Our Government is AFRAID TO USE ITS POWER. About fifteen years ago W. R. Hearst, commenting on the mistakes made by those who indiscriminately denounce what they mistakenly call "paternalism," said to one of his colleagues: "You can't destroy power. If you take it away from government, individuals will have it. If you don't want individuals to have it, you must let government exercise it.

"Our forefathers, establishing this Government, were impressed with the abuse of power by the Government of England, and tried, therefore, to build up a system under which the Government would not be able to exercise full power.

"Consequently, the power taken from the Government was promptly picked up by individuals. And we have seen individuals taxing the consumer through trusts and public monopolies that the Government is not permitted to own."



Every seaport of the United States is filled with the merchant ships of other nations. This Government should begin the active building of a great merchant marine; a gigantic fleet of ships that should carry American-made, Atlanta-made, if you please, goods, over the Seven Seas. At one time the United States dominated the seas; to-day our merchant marine is deplorably small. It should be raised to the first power and the Government should lose no time in bringing about this new condition.

Other nations are alive to the importance of foreign trade. They do not hesitate to establish subsidies for the benefit of manufacturers and vessel owners. They regard it a duty; just as this Government should regard it.
