ROME, Nov. 20 .- "Certain modern customs and amusements" were strongly deplored and condemned in resolutions unanimously adopted by the conference of the Atlanta Diocese of the Episcopal Church which closes its three days' session tonight. The resolutions were introduced by the Rev. Troy Beattie, rector of the church at Athens, and are more radical and far-reaching than those passed by the Presbyterian Synod here recently and those of the Christian Church convention at Macon

last week.







# MAY HIS BEHIND YOU MUST AID EMPTY STOCKING FUND PRESERVE CHILD FAITH IN XMAS PLAN FOR PAY

Committee to Increase, if Possible, All Firemen, Police and Teachers Under \$100.

Material increases in pay for Atlanta school teachers, policemen and firemen are promised Thursday as a result of a conference between Mayor Woodward and the Council Salaries Committee.

Mayor Woodward told the commit teemen that if it were financially possible the increase should be made in all cases where the wage scale is less than \$100 a month. The committee agreed to work out its recommendation on this line, adding that it would be quite possible to finance the increase.

"I didn't veto the raise in the pay of policemen," said Mayor Woodward Thursday. "I vetoed the manner in which it was done.

Chances Look Favorable.

"Now the Salaries Committee has taken up the matter in the regular way, along with the claims of the teachers and firemen for raises. "The chances look favorable for in-

#### creases."

Councilman C. D. Knight, Alderman John S. Candler and Councilman S. A. Wardlaw, three members of the Salaries Committee, called at Mayor Woodward's office Wednesday afternoon to discuss the matter. They held a long private conference.

A favorable attitude toward raising the pay of school teachers, policemen and firemen was expressed by all. Other city employes are paid as individuals rather than as a class, but it was decided that some adjustments of salaries in other depart-

Councilmen generally favor raises in pay for school teachers, pollcemen and firemen. Mayor Woodward's attitude practically assures the grant ing of increases. He appoints the Finance Committee and it usually is the policy of the Finance Committee to carry out whatever special pro gram he recommends. Whatever the Finance Committee finally passes on Council is pretty sure to adopt.

## 5-Cent Peach Brings Lower Rail Rates



PEAKING of famous left hands, we were reminded sharply the other night that we had forgotten to mention one of the greatest that ever flashed in the boxing arena, that possessed by Dal Hawkins, the sensational California lightweight who flourished back in the old days of the late '90s. It took an old-timer to remind us of Dal's wonderful left. which, by the way, was the same sort of a flashy weapon that Charley White wields off the port side in the present decade. Jim Griffin, of California, now about the premier referee of San Francisco, was the man who recalled Hawkins.


INSTANTLY the name Haw kins is mentioned one's mind goes back to that famous day in 1897 at Carson City, Nev., when Bob Fitzsimmons laid low the

mighty Corbett with a solar plexus blow, and especially to those who were at the ringside that chilly St. Patrick's Day does the mention of Hawkins and Carson City seem almost synonymous. It was on that afternoon that Hawkins made a record of having put over about the quickest knockout ever recorded. His victim was Martin Flaherty, then one of the hardest featherweights of the day, for Hawkins himself at that time was only a feather. The affair was the only preliminary to that famous old encounter and took place shortly after noon and immediately before Corbett and



OGAN always claimed afterwards that the Harvey fight was shorter than the Hawkins knockout at Carson City and being referee of both of them was in a position to know: Both were so fast that the timekeepers hardly could measure them with any degree of accuracy. In both cases the blows were of a similar character, although Hawkins' punch was a short, snappy one, while Nelson's was delivered with a long swing following a run and jump. . . .

DESPITE Hawkins' great speed and skill and undoubted hitting ability with his left hand he fell considerably short of landing near the championship chair.




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

# THE PAY OF OUR JUDGES ---Must Be Increased to Retain Upon the Bench the Right Sort of Men.

The press of the State of Georgia is echoing from every quarter the demand of the Atlanta Georgian that better salaries be paid the judges of the courts of the Commonwealth.

