Date of Hearings. The committee will sit at the custom house in New York on January 2 and 3; in Boston on January 7 and 8; and return to New York for additional sessions January 11 and 12. The committee will sit in Chicago January 13, 15 and 16; in St. Louis January 22, 23 and 24; in New York January 28. Hearings for the other cities will be held between January 28 and March 1. Whenever possible, the hearings will be held in government buildings.

The committee desires to be informed particularly upon the following points, which are considered important factors in determining the location of the proposed districts and the location of the federal reserve banks: 1. Geographical convenience, which involves transportation facilities, and rapid and easy communication with all parts of the district. 2. Industrial and commercial development, and needs of such sections. 3. General movement of commodities and of business transactions within the district and the transfer of funds and changes of credit existing therefrom. 4. The established custom and trade of business as conducted by the present system of bank reserves and checking accounts. 5. The needs of the district and whether the proposed location for the reserve banks, every other thing being equal, will promote the convenience and normal movements of trade and business.

Political Not to Figure. Political considerations will not be permitted to influence the committee in its deliberations. 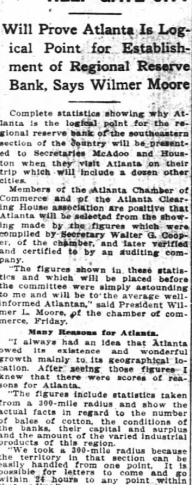

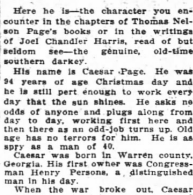
