Lorothy Haug Suicide, Says Croner's Jury
WARDEN ANSWERS HARSH CHARGES

ASSEMBLY SUSTAINS CHARGES, 39 TO 10

Conviction on Single One of Eight Articles Sufficient to Remove Executive.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 16.—Governor William Sulzer was convicted this afternoon by the court of impeachment, consisting of the State Senate and Judges of the Court of Appeals.

The court voted first on article one of the impeachment and found the Governor guilty of making a false report of his campaign fund to the Secretary of State. Conviction on only one count is necessary for the Governor's removal from office. The final vote was 39 to 10.

The court had reached a decision as to what its verdict would be in executive session that had lasted all day Wednesday and this morning. At the final session this afternoon was opened to the public. Each member as he voted was given an opportunity to explain the reason for his ballot. This made the matter of concluding the trial a long-drawn out affair.

Article 1 of the impeachment articles, which charges that Sulzer made a false and fraudulent report concerning campaign contributions to the Secretary of State, was taken up first.

Gov. Sulzer this morning was tentatively found guilty upon three articles of impeachment out of the eight brought against him.

The three articles upon which the tentative agreement was reached to render a verdict of guilty were: Article 1.—The charge that the Governor made a false campaign statement to the Secretary of State.

EFFECT OF MOON IS BLAMED FOR HAUG SUICIDE

THOMASVILLE, Oct. 17. All the mystery connected with the death here last Monday of Miss Dorothy Haug, the pretty young Valdosta student, was cleared up Thursday when the coroner's jury, in a unanimous opinion, held that the girl committed suicide, and a verdict was returned in accordance with her testimony, diverting suspicion from any innocent man.

Feeling Was High. Feeling was high here when peace morning. At that time the coroner jury had already rendered a verdict that Dorothy Haug had been murdered by an unknown party and it would not have been possible to convince people here that the girl had not been slain had it not been insisted on a thorough examination of the skull, which revealed the presence of the bullet, fired by the girl into her left temple. The missile, which had imbedded itself in the brain in the back of her head, dropped to the floor when the skull was removed.

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CAPTURE IS HAILED AS END OF BIG MYSTERY

Negro Who Robbed Hospital Here Said to Answer Description of Leagon Slayer.

In the negro who gave his name as John Henry, after he had shot at two men and committed four robberies, the Atlanta police Friday expressed the belief that they have the man who killed Leagon, an art student in Chicago, and have solved a mystery which has puzzled the police of that city since it was committed October.

The negro, who was arrested at the death of a clever nurse by Miss Nellie Ahlberg, a nurse whose room in the Georgia Baptist Hospital dormitory he had entered, talked with the description of the man hunted for by the Chicago police at the time the art student was murdered.

Answers Description. In this particular Henry talks with this description. The negro can give no satisfactory explanation of why he left Chicago. That he is a desperate character was proven by the daring of his Atlanta crimes.

Picture Sent to Chicago. Jeff Wright, the forensic expert at the police station, while questioning the negro, found that he came from Chicago. In a cross-examination the negro made damaging statements regarding his knowledge of Chicago and the Leagon murder. He has been photographed and a picture of him sent to Chicago police for possible identification.

Spark Caused Explosion. An investigation showed the explosion was due to an electric spark which entered the dirigible which was carrying the balloon. The dirigible was under way when it exploded. As a result were the injuries of the five men who were killed.

