Cooper suggested that he would probably plead self-defense for his client, bringing out the feature in Wilburn's own story which witnesses summoned by the defense were some of the man who testified yesterday for the State.

Chinese President Demands Power of Absolute Dictator

PEKING, Oct. 24.—President Yuan Shih Kai has issued a proclamation claiming the right to have a representative on the committee that is drafting the constitution, the right to appoint and dismiss cabinet members without the assembly's ratification, and the right to promulgate all laws, including the constitution. This amounts to claiming an unrestricted veto power.

U. S. LINERS SEIZED BY GUERRILLA

Peril to Foreigners Grows—Wife of Special Envoy Lind Virtually Made Prisoner.

VERA CRUZ, Oct. 24.—Felix Diaz, candidate for President of Mexico, has appealed to the United States for protection from assaults of General Huerta, and this has been promised him by Consul Canada. He was escorted late last night by American marines to the German Hotel, which is next door to the American Consulate. In case an attempt is made to arrest Diaz at the hotel, he can escape over the roof to the building which is American territory and which is protected by the United States flag.

Canal Means Most To South America, T. R. Tells Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO, Oct. 24.—An uninterrupted procession of honors are being showered upon former President Roosevelt in Brazil. Last night he delivered his speech on international relations. The Panama Canal he said, would lead to closer commercial relations between North and South America, of which South America would gain more benefits than would the United States. He referred to the interference of the United States in San Domingo and the withdrawal from Cuba as measures destined to work to the advantage of those nations and to inspire confidence in them. He said: "It does with their confidence if ever as regards any country intervention does unfortunately become necessary, I hope that wherever possible it will be a joint intervention of such powers as Brazil and the United States, without thought of the selfish aggrandizement of any of them, and for the common good of the Western World."

"I Am Glad It Is Over; I Know My Husband Is Morally Bravest Man," She Says.

NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—"Scores of letters came to my husband while he was being impeached threatening him with death. I am glad it is all over. I feel easier. My husband is morally the bravest man in New York, and I know he is going back to Albany," said Mrs. William Sulzer, wife of the ousted Executive. "My husband will go to Albany and fight for honest government," Mrs. Sulzer continued. "At first I opposed his running for the Assembly but he was so determined that I had to change my mind."

DORSEY PLANNING TO MEET NEW ATTACK ON CONLEY'S TESTIMONY

Only an agreement on a few disputed points remained to be accomplished on the resumption of the hearing on a new trial for Leo M. Frank Friday. The entire 115 hearings had been reviewed at the close of Thursday afternoon's session, but several of them were left unapproved to await an investigation of the records of the case by Solicitor Dorsey. The arguments were to start immediately on the approval of all the reasons. Two of the reasons, the alleged bias of A. H. Henslee and Marcus Johnenig, jurors, were held in abeyance until Judge Ross had looked over the affidavits of the defense and the counter-affidavits submitted by the Solicitor. The judge intimated that an approval of these as reasons on which to argue for a new trial would be tantamount to the granting of the motion, in that an acceptance of the charges of bias as facts automatically would furnish warrant for a new trial without argument by the attorneys.

Frank's lawyers sprang a surprise in the last of their long string of reasons, holding that by the State's testifier Jim Conley was an accomplice and that his testimony therefore could not be accepted except as corroborated by the circumstances or by another witness. The Solicitor remarked that he had not considered this proposition but would be prepared to talk on it later in the hearing. The reason charged that the court erred in not instructing the jury that if they believed from the evidence that Conley watched for Frank at the pencil factory door, and that his purpose in watching was to protect Frank in the commission of acts which constitute a felony in the State of Georgia, then Conley, as to any alleged murder committed in the progress of any such attempt to commit the acts, had been described by the negro, would be an accomplice, and the jury could not give him credence unless he was corroborated by the facts and circumstances or by another witness.

The announcement that the tempo of the crowds about the courthouse on the closing days of the trial was such that grave fears were entertained for the safety of Frank. Solicitor Dorsey contended that the defense had waived the presence of Frank in the courtroom at the time the verdict was rendered and now were taking advantage of it to claim that their client would have been mobbed or lynched had he been there, when, as a matter of fact, there is no way of proving that Frank might have received not even a hostile demonstration. A warm dispute arose over this contention, during which it developed that the court was adjourned in the midst of Dorsey's concluding argument Saturday noon to permit the intense feeling to subside, and that later Frank's presence at the rendering of the verdict was waived by his attorneys at the suggestion of Judge Ross himself. Judge Ross had been addressed by the editors of the three Atlanta newspapers, militia officials and the chief of the police department, and urged, it was claimed, to take every precaution for the safe-guarding of the prisoner, against whom there was unmistakably hostile sentiment. The hostile sentiment against Frank was emphasized in many of the reasons advanced for a new trial. To most of them Judge Ross certified an order that the defendant was not taken from his cell, and note made of the courtroom. The ovations received by Solicitor Dorsey were described in detail, and the occasion of applause and cheering inside the courtroom when Dorsey scored a point were stressed repeatedly.

