PIONEER BROKER FIRM'S FAILURE STIRS STREET

Receiver Named for H. B. Hollins & Co. Following Severe Losses in Mexico.

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Announcement of the suspension of the firm of H. B. Hollins & Co., one of the oldest firms of bankers and brokers in Wall street, was made on the Stock Exchange to-day.

At the same time an involuntary petition in bankruptcy was filed in the United States District Court against the head of the firm, Harry B. Hollins.

The failure of Hollins & Co. is the most important that has been recorded in financial circles in several years.

The petition was filed by C. W. Sweet and H. E. Long, both of New York, the petitioners alleging that \$62 was due them on account.

Did Big Western Business. In addition to Mr. Hollins, the following members of the firm were named in the petition: Britton W. Busch, Walter K. Utzieb, Anthony H. Walkburg and John Aull.

The firm was also a member of the Chicago Stock Exchange and did an extensive Western business.

During the formation of the New York Central system the banking company represented the Vanderbilt group and purchased the Omaha Road and other lines, which were amalgamated into the New York Central's system.

The company also dealt extensively in Central American and Mexican securities. The troubles in Mexico are said to have cost the firm a vast amount of money, and this was one

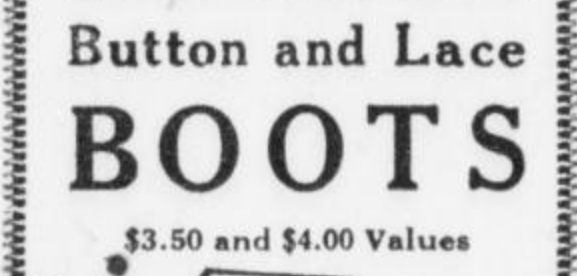

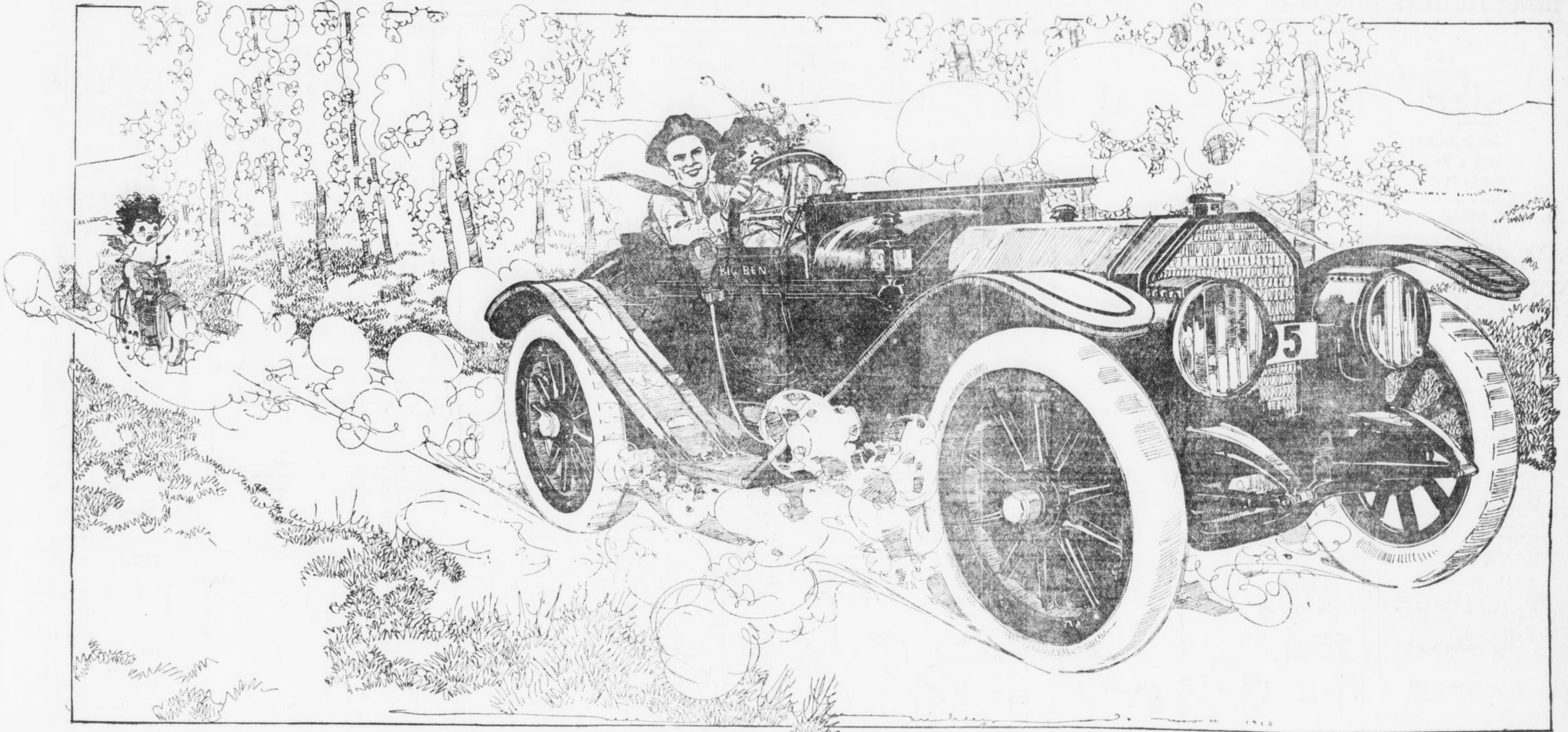

NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—Princeton plays her last football game for the season of 1913 against Yale at New Haven next Saturday.

Yale has been held in high regard for her football ability. A study of gridiron records shows Yale's position to be an enviable one, and anyone who thinks Yale will not show a good, strong team against Princeton is very much mistaken.

When Yale is humbled, let her opponents watch out.

