official statement of 1913 tax returns, given out yesterday for the first time, show an increase of \$17,456,490 in returns this year over 1912. The increase is the largest in the history of Atlanta, and exceeds by approximately \$10,000,000 the increase anticipated in the final revision of the city budget. The increase falls only \$200 below the estimate made by the constitution a little less than three weeks ago, when the returns were not in. Chief Clerk George Boardman, of the tax department, compiled the figures during the early part of the week, and on Friday the finished copies of his report to Mayor Woodward, Comptroller Goldsmith and W. Humphreys, chairman of the finance committee.

The total assessments aggregate \$172,239,477, as against \$154,782,987, of 1912. Of this amount, real estate is represented by \$121,212,129, against \$107,957,542 of 1912, showing a gain of \$13,254,587 for the year. In the personal column is shown \$51,027,348 for 1913, against \$46,825,445 in 1912, an increase of \$4,201,903.

**Big Increases Shown.** Increases are shown in the street, sanitary and aggregate tax, street taxes for 1913 amounted to \$1,542, against \$1,000, an increase of \$542. The sanitary tax for 1913 amounts to \$1,250,500, against \$1,000,000, an increase of \$250,500. The aggregate tax for 1913 amounts to \$1,912,800, against \$1,700,000, an increase of \$212,800. These figures show that 226 more paid the sanitary tax last year than the year before.

Through the efforts of Chief Clerk Boardman, the city has received approximately \$2,000 in interest on the gain of \$8,000 in interest alone will defray the expenses of the tax office. The increase in assessments on private property is \$1,142,000, against \$900 for 1912, against \$142,000,233 for 1912. Atlanta corporations' real estate amounts to \$4,266,461 in 1912, against \$4,187,012 in 1912. Personal property is \$15,310,355 in 1913, against \$12,212,129 in 1912, showing a gain of \$3,098,226. The assessments for 1913 will be \$15,489,712 in 1912. Therefore, Atlanta's aggregate tax for 1913 will be \$172,239,477, against \$154,782,987 in 1912, an increase of \$17,456,490.

The above does not include \$20,000 on the assessment of \$1,500,000 returned against the property of the city, according to the Atlanta Terminal company. No data is included approximately \$100,000 against various railway companies, although it falls within the limits of the city in the last.

**\$2,000,000 on Corporations.** It has been estimated that the increase on public utility returns for 1913 will be approximately \$2,000,000. The assessments are made by Comptroller General Wright. The assessments for 1912 were \$12,022,129, and when the final addition of the assessments are made through the city treasurer, it is expected to exceed \$13,000,000. In Atlanta has made a record in 1913. The city's revenue from the Atlanta Railway and Banking company returned \$2,482,000. Georgia Railway and Banking company returned \$1,117,000 for these divisions operating in Atlanta. The Southern Bell Telephone company returns \$1,444,000, and the Atlanta Telephone company \$772,000. The Central of Georgia Transmission company, a new company, returned \$1,000,000. The Georgia Terminal company returned \$100,000.

# Bird Preservation Means Money Preservation in America

“The Romance and Practicality of Bird Preservation in America” is here told by James Henry Rice, Jr. Mr. Rice is field secretary of the American Audubon society. He has established headquarters in Atlanta, from which will be directed the propaganda for bird preservation for the entire south.)

By James Henry Rice, Jr.  
The Audubon society had its origin in the necessity of preserving the vanishing resources of the continent. Probably the first organization was organized in Massachusetts. A number of patriotic citizens came together for the purpose of entailing the aid of the country in bird and game preservation.

Officially, however, the National Association of Audubon societies was organized in 1895 and incorporated in 1892. Its name was adopted from John James Audubon, born on the north shore of Lake Erie, in 1785, and died in New York city, 1835.

Although not a pioneer in American ornithology, Audubon did more to arouse interest in North American birds and animals than any other, and this was made possible by his wonderful pictures of bird life. As time went on in ornithology, his pictures have never been equalled. In his work he was especially the birds of North America. These volumes were of such immense size as to permit life-size representations of even the largest birds, such as the bald eagle, the osprey, the heron and similar birds. The original set sold for \$100 and cost the artist ten years of his life.

It is due to Audubon that we know what North America contained in prehistoric times. His work has been the study of birds, and it followed that the main bird protection in the world should be named for him.

William Dutcher, the man who took charge of the great work of the Audubon society, was a New York city lawyer. Years ago he was a student with consumptive tuberculosis. He was a public man and each year got something done to help the sick.

Just how he was afflicted is not an agreed problem. Under the federal system it was not possible to undergo any adjustment, mainly for the fact that a few men absorbed the privileges and sought to hold them with the hands.

Various forms of licensing hunters had been tried without success, until the passage of a law known as the “game law.” It works like magic. With us the resources of a continent are at stake and the method and means of the continent must be called on to save them. Surely no more patriotic duty can be undertaken than that of insuring the ravages of our own generations and of our own.