Whatever may be the status of other departments of the State-and it is admitted that there are underpaid officials in several-it seems agreed on all hands that it is of first importance NOW that the judiciary be taken care of righteously and fairly in the matter of salaries.

Remember these facts: The judges of the Supreme and Appeals Courts, the final tribunals of review, receive only \$4,000 per annum each; the judges of the Superior Courts receive \$3,000 each.

Think of those niggardly salaries. Think of the personnel of the courts, as they are and as they should be kept, and then ask yourself, as a taxpayer, as a property owner, and as a citizen loving law and order, if it is FAIR AND SQUARE DEALING UPON THE PART OF GEORGIA NOT TO PAY THOSE JUDGES ENOUGH TO LIVE ON.

With respect to the Supreme and Appeals Courts, the Rome Tribune-Herald aptly and justly says:

If Georgia expects to keep the best lawyers in the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals it will have to raise their salaries.

Its Tools-Purpose, Aspiration and Courage-are Within Ourselves. Shakespeare Wrote His Dramas With but 5,000 Words at His Command.

ANY people lay their failure IVI to make a name in the world to the lack of proper materials with which to work out their special lines of endeavor. Tools are necessary to the good artisan and artist; BUT GENIUS MAKES ITS OWN TOOLS AS WELL AS ITS OWN OPPORTU-NITIES.

Shakespeare made his immortal dramas and poems WITH ONLY FIVE THOUSAND WORDS, AT HIS COMMAND.

From an exchange we take the statement as follows: "Bullokar's Complete English Dictionary, in 1616, the year of Shakespeare's death, contained 5,080 words. Thomas Blount's 'Glossographia' (1656) improved on this and was superseded in its turn by Edward Phillips' 'New World of English Words' (1658),

Funk's 'Standard Dictionary 1894) entered the field with half as many again-318,000 words in all. There have been half a dozen editions' of this, and the new one next September reaches high-water mark with a total of 450,000 words, most of which are English beyond question."

Yet, despite this fact, no Shakespeare has arisen to contest the honors of the one who had only 5,000 word tools for his use. Shakespeare did not travel, or speak many tongues.

Perhaps his power lay in stay. ing with himself, in digging in his own mind and soul for knowledge and wisdom, and in making no effort to find unusual words wherewith to convey his meaning

It would be interesting to know just what he would have done with our vast vocabulary of words if he had been given one of the new dictionaries. But it is more interesting to realize what he did without these words. And it is worth thinking about, whenever we are tempted to complain, that we lack the necessities for making a success in any one direction.

Resignations from the Supreme Court have been frequent during late years, owing to the fact that the judges could not afford to hold the positions.

It is of paramount importance to the Commonwealth that the very best legal timber should compose these courts.

Many lawyers of scarcely medium ability are earning more than the judges of the highest courts in the State.

A first-rate lawyer takes a position on the Supreme or Appellate Court. He gives up his practice and devotes his entire time to the business of the State. When he returns to the practice, it is necessary to begin all over again.

These judges should be paid salaries commensurate with the service rendered.

If the State of Georgia expects to retain their services that is about all there is to it.

That, indeed, IS "about all there is to it."

And the comment of the Rome paper is but one of many similarly worded and thought out, coming recently from all sections of Georgia.

Georgia should be both ASHAMED AND AFRAID TO UN DERPAY ITS JUDICIARY.

Salaries for Supreme and Superior Court judges, provided to-day upon a basis established twenty-five years ago, are unfair, necessarily.


The courts, after all, constitute the greatest and surest bulwark of the people against oppression and injustice.

The people of Georgia can ill afford to be FOOLISH in respect to these tribunals for the administration of the law.

The present Legislature, when it meets next summer, will do well to take under serious and statesmanlike consideration the question of better salaries for Georgia judges.

The Legislature is the vehicle provided by the people for the equitable adjustment of problems of this kind. And throughout all Georgia there exists an earnest belief that the judiciary is at present SHAMEFULLY AND DEPLORABLY UNDER. PAID.

The people undoubtedly will approve that Legislature possessed of sufficient common sense and courage to right the crying wrong now imposed upon the judges of Georgia.
