**Pasadena Greatly Alarmed.**  
The passenger service on the coast has been the cause of Captain Hanson and his adding faith in his ship reassured them time and time again. The steamer made water rapidly and the cargo began to rise. Hanson thought out of the day and the night that followed the officers examined the sea for passing craft and the operator worked incessantly to remove his wireless outfit. Mysterious steamer "Svea" was seen through the first cry for help were searching for the distressed craft. ### FOR TRUST LAWS WILSON DRAWS GENERAL LINES

**President Holds Conference With Democratic Leaders in Congress on Subject of Anti-Trust Reform.**

**VIEWS OF PRESIDENT HEARTILY APPROVED**

**"Immunity Baths" Interlocking Directorates and "Twilight Zone" to Be Barred—For Trade Board.**

Washington, January 14.—President Wilson took to his confidence today on the subject of anti-trust reform, democratic members of the senate committee on interstate commerce and the house committee on judiciary and committee on antitrust reform, which will be in charge of anti-trust legislation, the president expressed hearty approval of the program and pointed out the general lines along which he believes trust legislation should be framed.

**Wilson Outlines Legislation.**  
From the conference the following program was announced:  
1. Prohibition of interlocking directorates in banks, trust companies and industrial corporations.  
2. Prohibition of uncertainty as to what constitutes a restraint of trade under the Sherman law, through special exemption and monopoly and trusts, so that there can be no "reasonable" restraint of trade.  
3. Removal of all possibility of "immunity baths" for offending corporations or individuals.  
4. Establishment of an interstate trade commission which would take over the bureau of corporations, serve as an auxiliary to the courts and department of justice and act as a bureau of information to which the business world would direct inquiries, but which would have no power of granting immunity or of regulation.

One feature of the program is that it should be an individual responsibility and personal guilt.

The president today did most of the talking, with occasional interruption from his visitors. Details were left to the committee themselves to work out in consultation with the president. In his history responding to more than thirty queries, the president said that the program was a result of his long study of the problem, and that he had approached in a friendly, rather than a hostile, manner the business world, and expressed a hope for a common agreement among leaders in congress who have been active in pressing anti-trust measures.

Although not all members of the house would not discuss the details of the message, there was a general expression of approval of its contents.

"We just had a discussion of the general subject with the president," said Chairman Clayton, of the house committee. "We read a message and we entered into a discussion afterward. We did not finish it, and will have other conferences soon.

Asked if the house subcommittee outlined to the president some of its bills, Mr. Clayton said: "We did not come to give the president our ideas, but to get his."

**In Accord With President.**  
Mr. Clayton and committee members said they were in hearty accord with the president's views.

Earlier in the day similar expressions came from Chairman Newlands and members of the senate commerce committee. Some of them said the president's ideas struck at the heart of existing evils, using legislation that would be destructive, but tend rather to uphold business, and would be effective.

The president indicated his desire that the committee should be prompt, though carefully, in its consideration of the bill.

The day's developments made it certain that the initiative will be taken by the house judiciary committee, which has the authority to introduce an interstate trade commission, which bill the committee had not embodied in its plan.

The committee has been organized to go ahead with the work of drafting an alternative bill to be introduced and consider enough information on the proposed interstate trade commission would be created, but with limited powers.

There are pending in congress several bills providing for a trade commission. All would provide for a non-partisan board, appointed by the president with the consent of the senate. The present idea is that the proposed board should be an aid to the department of justice, but should in no manner conflict with the jurisdiction of that department.

One feature of a trade commission that is considered concerns the means of carrying out a decree of violation against a corporation for violation of the laws. In this connection, some members have proposed that the court enter a decree, at its discretion, referring to the commission with instructions to take evidence and report. It might be organized that the court might decree. 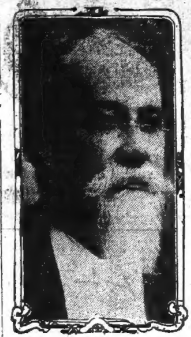

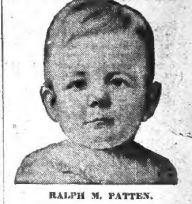

A BOND ISSUE THE ONE KEY TO THE CRISIS Chairman Humphrey, of council's finance committee, has put the approval of calm and conservative business experience upon the contention that the one way out of Atlanta's municipal entanglement is a bond issue.

