

GOVERNOR STATION REQUESTS JUDGE TO CHANGE VENUE

Three Negroes, Accused of Murder of Mrs. Seth Irby, Will Not Be Taken Back to Louisville Today.

SHERIFF SMITH ASKED FOR 300 STATE TROOPS

Governor Invokes Statute of 1911 in Order to Avert Possible Mob Violence and to Save State Great Expense.

There will be a change of venue in the case of the three Jefferson county negroes, confined in the Tower here, for the murder of Mrs. Seth Irby. That was the conclusion reached yesterday by Judge Ben Franklin, of the Jefferson superior court, after the sheriff had called on the governor for aid, and after a number of telegrams had passed between the governor and the judge.

Under these circumstances, the governor, unwilling to run the risk of bloodshed, and unwilling to expose the state to the possibility of mob violence, urged upon the judge that he should give the men a change of venue just as soon as practicable. Under the act of 1911, the judge really has no discretion in granting changes of venue, it being made mandatory on him to do so in every case in which mob violence is apprehended.

After giving due consideration to the case, the judge wired the governor that he would order a change of venue as soon as an indictment had been returned in which county they should be tried. It is not unlikely that Judge Rawling will order a special term of court in which to try the case, and that the trial will be held in the county in which the crime was committed.

When interrogated on the case last night, the governor issued the following statement: "The case is important in politics, but it is not a political case. It is a case of murder, and it should be tried in a court of law, and not in a mob."