There has been a big improvement at the Yale field since the Colgate game, and the Yale team in the Brown game shows much advance in team play. The spirit of Yale still lives, and that spirit has increased doubly since defeat.

There is not a man on the Yale team but what would give everything to defeat Princeton and Harvard, and any team that goes to New Haven expecting a walk-over had better sit down and reason out some of these facts.

Consider Yale Strong.

As for Princeton, she expects to find Yale good and strong. Yale's physical condition is excellent, and the players are eager to square themselves in the big final games with Princeton and Harvard.

Yale has been working on a few—only a few—strong plays, distance-gaining plays, and that is true head-work. Yale has a good kicker and two good ends, and a fair center. With this combination much can be done in the new game of football toward a successful ending.

Princeton is going to consider Yale as strong as the strongest team Yale ever had. This is wise, for the success of any team depends largely upon this spirit, and both teams, stung by defeat, will enter the game resolved to play their best.

Shea's Injury Costly.

Princeton started Tuesday in light signal work to prepare for Saturday's game. It was unfortunate for Princeton that Shea was injured, for he will not participate in Saturday's game. Shea had proved to be one of the best ends in the country.

Yale is taking a big brace to beat Princeton, and unless Princeton can establish good, fast kicking, Yale is liable to block some of Princeton's kicks.

The great success in the winning team of to-day is to work off plays for which there is no defense. Harvard's success in having four or five forwards smash into the man who starts to run with the ball is what Princeton will try to copy. There is nothing more discouraging to a man who runs with the ball than to be hit and tackled fiercely by several forwards getting through.

The Yale-Princeton game promises to be a very hard close-fought game, with the advantage in Princeton's favor.