It is no more possible for a city than for a business to make current income meet maintenance and provide simultaneously for permanent improvements. The city that leans attempts so radical a violation of economic law does one of two things:

1) Exacts an exorbitant tax levy; 2) Runs down on the bell, municipally speaking, depriving its citizens of the rights, the protection and the ordinary public functions assumed to inhere in city government.

Atlanta has reached the latter crisis. With inadequate exceptions we have been trying to make current income sustain the city and cover the demands of growth. That policy has failed grievously. Where has it left us?

The fact now, from the point of view of schools alone, we are nearly one million dollars behind the equipment we should possess and need at this moment. The health of thousands of school children is jeopardized because they are crowded into insufficient room space, or forced to study in ill-ventilated rooms, or in close proximity to sewers. Many are compelled to walk an unreasonable distance from their homes in severe weather to secure accommodations.

It is estimated that \$50,000,000 will be needed to catch up the neglect of years and place Atlanta's facilities upon a just and businesslike basis.

These are facts which every man with regard for the health and prosperity and future of himself, his wife and his children needs to consider solemnly. We have reached a crisis that can no longer be evaded. The bond way is the only way out of it.

SOUTH CAROLINA'S SHAME Past experience and accumulated rebukes have taught Bloese, of South Carolina, no hopeful lessons in manners or decency or the dignity that is assumed to characterize statesmanship.

After all, however, the case of Bloese bears its moral and its prophecy. It teaches the nation the lesson that the last of that dying breed of barrelled demagogues that once contended the ability to inflame ignorant prejudice and to bandy foul epithets as an open sesame to political advancement.

THE PEACHTREE BOTTLE NECK One of the most important public projects to be passed upon by the finance committee of council in making up the January appropriation sheet is the item calling for the widening of what is known as the neck of the bottle on Peachtree street, just beyond the point where Forsyth and Pryor streets meet, at Peachtree.

The entire communication of Dr. Kennedy, and the facts in which he frankly does, comprise an treatise argument for more liberality toward the health department. Atlanta now gives far less, proportionally, to health conservation than the average American city.

THE TWELVE BOY BOYS Jack London, Upton Sinclair and two of their friends less known to name, are about to establish what may be called a human laboratory near Reno, Nevada. They here they have located the twelve worst boys in the United States, picked from 8,000 incommunicable over a range of twelve states, each one averaging 17 per cent bad. These are to be used as a range of human experiments, and under scientific supervision given the opportunity to demonstrate whether they cannot be transformed into wholly or partially good citizens.

Their money may or may not be correct. Human nature is one thing about which no man on earth, however skilled and intuitive, may dogmatize. SCORES OF BODIES UNDER THE VA

Total Number of Dead as Result of Japanese Disaster May Never Be Known. All Americans Safe.

Tokio, Japan, January 14.—Official reports tonight of the disaster in southern Japan brought out the following general features: The small island of Sakura is covered with a layer of lava and ashes in places several feet deep. Beneath this may be found bodies which probably never be known.

The eruption of Sakura-Jima is gradually subsiding. A heavy rainfall is clearing the atmosphere and thereby assisting the work of relief. The entire island of Kishuwered with volcanic ash in varying depth. From 3,000 to 4,000 persons are being evacuated from the island.

All Americans who were in the vicinity of the eruption were safe. Information to this effect has been received here from the Japanese government.

Sakura-Jima, at the height of its eruption, is pictured in reports as a terrifying mountain of fire. The air filled around it with ash and smoke. The police and soldiers of the island fled after the disturbance began, made many rescues from the island of Sakura.

His Majesty the Emperor of Japan having been notified of the disaster, immediately telegraphed to the Emperor of the United States, expressing his sympathy and offering his aid.

Washington, January 14.—An exchange of cables between President Wilson and the emperor of Japan over the Sakura-Jima disaster was started today. President Wilson's message said that night was as follows: "To His Majesty the Emperor of Japan, I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your message of the 13th inst. and to assure you that the government of the United States is deeply sympathetic to the disaster which has befallen your country."
