"This is a victory for Beilis, but a. greater victory for the Jewish race in There are many thickly settled streets Russia," said M. Grousenburg, leading counsel for the defendant.

The trial of Beilis, which began on October 5, aroused greater interest. throughout the world than any other criminal trial since the Dreyfuss case in France.

Although intrinsically only an ordinary criminal case, the Kieff trial held the attention of the civilized world because of the religious and racial elements injected into it by the Russian Government.

Defense's Hard Fight. The anti-semetic hostility of the Government here was given free play and the prosecutor sought to make it appear that a Jew had killed a

Christian boy for ritual motives. From the very first the defense met legal blow for blow, and before he trial was half over it was apparent that the Government would bring down tremendous censure upon itself if it allowed a verdict of guilty

"My client is a man without a soul, declared Attorney Zeman, in outlining what the defense will be. "Spencer" is a human being in whom the moral development was arrested in an earl stage, like the physical growth is arrested in a dwarf, or the mental development in an imbecile.

"If Spencer could live 200,000 years. he might develop sufficiently to be come amenable to the laws of the twentieth century. I shall prove in this trial by the application of accepted scientific principles that Spen cer is not responsible for his acts. Like Prehistoric Man.

The South Sees Its Great Opportunity

This Section Is Alive to the Benefits That Will Accrue to Business With the Opening of the Panama Canal.

The Southern Commercial Congress, which recently met in Mobile, was rendered notable by many essential features.

Primarily the Congress, in its large and representative attendance, was significant of the alert and vital interest with which the South realizes the magnificent era of development which is before it with the completion of the Panama Canal, and the united and intelligent vigor with which it is moving to seize upon its opportunities.

Every class and every profession in every section of the South was represented in that great industrial gathering, which was addressed by the President of the United States, several members of the Cabinet, distinguished members of Congress and the Senate and a number of the eminent men in the Republic. Every speech breathed good counsel and inspiring prophecies of the coming greatness of the South.

Notable indeed among the expressions of the Congress were its definite and pronounced approval of the progressive American policies of the time. "Little Americanism" and "reactive Americanism' had no currency in that live convention. preme Court of the State. He will not approach the court as a Jew or a Gentile, a beggar or a millionaire. He will be simly a man in legal peril of his

The six justices who sit upon the bench are men of unimpeachable character. Their professional equipment is unquestioned. At every angle they are qualified to administer the law with minds single to justice and closed to all

extraneous influences. There are many who are wholly sincere in their belief in Frank's guilt. Many believe with unshakable faith that Frank is the innocent victim of circumstances. These two beliefs are, of course. fixedly incompatible. It is be-

ween the two that the Supreme Court must come as final arbiter. A court of ast resort can have othing in common with prejudice, racial or otherwise. Bias of any nature must be an alien to its counsels. It is and must be concerned solely with the righteous administration of justice under the law and the evidence. will undoubtedly discharge the function of weighing that eviience with scrupulous imparfallty. Where the evidence is sufficient to support the verdict he verdict should stand. If it regards the evidence as insufficient n this case the verdict should be set aside, and the accused be

gives a new trial.


And it is before a court with these exalted attributes that the supreme legal fight of the Frank case will be staged. The Supreme Court of Georgia will come as near finding the justice of this mysterious case as can be expected of any tribunal ruled by human beings. It is fully comtent to pass upon the many roublous issues here involved. If the court writes its indorsement to the death warrant it will be because it believes the guilt of the defendant has been legally proven. It will not permit him to go to the gallows unless it is satisfied his guilt has been established beyond a reasonable doubt.

e h s cuarantee of the constitution is that a man shall have a fair trial for his life. The Supreme Court must say whether or not Frank has had such a trial. If he has, the verdict stands. If he has not, and if the verdict is not justified by the evidence, he is entitled to and he will receive a new trial.
















Who Has the Right of Way?

