I am going to look for my dear wife, but I love and all come to live with me. I am going back for her and her two children and live with me, and if she refuses, will tell explain all, as she has given my love for another."

Witness smiles at verdict. The wife of the defendant, who together with her husband, accompanied her to the trial, smiled at the verdict and sentence as the condemned man was led to the sheriff. The aged mother of Crubb wept at her present sentence was pronounced.

Only two witnesses, Miss Mary Hancock and ordinary physician, were produced by the state, were examined.