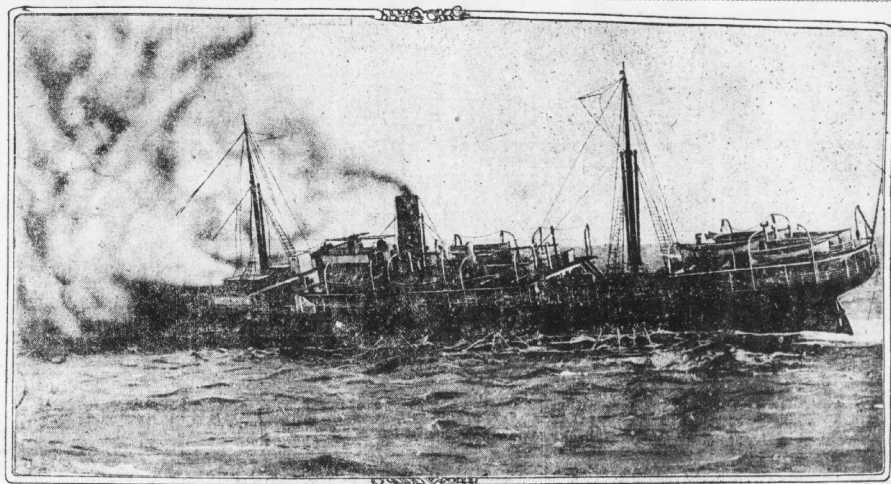

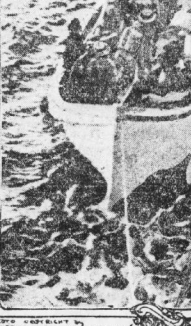

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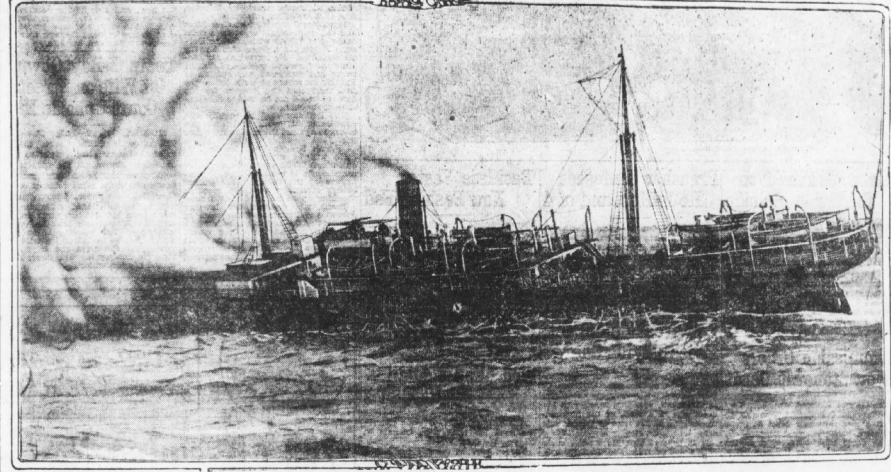

He also stated that he had heard of how she was murdered and declared that his knowledge of the case only through reading the papers.

Miss Leagon's mutilated body was found in a lonely prairie in the outskirts of Chicago after she had left her room to answer a mysterious letter, thought for a nurse. A nurse later found that she saw a copper-colored man in the neighborhood in the vicinity of where the young woman was murdered. They stated that they had seen a man in a dark coat and square-headed hat.

Answers Description.

The particular Henry talked to Chief Detective Landorf. The negro can give a satisfactory explanation of the man who was seen in the vicinity of where the young woman was murdered. That he is a white man, as was proven by a photograph of his Atlanta friends.

ATHENS COLLEGE DENOUNCED BY DR. NUNNALLY

All State Schools Are Declared Unfit for Religious Pupils by Church Worker.

Declaring that the University of Georgia and other schools operated by the State are unfit to train young men and women who are destined to become leaders in their life, Dr. C. A. Nunnally, educational secretary of the Georgia Baptist Executive Board, former president of Mercer University and one-time candidate for Governor of Georgia, made a vigorous attack on the State schools and colleges, speaking before the Atlanta Association of Baptist Churches in a convention at Fox College, Educational Institute Friday discussed the attitude with interest.

The lack of religious training in the State schools renders them unfit to educate our sons and daughters, Dr. Nunnally said as part of an address before the convention. 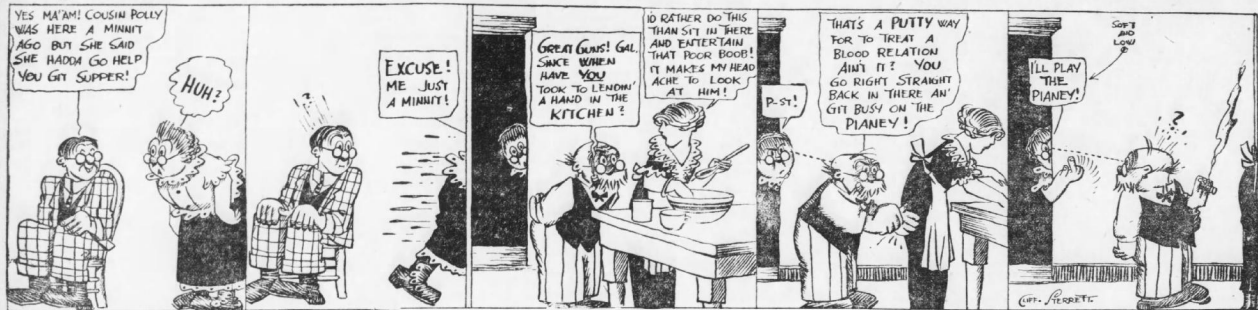