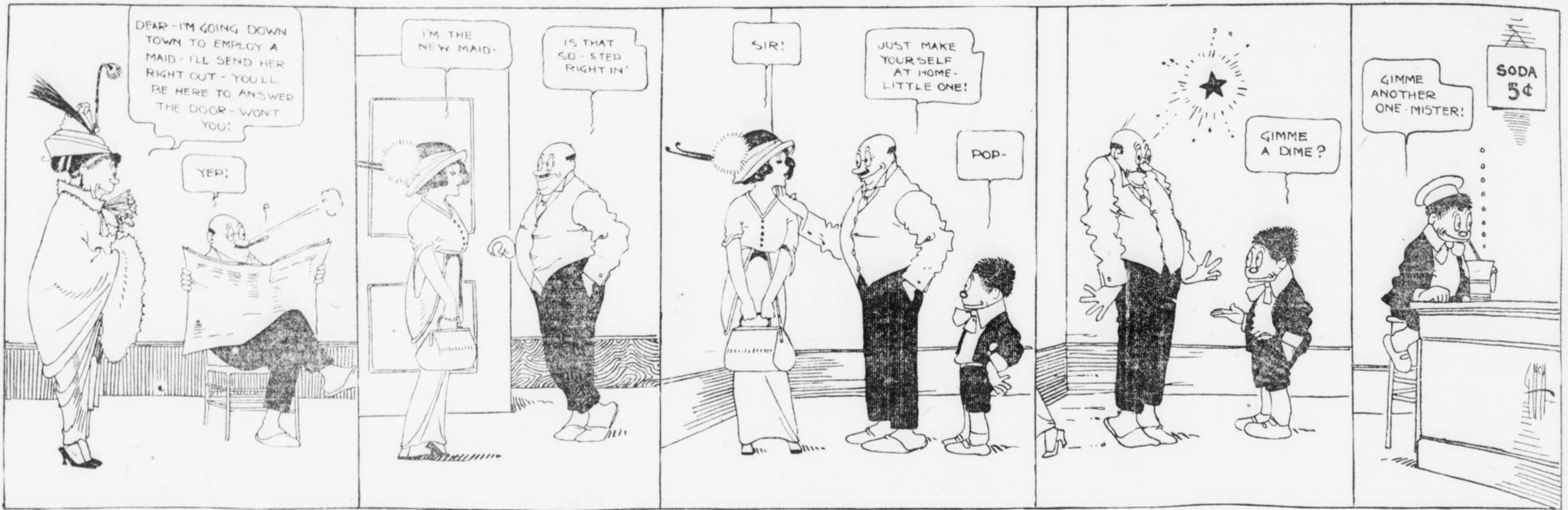

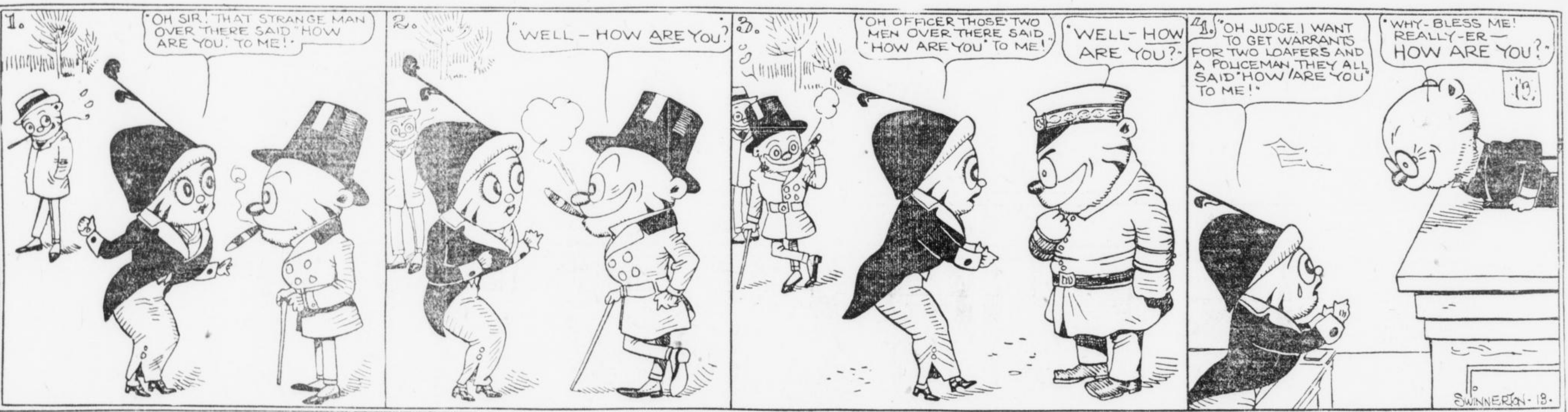

Tech High and Donald Fraser play on the latter's campus to-morrow afternoon.

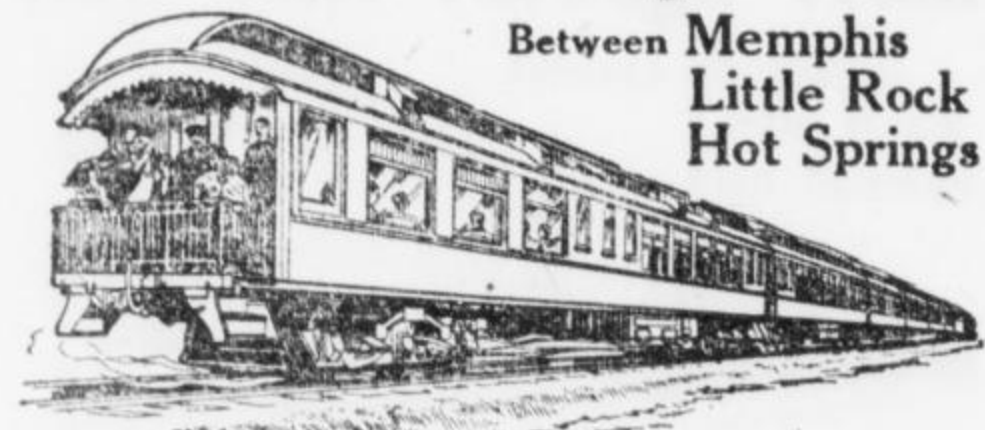
Tech High will enter the game ruling the favorites, as they have not been defeated this season.
