Un-American Calmness

An esteemed contemporary declares that President Wilson in face of the defiance of Huerta and the rebuff of Carranza remains "quite calm."

Surely an amazing if not altogether admirable calmness. President Huerta has torn up some half-dozen absolute ultimatums and metaphorically flipped them in the face of President Wilson's envoy.

General Carranza has insolently informed President Wilson that he wants none of the United States support—evidently preferring to continue murdering his helpless prisoners without accepting President Wilson's amiable proffers of assistance.

The people of the United States are humiliated and the office of the Presidency is humbled, but President Wilson remains "quite calm."

There are other American citizens of less importance and more patriotism who are not quite so "calm."


lishment As Georgia has no "reserved public lands" like Texas and all of the "admitted States" leased out for "school purposes," and independent of public taxation of all kinds, namely, her Western and Atlantic Rallroad, would it not be wise policy, looking to the futury to multiply its producing

The record of the revenue-producing power of this railroad, looking back no farther than the past 43 years, shows that it has brought more than \$15,000,000 to the State Treasury with no more trouble and expense than talking about it, passing two legislative acts and executing two leases.

And if you will balance this sum against the aggregate of all the salaries of all the judges and solicitors, together with the salaries of all the Governors and every other "Statehouse officer." together with the pay of every member of both houses of every General Assembly for all those 43 years, you will find that this railroad has more than defrayed making all her laws and superintending their enforcement.

THE first railroad in India was opened just 60 years ago. Over the subjects of the Moguls and the Rajahs the remorseless Car of Juggernaut had rolled and crunched for countless generations, and now, at last, had come the Czar of Progress, drawn not by lazy bullocks, but by the mighty though invisible power of steam, and destined to completely sidetrack Juggernaut and all the superstition and cruelty for which he had

so long stood, Than the vast Indian land, with its venerable past, its teeming millions of people, its cloudpiercing mountains and majestic rivers, its ancient philosophies and hoary religious cults, its marvelous forests and jungles, its wealth of animal forms, and its innumerable royalties with their barbaric gold and pearl, there is not upon all the earth a more interesting region.

And the wonder only grows when one stops to think that this stupendous empire is governed by a few thousand Englishmen!

For 150 years the little handful of Anglo-Saxons have impressed their will upon the mighty mass of Asiatic humanity, and, with a few trifling exceptions, no attempt has been made by 250,000 --000 to stay the conqueror's hand or say unto him, "What doest

is one of the most astounding miracles that is made known to us in the whole course of history, and perhaps affords us the most striking instance known of the omnipotence of will power and moral courage. To the student of psychology there is a perennial interest in the subject of British rule in India-why it is, and how it is, that the little corporal's guard of Englishmen living in the midst of the millions of Orientals are able to maintain their splendid sovereignty over

And equally wonderful is the fact that the railways, of which there are now thousands of miles in India, do not seem to make any difference with the security of the Englishman's grip.

Comment on Frank Case

Editor The Georgian:

There is really some doubt in my mind as to whether you will publish this article for the reason that I have falled to see a single article in your paper defending this court trial of Leo Frank. However, I am going to assume that you will be fair enough to allow both sides of the case to be presented to your readers. I have been a constant reader of your paper practically from its first issue; a good many things have been published in your paper that I heartily approve of, and I refer more particularly to some of your editorials, and, on the other hand, quite a few editorials that I did not approve of, but I am fair and I always pick out the best and leave out the others.

Editor The Georgian: in a recent issue of your paper I note an article by Mr. Simon Wolf, of Washington, D. C., "A Comment on the Frank Case." I should like to offer a few reflections touching this case and a criticism or so on this article of Mr. Wolf's.

First, as touching the opinion of Judge Roan; whether it is discreet or indiscreet on the part of the presiding judge to express an opinion on a jury trial has nothing to do with the verdict of the jury. If the opinion of the judge as to the guilt or innocence of the accused should cut any figure with the jury in their finding a verdict, then by virtue of that fact, the judge has overstepped his prerogative and robbed the jury of their rights under the law. In making this statement of course we refer to the passing on the facts in the case. The judge has nothing more to do with the facts in a criminal case as given to the jury than a spectator in the courtroom.

Again, a great deal has

been said touching Leo Frank's nationality, and because he was a Jew there was a prejudice existing against him. I feel sure that such a statement is utterly untrue, and many who have made such a charge know it

to be untrue.

Again, Mr. Simon Wolf makes this remarkable statement: "And in the case of Frank there can no longer be any question but that reasonable doubt was denied him, and that the spirit that pervaded the courtroom during the trial was anything but orderly or civilized." Upon what assumption, we would like to ask, does Mr. Wolf reach the remarkable conclusion that Frank was denied the "reasonable doubt?" The fact is. Frank was given the benefit of the "reasonable doubt" if we are disposed to believe what the twelve jurors say. He, not only misstates the facts in this regard, but he reflects upon every one of those twelve jurors. They swore they would give the prisoner the benefit of any "reasonable doubt" and logically they did so, for each juror had to pass that dead line, so to speak, before they could write a unanimous ver-

dict of guilty. Then, again, this sage of Washington, D. C., makes the further reflection that the "spirit that pervaded the courtroom during the trial was anything but orderly or civilized." Does he suppose the people of Georgia and elsewhere will swallow any such statement? The writer happened to be in Atlanta during most of the trial and was in the courtroom, and we assert that we have never witnessed a more orderly trial. It seems that some newspapers have just thrown down the fences, and allowed almost libelous articles to be published against judge jury. The Law of Paradox

It Doesn't Much Matter What Your Condition in Life Is, He Says, All Things Are Equalized.

A JALKING through the gal-VV lery of statuary of the Luxembourg I saw the white, carved nude figure of a man-a man in all the splendid strength of youth.

Standing behind him on a higher part of the pedestal was the form of a woman; and this woman was leaning over, her face turned toward him and her lips about to be pressed upon his.

I moved closer and to one side, and saw that on the face of the youth was an expression of deathly agony, and then I noted that the muscles of that splendid body were tense with awful pain. And in that one glance I saw that the woman's body was the

TY TOULD you not really wish VV to know of the origin of nearly all you think, say and believe?

Let every page of that huge mass, so long admired as classic mythology, be freed from accretions and turned to history. Would we be pleased to dig down into many libraries entire rooms filled with inscribed steles, tiles, tablets, plates and cylinders in burned clay and on stone walls, sepulchers, sarcophagi, obelisk and pillar?

Nations and races once lived around and about the Mediterranean whose names are lost or transformed into other names of archaic terminology.

Dredge the bottom of Lake Moeris, in Egypt; excavate the labyrinth of Arsince, in Egypt; the labyrinths of Crete and Lemnos. Dredge the bottom of the Gulf of Tunis. Upturn Southern Italy and quadruple excavations in Greece and Thrace. Clear Asia Minor to Tadmor and Palmyra and strip Palestine to the original