Attention also was called to the jeers and derisive laughter that met many of the arguments of Frank's lawyers. From first to last, Frank's counsel contended, it was most evident that the defendant was not obtaining the fair and impartial trial guaranteed by the law. The jury was coerced into giving a verdict of guilty and would have done even so had no verdict, according to the defense. The climax, according to the reasons accompanying the motion for a new trial, came when the verdict was

American Liner Held By Huerta; Peril Grows.

Special Cable to The Atlanta Georgian. MEXICO CITY, Oct. 24.—The peril which has confronted American residents in Mexico was increased today. As a result of the receipt of news from Vera Cruz that the Mexican gunboat Zaragoza had seized the Ward liner Morro Castle, a United States ship, and the preparations which the American Consulate in Vera Cruz has made to protect Felix Diaz, the husband of the Mexican toward citizens of the United States, has been fanned to a higher pitch than at any time since the break between the Mexican and United States Governments occurred. The Government's explanation of the detention of the Morro Castle is that her captain was wanted to testify in a case of long standing. Government officials declared that the order for the appearance of Captain Huff in court was issued a week ago, but it is significant that the vessel was not served until the Morro Castle was ready to sail for Havana. The real reason for the hold-up of the vessel, however, is believed to be the fact that eight of the thirteen members of the Vera Cruz State Legislature had taken passage on the ship for Havana because of threats made against them for opposing Huerta's policies. Their flight is thought to have been the reason why the port authorities refused to give Captain Huff his clearance papers.

Piles of five, ten and twenty dollar notes were found hidden in a pistol case and samples of the alleged counterfeit notes were taken from their home. The Government agents said that the father sent his son to Berlin in order to learn engraving.

Warden Is Sure Man In Jail 17 Years Is Innocent of Crime

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24.—After serving seventeen years in the penitentiary for arson, a man 60 years old convinced Warden McKenty that he was not guilty of the crime of which he had been convicted. It was after the parole for the prisoner came that he insisted upon having a talk with the warden before leaving the prison probably for good. Warden McKenty refused to give his name. "He was convicted in Lancaster, Pa., of setting fire to a barn," said Warden McKenty. "He got 40 years. He had no money and his case was practically undefended. It was simply a case in which some person had to be punished, and this poor, illiterate man was practically sentenced to life imprisonment."

DOUBLE LIFE CHARGED TO EATON BY WIDOW



"Admiral Was Sometimes a Gentleman, and Sometimes Vildest of Vile." Says Woman's Defender.

PLYMOUTH, MASS., Oct. 24.—Admiral Francis T. Eaton, junior, counsel for Mrs. Eaton, widow of Admiral Eaton, in his opening address for the defense rebuffed parts of the story which the accused woman is to tell to the jury from the witness stand.

"We will show you that there was no friction, no misunderstanding on the day when the Admiral was taken away," he said. "We will show that every misstatement made by Mrs. Eaton about the Admiral have many foundations and facts that they were not intended for harm and that they were not hallucinations."

"We will show that he had a double life, that sometimes he was a gentleman, other times he was the vilest of the vile. We will show by the testimony of the physicians who attended his first wife and himself in Washington, D. C., that while his first wife was sick and on her deathbed, this man drank from morning until night and from night till morning and although in the very hour of death she was in his arms, he did not kiss her, he did not hold her to his breast, he did not do this habit, we will show from the men who served with him on the battleship Massachusetts that he had a double life."

SOLICITOR REPLEAS FACTORY EMPLOYEES TRIED TO BLOCK PROBE

Solicitor General Dorsey repeated at the hearing on a new trial for Leo M. Frank Friday his charges that friends of Frank and employees at the pencil factory had so concealed and withheld evidence during the murder mystery as to be conclusive indication that the defendant was the guilty person.

The defense was seeking to maintain its contention that the court was in error for allowing testimony and argument along this line when the Solicitor reiterated his belief. He said that the apparent unanimity with which friends and employees withheld information from the detectives made it convincing to his mind that there was a virtual conspiracy to protect the defendant.

"I hold that I had a right to state what I thought," he declared to Judge Roan.

