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FAMILY WORSHIP ALMOST UNKNOWN

Lack of Services in Home Described as Crying Need of Presbyterians of Georgia.

Rome, Ga., November 5.—(Special.) The sixty-ninth session of the Synod of Georgia, now in full swing at the First Presbyterian church, is proving to be a very progressive body in the number of important matters affecting the denomination. At the opening meeting the delegates showed a disposition to shatter precedents by offering the position of moderator to two laymen, S. W. Carson of Atlanta, and Henry R. Goetzlue, of Columbus. While the rules of the church permit the election of a layman to the highest office in the gift of the synod, the two addressors named refused to accept the office and it finally went to Rev. A. Little, of Atlanta, by a unanimous vote.

Another radical step was taken when the gathering on Wednesday by a large majority accepted the report of the committee on family worship. The report declared that the family altar was practically unknown among the Presbyterians of Georgia, and until this condition was remedied there was little hope for the growth of the church. A family altar day, the second Sunday in January of each year, was set aside as a time when the duty of each minister to preach on the importance of family worship. The synod recommended that every church officer should be instructed in the worship in his home and provided for the taking of the family altar. It was also recommended that every family in each church should be visited by the distribution of literature, stressing the importance of this form of worship.

Theological Seminars. The need of theological seminaries in the curriculum of the churches was stressed. Dr. Charles Whaling, president of Columbia Seminary at Columbia, S. C., in his report insisted that the course of study now pursued in the theological seminaries was not so much as that of a greater freedom. He declared that elective studies should be allowed the students in the seminaries. He declared his belief that the number of students in the seminaries should be increased. He pointed out that the rapid growth of technical and scientific education in the colleges and preparatory schools of the country would require a larger number of students from the theological seminaries. He suggested that the traditional courses were insisted upon the seminaries should be revised. He proposed changes and the matter was referred to the committee on theological seminaries.

Young People's Work. Reports from the young people's societies were read, showing a distressing decrease in the amount of contributions. According to the report, there are 142 women's societies with 1,351 members. 47 young men's societies with 211 members, and 11 junior societies with 115 members. There are 50 mission study classes, and there were 20 new societies organized during the past year. The contributions of these societies in the work of the church aggregated \$3,041, a decrease of about \$100 from the year 1917, though the per capita is more than \$1 per member.

The Wednesday session heard an address by the Rev. C. A. Howland. During the discourse there was a discussion on "How the Individual Church May Be More Effective." The speakers were the Rev. Joseph R. Sevier, Rev. A. Little, and Rev. H. C. Geden. An interesting feature of the address was the report of the Rev. H. C. Geden, of Bristol. The Rev. H. C. Geden, of Bristol, reported that the attendance at the light service of the synod will continue through Thursday and Friday. The main topic of the service is "The Foreign Mission." 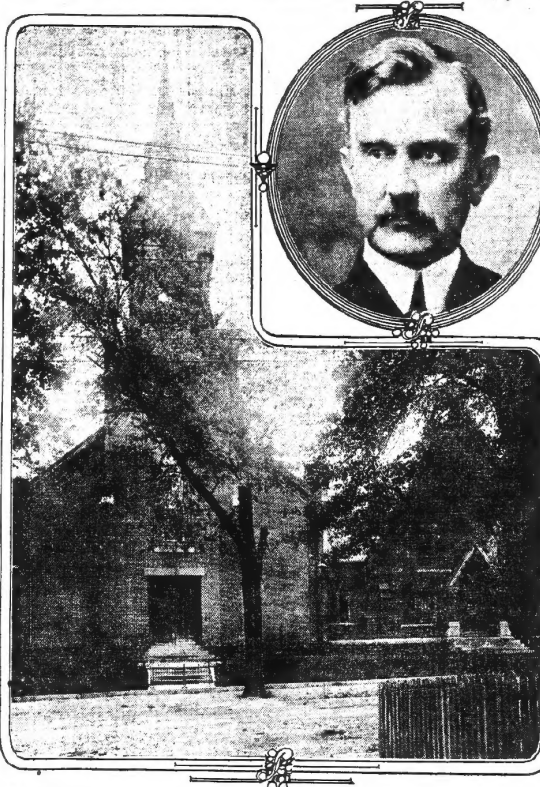

Itemized Expense Account Is Filed With the County Board.

Revealing in a new light the wide scope made by the state in its prosecution in the Leo Frank case, the itemized expense account of Solicitor General M. Dorsey was filed for payment with the county commissioners on Wednesday afternoon.

Caborn, the noted New York hand-writing expert, who compared the handwriting of Frank, Conroy and Nowe with the notes found at the site of the murdered girl's body; another of \$100 paid to Roy Ricker, the secretary of the state board of health, whose testimony on the witness stand regarding the state of the girl's body after the Frank girl was slain and the time of her death, was of great value.

A charge of \$1 was for the purpose of covering the expenses of the four National Bank, where the notes were placed before they were introduced into evidence at the trial.

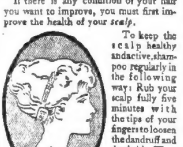
