Washington, November 20.—The Washington government believes the power of the Huerta government is slowly crumbling and disintegrating. No positive steps have been taken by the administration here within the last few days to compel a compliance with the demand for the elimination of Huerta.

No preparations have been made for a blockade on Mexican ports such as have been variously reported. Foreign interests generally will not be protected by the United States, and at the same time, special effort will be made to protect British interests pending the arrival of the British ships in line with previous notification to the United States, and is regarded as a normal business transaction.

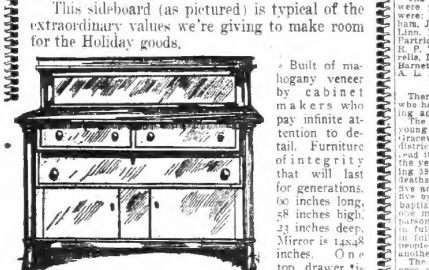