THE capture of Fort Churchill by the French Admiral, La Perouse, 131 years ago, brought to a close the public career of Samuel Hearne, who may well be called the Pioneer of Arctic Exploration.

A braver man than Hearne never dared the terrors of the unknown and midst the "blushing honors" that are these days coming to the Pearys and Amundsens, it were well not to forget the man who blazed the way for all future explorers of the Frozen North.

On December 7, 1770, Hearne, with a little band of Indians, set out to find the "Far-Away-Metal River," and on June 12, 1771, discovered the Coppermine. Pressing on, on July 17 he stood on the shores of the Arctic-the first white man to witness the tossing ice floes of that lone, green sea. He had found a region half as large as European Russia, and proved that not a narrow strip of a that "does things."

Pacific, but a vast continent. This wide region Hearne was trying to hold for England when he was surprised at Fort Churchill, away up on the western shore of Hudson Bay. With only 39 men he was surprised by 400 French marines from the warship La Sceptre, and nothing was left for him but surrender.

Hearne's right hand man was the great Chief Matonabbee. Matonabbee had thought his English friends invincible, and when he saw his creed of brute force overthrown by the fall of the fort he went out into the forest and killed

After his honorable failure at Fort Churchill Hearne returned to England, where he died in 1792. at the age of 47. Fortunately he wrote an ac-

count of his life, which was published a few years after his death. and lucky are they who have had the privilege of reading it. It is a story full to the brim of quiet heroism and the silent will-power | LOSSES OF CIVIL WAR.

M. D.—It is usually estimated that the life losses during the Civil War, on both sides, measured up to the million figure. The actual killed in battle numbered, on the side of the North, 100,000; on that of the South, 90,000. A large percentage of the losses was from wounds, but the largest of all was from sickness, caused by climate and exposure. Of the million or thereabouts who were sacrificed on account of the struggle, the North lost between 650,000 and 700,000, the South between 306,000 and 350,000. The Southerners, being acclimated. did not lose as many men from sickness, in proportion to the number enlisted, as the North

·I have read your recent editorials with respect to the jury system in Georgia, and I am sure they, with the discussion provoked, are serving a commendable purpose.

I venture to submit a few observations of my own in connection with this matter, because I have discussed the subject in one or two law magazines heretofore. and I am possessed of profound convictions in regard to the

THERE CAN BE NO QUES-TION BUT THAT THE MA-CHINERY OF AMERICAN COURTS IS MORE OR LESS DEFECTIVE AND SUSCEPTI BLE TO WHOLESOME RE-FORM We hear the complaint that in

many instances the rules of procedure are so rigid and fixed as not to be conducive to the ends aimed at. It is proposed as a remedy to make the fixed procedure more elastic and more subject to the discretion of the trial judge. Much complaint arises from the inability of jurors to comprehend

to their determination. This is due to the practice obtaining in many courts of submitting cases to the jury under a charge containing mere generalities and platitudes instead of under a charge sifting out the precise issues of fact to be determined and presenting them to the jury in a Sharp and concise form. A FURTHER CAUSE OF

SUCH DIFFICULTY IS THE PRACTICE OF ALLOWING USELESS AND NEEDLESS WRANGLES BETWEEN OP-POSING COUNSEL IN WHICH MUCH IRRELEVANT MATTER NOT IN EVIDENCE IS STATED. UNDER THE PRETENSE OF WHAT COUNSEL EXPECTS TO PROVE, THEORIES OF THE CASE, ETC., AND THE ADMISSION BY THE JUDGE OF MUCH IRRELEVANT TES-TIMONY, CALCULATED TO MISLEAD AND CONFUSE A

The temperament of a judge. his grasp and hold upon the case on trial, and the training of the lawyers practicing before him. are as important factors in the proper administration of justice as acts of the Legislature and rules of court. It can not be gainsaid that the American bench and bar are in many instances sadly deficient in that training which is expected of first-class judges and practitioners.
