Cries of "Lynch him," "Kill him' and similar ejaculation caused Jackson to flee from the scene of the trouble.

A number of guards and wagon drivers persued him, and the timely arrival of the police probably saved Jackson from violence. The prisoners were kept in the wagons only by the armed guards.

SPORTING COMMENT

By Ed W. Smith. PEAKING of famous left hands, we were reminded sharply the other night that we had forgotten to mention one of the greatest that ever flashed in the boxing arena, that possessed by Dal Hawkins, the sensational California lightweight who flourished back in the old days of the late '90s. It took an old-timer to remind us of Dal's wonderful left, which, by the way, was the same sort of a flashy weapon that Charley White wields off the port side in the present decade. Jim Griffin, of California, now about the premier referee of San Francisco, was the man who recalled Hawkins.

I NSTANTLY the name Hawkins is mentioned one's mind goes back to that famous day in 1897 at Carson City, Nev., when Bob Fitzsimmons laid low the mighty Corbett with a solar plexus blow, and especially to those who were at the ringside that chilly St. Patrick's Day does the mention of Hawkins and Carson City seem almost synonymous. It was on that afternoon that Hawkins made a record of having put over about the quickest knockout ever recorded. His victim was Martin Flaherty, then one of the hardest featherweights of the day, for Hawkins himself at that time was only a feather. The affair was the only preliminary to that famous old encounter and took place shortly after noon and immediately before Corbett and Fitz were called into the arena to settle the big question.

T HE late Malachy Hogan, one of the best referees known to the game at the time, was referee of the preliminary, and George Siler, also of this city and who also since has passed away. acted in the big battle. Malachy instructed the men briefly on how he wanted them to battle and then they stepped back to their corners and the bell sounded. Flaherty walked out rather slowly while Hawkins, advancing with a great deal of speed, feinted once rather low, as if to strike at the body. Down went the Flaherty guard and over went Hawkins' left hook. It landed like the snap of a whip on the point of the New England man's chin and he fell over backwards, flat on his spine and as senseless as if hit by a train. He never made a tremor while Hogan was counting out the ten and then was carried to his corner. The time was said to have been only four seconds from the clang of the gong to the crash of glove meeting human skull.

A ND speaking of quick victories in the roped arena calls to mind the fact that Malachy Hogan, who was one of the greatest characters of the decade in addition to being a great ring arbiter, acted as referee in another and perhaps the shortest fight possible under the rules. This one happened in Harvey, Ill., and Battling Nelson was the victor, knocking Billy Rossler out with the first punch, delivered almost before the men had put their gloves up in defensive position. It took place on April 5, 1902, and almost as soon as the bell sounded Nelson ran across the ring, met his opponent with a heavy left-hand swing and knocked him as flat and as cold as could be.

OGAN always claimed after-L wards that the Harvey fight was shorter than the Hawkins knockout at Carson City and being referee of both of them was in a position to know. Both were so fast that the timekeepers hardly could measure them with any degree of accuracy. In both cases the blows were of a similar character, although Hawkins' punch was a short, snappy one, while Nelson's was delivered with a long swing following a run and

D ESPITE Hawkins' great speed and skill and undoubted hitting ability with his left hand he fell considerably short of landing near the championship chair. The Flaherty battle gave him a lot of prestige and advertising. the more so because the Fitzsimmons-Corbett battle was so extensively written about all over the world, and he did pretty well during the remainder of that year. He beat the clever Charley Mc-Keever in fifteen rounds, went twenty rounds to a draw with George Dixon and then knocked out Eddie Connolly, of New Brunswick in fourteen rounds on the coast.

T HESE battles made it look as if he were ripe for the prime old killing with the real champion, and Dal went East to shake down some of the pippins out of the lightweight tree. In those days, unfortunately for him, there were droves of corking good men and the very first of them he stacked up against in the Eastslew him thoroughly. This was "Spike" Sullivan, who downed Hawkins for the full count in twenty-two rounds in New York. He reinstanted himself by knocking out Kid McPartland in three rounds with that famous left hook of his, but it was a different case when he met Frank Erne on the coast in 1908. Erne knocking him out in seven hurricane rounds.

Why Should the Taxpayers Use Their Money to Reward Friends of Presidents?

