

Foreign ambassadors are grumbling at the delay of the United

American cavalry detachments have been ordered to proceed at once to the Mexican border, nominally to relieve the troops of the United States already there, but really, it is believed, to augment the fighting force, and to make ready for conflict at any time. The army thus rendered available at the border will be ample to support any intervention Washington may order.

All this the news of to-day brings o the Mexican Capital, with the suggestion that affairs, indeed, have reached a crisis in this troubled republic. It is generally expected here that the United States will attempt soon the elimination of Victorina Huerta, provisional President and dictator. The repeated actions of Huerta in flying in the face of the constitution and laws of his country the inability of his arbitrary adminstration to hold a constitutional election, his evident defiance of foreign intervention-all mark Huerta as an undesirable in the eyes of those who

desire the peace of Mexico. A large portion of the Mexican press is intensely loyal to Huerta and is bitter against the Americans. As a result of their editorials and warped news, the feeling of the porlis lace is inflamed highly against people of the United States, and it appears that intervention by the Government at Washington, or any other action whatsoever, will be a thankless task,

Ever since that time they have been working in every quarter for the release of their husbands, or at least for assurances

The Maderos and Felix Diaz are being bitterly attacked by the Mexican papers controlled by Huerta, Diaz they call a coward and a parasite because of his flight to the American battleship. BOSTON, Nov. 1 .- President (emeritus) Charles W. Eliot, of Harvard, in the current number of The Harvard Theological Review, advocates these points with others bearing upon the welfare and progress of the commu-

"The moral evils of a community are not due to poverty," maintains Dr. Eliot. He adds:

One reads frequently in the public prints that the cause of prostitution is the failure of employers to pay young women a living wage. It seems to me a demoralizing and a degrading doctrine in itself and in all its implications. To my thinking poverty is a far safer moral condition than inordinate wealth.

Where Laws Fail, Now, legislation can improve the onditions under which women work in factories and shops and protect married women from overwork before and after confinement; but this kind of legislation will not safeguard the physical and moral health of the community





Chief Surgeon Lavinder has inoculated a part of his "poison squad," as the monkeys are termed, with the dengue or "breakbone" fever germs in the hope of discovering something tangible about the disease, which affects the monkeys about like it does human. No fatalities have resulted.

Very little is known of the fever that comes up from the tropics every few years, and is epidemic in the Southern States, particularly along the seacoast. About all that is known about it is that it is germatic and is spread by mosquitoes. There is no cure, and the case usually is over at the end of a week or ten days.





No questions as to character or anteceients will be asked.

Every room is lighted by electricity and is perfectly private. Each occudifferent. The charge will be 10 cents a night, and a good breakfast will be provided for 6 cents. There are excellent day rooms, and any woman able to purchase and cook her own food will be allowed to do so. Attached to the hostel will be an employment bureau. The charge for rooms will be 2 cents less than that made at the famous Rowton Houses for Men, while the accommodations will be infinitely superior.