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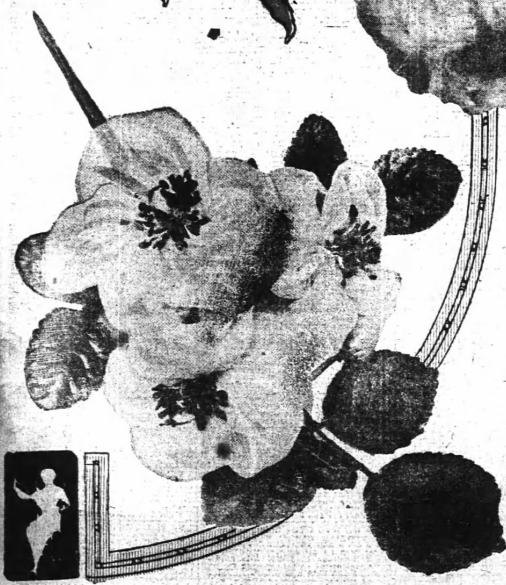
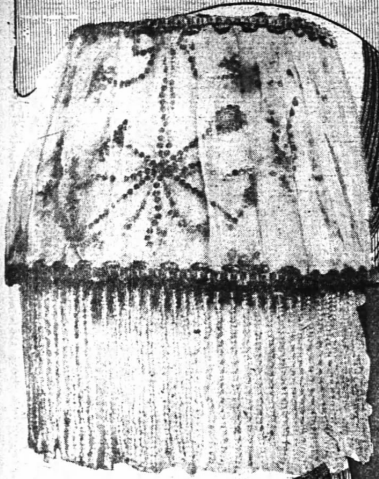
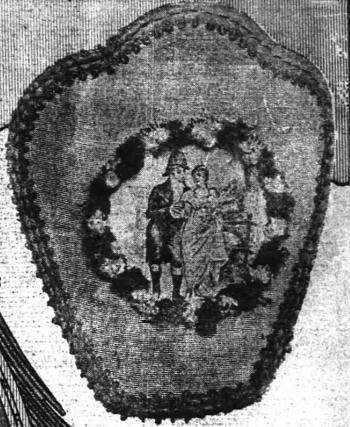
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# GIFTS that can be EASILY MADE



1. Candle shade made on a six-inch wire frame in the Empire style. The foundation is of white silk with pink rose garlands. Either brocade or may be done in water color. The shade is then veiled with pink mousseline de soie, finished with crystal or pink bead fringe; see art braid or French garlands at top and bottom of the shade.
2. Keepsie doll for holding hair pins. The dress and cap are crocheted in plain scallop stitch. Make the dress with a double skirt and finish with scallop edge.
3. The hair pins are to be stuck through the meshes of the skirt. The tiny snail holds pins.
4. The Mottor is of heavy water color mottoring. The design may be applied or painted. Blotting pads to correspond in color with the designs, are used.
5. A spray for the hair or corsage. The roses are of mousseline which is a departure from the silk and satin flower work.
6. Cut the material into three-inch squares, fold cornerwise and form into petals, using five petals to a rose; attach the petals to a prepared rose centre and finish the stems with silk ribbon or tissue paper; add leaves and buds according to size of roses.
7. The candle screen is made on a wire foundation. This silk or parchment paper is used for the back. Use heavy silk in desired color for the top, make it perfectly plain, cut out the centre, and add one of the latter French prints obtainable in Art Shows. Finish with art braid or garlands around edge of the screen and around the picture.
8. The coffee pot stand is of perforated brass in conventional design, the rim being of wood. The brass can be obtained stamped for perforating in combination with the wood, or by the sheet metal worker.

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MISS WOOTEN ASKS BRANCH LIBRARIES

Traffic Around the Main Library Will Soon Keep Children Away—Would Have Additional Branches.

The necessity for the establishment of branch libraries in various parts of the city as a means of reaching the people of Atlanta, as pointed out by Miss Katherine H. Wooten, Carnegie librarian, in the annual report sent to Mayor Woodward yesterday.

It is pointed out that traffic around the main library is becoming so great that it will be only a matter of a few years until small children will hardly be permitted to come alone to the library. Miss Wooten suggests the establishment of branches in stores in order to reach readers.

The report shows an increase in the volume of work in every department. At the close of the year the library will contain \$289 volumes, and will have a circulation of books of 211,987. During the year 17,896 persons visited the reference room and used the books.

Last year the library received an appropriation of \$24,469 from the city of which \$10,673.38 was spent for salaries and \$1,251 for books. There was turned back into the city treasury for the money. It is expected that the money will be used for the purchase of new books.

The reports set forth that there are persons who never used the library before took out membership. The library board and the board of health are cooperating to limit the spread of contagious diseases through the circulation of books. It is found that a book has been exposed to contagion the librarian orders the book destroyed.

During the year deposit stations were opened at the Westside apartment house of the Fulton Base and Cottage Mills, the Atlanta Public Library, the Atlanta Paper company and several other prominent places. 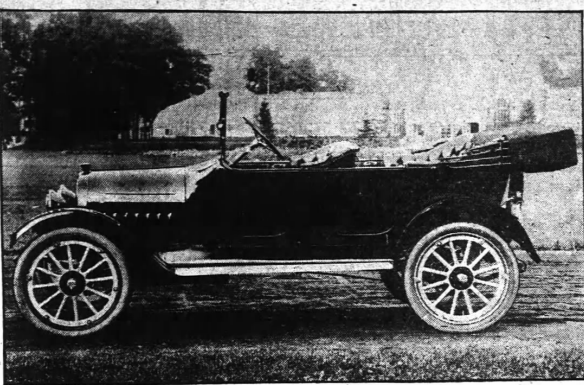