Panama Fair Majestically Rising

NOWING the constantly in-A creasing interest of the public in the Panama-Pacific International Exposition, to be held in San Francisco in 1915, I recently visited the exposition grounds, which comprise an area of 635 acres, bordering upon the San Francisco Bay, at the entrance of the famous Golden Gate. On the north this magnificent site fronts the water for over two miles, and on the south it rises in successive terraces like a great amphitheater. I can not imagine a more marvelous natural stage setting for staging what promises to be the greatest world exposition yet held

Over 70 acres have been reclaimed from the tide water of the bay, buildings have been removed, miles of sewerage lines have been laid, a complete high pressure and low pressure water system has been installed throughout the grounds, the architects, designers and sculptors have been engaged for months, and commissioners have encircled the globe in the interest of the exposition. which has resulted in 35 States in the American Union declaring their intention to participate and

In addition to this, the foundations are in for the fourteen main exhibit palaces. Machinery Palace, the largest to be erected, covering eight acres and rising to a height of an ordinary six-story building, is nearing completion. I am informed by the exposition authorities that the building construction is actually ahead of the schedule and all contracts are let for completion at a specified time. which insures the opening of the gates with everything in readiness as planned on February 20, 1915.

The main exhibit palaces cover 75 acres and are grouped in such close proximity around a court, the Court of Sun and Stars, that the visitor may pass directly from one building to another through magnificent arcades as though passing from one great room to another in the same building, thus eliminating long walks from exhibit to exhibit that have so wearied sightseers at other expositions. Viewed from the ex-

terior on the heights or the bay, the design of the architecture is such that the great palaces will appear to be one colossal building

of vast proportions. Beyond the main exhibit palaces to the east there are 85 acres set apart for amusements of a varied and high-class character gathered from all parts of the world, and construction is progressing rapidly. To the west 87 acres are divided between the States of the nation and the nations of the world, where the first pavilion is already rising. Beyond this, vast areas are devoted to live stock exhibits, to aviation and international athletics The people of the State of Cail-

fornia have appropriated an aggregate of over \$20,000,000 to this world enterprise, and are offering the sites for State and national buildings free, and space for individual. State and national exhibits without cost beyond installation and maintenance.

Petty Dishonesty

Some Forms Are So Frequent as To Be Almost Respectable, Such as Loose Promise Making.



By REV. DR. CHARLES H. PARKHURST.

THE line of honesty is an exceedingly straight one. It sometimes gets badly crooked in the use, but is by nature rectilinear and is the shortest path between duty and performance. Small dishonesties are of the same nature as big ones, and by cultivation easily grow into big ones.

There is no halfway between straight and crooked, and if we do not begin by being dishonest in a small thing there is no danger of our graduating into a

large-scale deceiver or swindler. All of that is very simple and old-fashioned.

Much is said about the new morality, the new thought, the It has stood the racket for a good quite sure that they will make as good a show in the working as what we received from our fathers and grandfathers.

There are forms of inconspicuous dishonesty worth mention, which are so frequent as to be almost respectable, but which loosen the joints of character and occasion no end of annovance and some times even distress.

One is that of engaging to do a given thing at a specific time and then failing to do it at the time promised, and postponing it to a later hour or day, or even not doing it at all.

When a promise of that kind is made conditionally, with no positive assurance attached to it, and with only the understanding on the part of the one making it that he will do his best to meet the wishes of the party with whom he is dealing, then no fault can be found if expectations are disappointed. But those are not the terms in which engagements are usually made.

You make a contract with your tailor. He says, "I will deliver the article on or before such a day." No conditions attached. No indefiniteness in the terms of the engagement. Very likely he does not know whether he will be able to keep the engagement or not but that in most cases makes no difference with the terms in which the stipulation is made.

He wants the job and hangs you up till he gets along far enough with someone's else job to make sure of that in addition to what he is doing for you.

We can perfectly well understand how it all comes about, but there is just crook enough in it to prevent its being straight. For tailor you can substitute grocer or painter or plumber, or almost any service of that character

It is not what can exactly be called an outrageous lie, but it has got the genius of lie in it.

It is a careless handling of the truth. If it is not a deliberate intention to deceive, it is a careless indifference as to whether or not deception is going to be the

This loose habit of making defi nite promises that are uncertain of fulfillment can easily be broken up by saying to your plumber, for

"You have definitely promised to come and do the job at such a time. Now, having made this definite promise, if you do not come at that time I shall be displeased and shall give my next job to another plumber.

That will both brace up his integrity and secure prompt service.

I have read the reports as far as they were printed in the various newspapers of the country, notably those of Atlanta, and have heretofore refrained from making any comments or criticism of the conduct of any one, deeming it an intrusion possibly to prejudice any one while the case was pending in court. Now that the whole matter will be referred to the Supreme Court of your State, and that the bill of exceptions has been signed incorporating the remarkable statement of Judge Roan, I deem it my
