OWNERS OF AUTOS TO FIGHT ADDITIONAL TAX

Will Fight the Bill. That the Atlanta auto dealers are squarely in the fight against the bill to grade the tax on automobiles was made plain by President Haden's address in opposition. He showed figures to prove that the bill would cost the state of Georgia tax on every other class of property.

"I want to go on record now as being opposed to placing a greater tax on automobiles," said President Haden. "I want to further go on record as opposing the bill to grade the tax on automobiles."

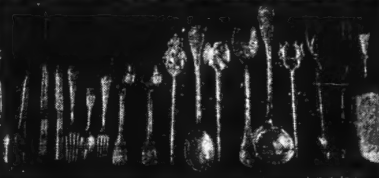

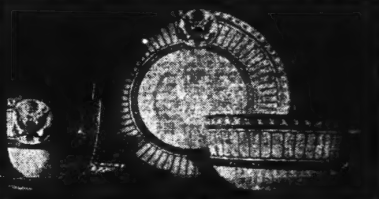

Decisive Victory Won in Supreme Court by Millers and Food Manufacturers.

Washington, February 24.—Millers and food manufacturers throughout the country won a decisive victory over the government today when the supreme court ruled that federal inspectors on the pure food law could not condemn a product unless they proved that the flour contained enough poison to make the flour injurious to health.

Officials of the department of agriculture have contended that the addition of any quantity of poisonous ingredients was in violation of the law.

They concentrated their efforts to have this principle established in the bleached flour case, because the decision would be applicable to every other proceeding involving an article of food claimed to contain an added poisonous or deleterious ingredient.

"Alone Proceed" Issued. The case decided today originated in a suit to compel the government to stop the sale of flour bleached by the Lehigh Valley Mills company.

They claimed in bleaching their flour that it contained a poisonous ingredient, and that the quantity of the poison was so small that it could not be detected by the ordinary consumer.

In announcing the decision of the court, the chief justice said that the government only complained that it was not necessary to prove that the flour was actually injurious to health.
