AMERICANS HELD BY MEXICAN REBELS

One Hundred, Including Several Women and Children, Said to Be Prisoners—The Mexican Congress Convenes.

Mexico City, September 14.—One hundred Americans, including a number of women and children, refugees from Torreon, are reported to have fallen into the hands of rebels while proceeding toward Saltillo. The authorities at Saltillo decline to take the responsibility of sending a force to their rescue, fearing they may be the rebels might commit atrocities on the refugees which otherwise might be avoided. The report comes from an official source at Saltillo, but has not been confirmed. The American embassy has been advised, and has called on the Mexican foreign office to investigate the matter, and do whatever is possible to relieve the Americans about the report prove true. Señor Gamboa, the foreign minister, has had no advice further than the communication from the embassy. He expressed regret, but added that it was no more than might be expected as the result of the neutrality policy of the United States. This had hampered the administration in proceeding with a strong hand against rebels and bandits.

William Bagley is also held under indictment for the rape of his own daughter, and William Hayes is indicted for the seduction of Washington Reynolds, daughter. These cases are expected to come up in the regular order of court, but it is probable that Judge Wright will be asked to allow a hearing today by the defense through which they hope to be freed on bond.

HOW COST OF LIVING CONTINUES TO MOUNT

Washington, September 14.—The cost of living on June 15 was approximately 40 per cent higher than the average between 1898 and 1906, more than three per cent higher than it was a year ago and nearly 15 per cent higher than it was two years ago.

Investigations of retail prices in 49 cities conducted by experts of the bureau of labor show prices practically at the same level as last November when the high records of the last quarter were reached. Jordan, Va., September 14.—(Special.)—After pursuing Frank Firbush, alias "Red Smith," the abandoned agent of the Southern Express company, who was caught in a trap set for him by detectives for the company, have located and arrested him near Superior, Wis., and returned to St. Louis, where he is being held in the North county superior court. Firbush, it is charged, assisted by a book agent named Stewart, got away with all of the money of the company on hand amounting to several hundred dollars, and expressed orders that, if caught, would have been worth \$5,000. Several of the orders for \$50 each, it is said, were cashed by Firbush and Stewart at St. Louis, and other points under the assumed name of Smith. Firbush served an assistant agent for the express company at Warwick for several months. He had only been sent for a few days when he absconded.

2 KILLED AND 2 HURT IN A WILD AUTO RIDE

Port Wayne, Ind., September 14.—Reese Geary, 24, of Montpelier, Ind., and his wife, were killed today in an auto accident which ended in a wild ride on a borrowed car. Hazel Stewart, also of Montpelier, and Jack Lindeman of this city, the other occupants of the car, are unconscious in a local hospital.

The automobile skidded on a turn in the outskirts of the city and plunged down a ten-foot embankment. The car was wrecked and the occupants were killed. The driver, Reese Geary, was killed instantly. His wife, Hazel Stewart, was killed a few minutes later. The other two occupants, Jack Lindeman and Hazel Stewart, were injured and are in a local hospital.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS MEET IN CONVENTION

Jena, Germany, September 14.—The National Socialist convention began today in Jena, Germany, with a large attendance. Frederick Ebert of Berlin, and Dr. Louis Wilhelm Beck of Götting, members of the cabinet of deputies, were elected chairmen. Helmut Lange of East Prussia, Austria, Holland, Belgium, Switzerland and Portugal addressed the convention. James Keir Hardie, Socialist and independent laborer member of the house of commons, in behalf of the English Social Democracy and two millions of trade unionists, said the English laboring classes were trying to create peace and harmony with the German people by the means of its common sense. He declared that the International Social Democracy would recover tomorrow and peace for Europe, he declared. Plot to Rob Train Foiled by Officers Jackson, Tenn., September 14.—An attempt to hold up a northbound Memphis and Ohio railroad train near this city failed, through information given by a passenger. A plan to rob the train, it is reported, was hatched by a young man, who is in his possession addressed to George Sherman, was placed in a letter, and a visit to the scene of the intended hold-up disclosed three quartets of nitroglycerin and a quantity of dynamite. 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EARLY FROSTS PREDICTED BY WEATHER BUREAU

Cool Spell to Follow Rain in Southern and Middle Atlantic States.

Washington, September 14.—Early autumn frosts in the lower lake region, the middle Atlantic states, New England and the extreme northern sections are predicted by the weather bureau for Tuesday. The weekly forecast tonight says:

The week will open with rains continuing in the southern states and extending into the Ohio valley and the middle Atlantic states, and about Tuesday unsettled, rainy weather will prevail over all central and northern sections east of the Mississippi river.

There are no present indications of any unusually high or low temperatures during the week, but frosts will occur Monday and Tuesday in the northwestern and extreme northern lake region, the middle Atlantic states, New England and the extreme north-west; on Tuesday morning over the middle plateau and the central Rocky Mountain region, and by Wednesday over the northern and western upper lake region.

Temperatures will be rising over the northwest in the middle of the week, accompanied by falling pressure, and the end of the week the weather over those sections will again be unsettled and somewhat cooler.

## Selecting Cotton Seed

Now is the time to select seed of cotton seed for next year's planting. There is no room whatever to doubt that the cotton crop on any well managed farm, on which no special attention has been given to this work, will yield per acre that is at once increased from 15 to 25 percent by the planting of a "run out" variety of cotton one that in the result of careful annual selections of the best bolls from the best stalks, having especial regard to the plant, earliness of maturity, large size of bolls, large yield per acre, that because I believe that it is the most popular, as well as the most meritorious feature of a variety. Facilities of maturity, in view of the near approach of the boll weevil, perhaps comes next in importance. And earliness of maturity I do not mean the early blooming of a few squares, but rather that quality of a variety that will "put out" a full crop within a comparatively short period of time. I have known varieties that showed a few early blooms and a few early opening bolls that yet required a long season in which to set bolls for a full crop.

Large size of bolls—measured by the number of open squares or rather yields a pound, or other given weight, of seed cotton, over yields from 100 pounds of seed cotton of less secondary importance in view of the fact that the seed in stalks is a more important product.

From the standpoint of the average farmer the length, fineness and strength of the lint beyond a length of three quarters to seven-eighths of an inch, may well be left to the spinner, who is supposed to have better facilities and the necessary skill for determining these points.

In short it is not well for the average or ordinary farmer to make too many points in the scale of merit at one and the same time. It is the practice of some good farmers to go themselves, or send one or another of their most intelligent hands, over the crop about the middle of September and mark the very best stalks, these stalks to be left unknipped until, say the middle of October, when the best bolls should be picked from them, the cotton ginned to itself, and the resulting seed from which large enough to plant the next following entire crop area. But from the time it would be well to select the best open or twenty stalks and of these dozen or twenty stalks the very best one, two, or three stalks, the seed from which may be planted to plant a few rows to themselves.

But where a farmer has been planting the same variety for a number of years without giving any more care and skill in selecting for the next year's seed, he will find that he has a "middle picking" seed that is picked dry and ginned with some degree of care. It would be very much wiser to buy a few bushels of seed of the type that appeals to his judgment, or preference, of some careful, reputable and reliable breeder of cotton and get a new start. It would be to start his scheme of improving his cotton by selecting for his old stock. He needs not to buy enough seed at once to plant his entire crop the following year, but it would often prove profitable to do that very thing in many cases. Plant bushels of seed are available to plant ten acres of cotton. Ten acres of

fairly good land, liberally fertilized, should produce in a good season of 300 bushels of seed, and the 300 bushels of seed with only ordinary care in preparing the land and planting, will not produce the last year's quantity of cotton growers would find it in their interest to buy a few dollars per bushel of cotton grown this year to the mill and buy enough to plant on the crop if he can get a fairly good selection at one to one and a half dollars per bushel. Of course, one may not reasonably expect to buy the highest grades of selected seed for less than three to five dollars per bushel, but he may safely buy enough to produce plenty of seed to plant the next following year.

**OWN SEED.**  
What has just above been said about the importance of planting only the best strains of cotton applies with equal force to the seed. Indeed, the argument and the reasoning apply equally to all farm crops, whatever. There is no crop—whether of field, garden or orchard—that has not been greatly improved from its original wild type through centuries of cultivation. **WORMS IN COTTON BOLLS.**

**SPRING-GROWN OIL SEED FOR FALL SOWING.**  
C. J. Holloway, Edgewood, Ga.—I wish to ask you a few questions in regard to seeds. Do you think that the seeds sown in January are better than those sown in November? I think they made about a bushel per acre. What is good to sow with rye to make a winter grazing pasture for cows? I wish to sow rye with some, but I prefer to sow the rye in the spring. Please answer the above questions and oblige.

**Answer.**—There is good reason for the belief that when seeds are sown in the spring they gradually lose some degree of their hardiness to rest, and so sown only once in the spring this improvement of hardiness would not probably be serious. But I would prefer to sow the seeds in the fall, and sow successfully and invariably in the fall.