"Maybe the Solicitor had no rights in the matter, but I think he had. Let them put in their reasons exactly what I said. I'm willing to stand by it."

The hearing was delayed considerably by continuous squabbles over minor points in the wording and phrasing of the defense's reasons.

Attorney Arnold and Solicitor Dorsey, as soon as the hearing on a new trial resumed Friday morning, were embroiled in an argument over the complete nature of the testimony which the stenographers had entered the objections of the defense during the trial.

Arnold maintained that the stenographers in many instances had entered in the record only the first objection made by a lawyer for the defense and had disregarded the additional objections that might have been made during the subsequent argument.

WILBUR TO SOON KNOW HIS FATE

Arguments Begin With No Direct Testimony From Defense in Jones County Slaying.

MACON, Oct. 24.—A Jones County Jury will decide late this afternoon or tonight the fate of Nick Wilbur, defendant in the slaying of Mrs. Jones.

Wilbur had carefully planned a defense, asserting self-defense and denying the confessions, but his counsel advised him that there was an element of self-defense in his case as indicated by the testimony. Wilbur then decided that he had better remain silent. Consequently, the defense did not offer any direct testimony and allowed the evidence submitted by the State to go to the jury unchanged except for cross-examination.

A subpoena issued by the State for the trial of Mrs. King, the woman charged with the slaying of her husband, was returned to the court yesterday.

Train Goes Through Bridge Weakened by Rain; Fireman Hurt

One man was injured and several hundred dollars damage was done Friday morning when a freight train of the Atlantic, Birmingham and Atlantic Railroad plunged into Tillman's Creek, near Manchester. The trestle over the creek had been weakened by rain.

Franklin Levi Hurler was caught in the wreckage and he reported serious injuries. Other members of the train crew jumped and escaped without injury. The station tender and several freight cars piled up in the creek.

Trains will be delayed by way of Woodbury, an additional distance of 12 miles, until the wreck is cleared and the trestle repaired.

Perfect Football Weather in Atlanta Promised Saturday

Fine football weather is promised by the forecaster for Saturday. The official prediction issued by Director van Meterman of the Atlanta Bureau Friday was:

SOLICITOR ARMED WITH SHEAF OF AFFIDAVITS TO DEFEAT REHEARING

With the grounds to be argued for a new trial settled upon at the close of the forenoon session of the Frank hearing in the State Capitol, the lawyers for the prosecution and defense made ready in the afternoon to begin the actual arguments for and against the motion of the defense.

Practically everything was cleared away except the reading of a few more of the affidavits against A. H. Hensley and Marcellus J. Henning, the two jurors accused of bias and prejudice in their consideration of the evidence. It was regarded as likely that the rehearing would conclude late Saturday afternoon.

Solicitor Dorsey, in spite of the defense's charges and evidence against Hensley and Henning, conceded nothing. He was prepared with a great sheaf of affidavits with which to support his arguments that neither of the attacked jurors was guilty of bias or prejudice when he went into the jury box. As this offered the possibility of being the point on which a new trial might hinge, the Solicitor was prepared to fight to the very last every contention of bias by the defense.

Attorney Rosser began the reading of the bias affidavits at 12 o'clock, immediately after the trial of the 115 reasons advanced by the defense had been accepted by Judge Roan. Most of them had been published in the newspapers. New affidavits testified to the presence in Albany, Ga., of Hensley on the date he denied he was there. Stiles Hopkins, member of the Rosser & Brandon law firm, appeared at the hearing with the register of the New Albany Hotel bearing the signature of Hensley at the departed time. This the defense contended, clinched the allegation that Hensley was there at the time he is reported to have made defamatory remarks about Frank. Among the remarks that Hensley was alleged to have made before the trial were that he "would like to break Frank's neck"; that he would like to bet a dollar that he would be on the Frank jury; that he believed Frank and no one else was guilty of the murder; and that if he was selected as a juror he would do his best to let a conviction.

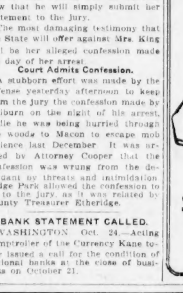

Object to Word "Employ"

For nearly an hour the attorneys wrangled over the use of the word "employed" in one of the reasons. The defense held that the word had been used in the indictment and that it was a difference over an extremely vital point, a compromise was reached by removing the phraseology of "employed" from the indictment and substituting the word "Frank had" in the indictment.

J. W. Coleman, master of the murdered Mary Phagan, was an interested spectator at part of the morning session. He was on hand when the hearing opened, and remained listening intently to the debate of opposing counsel until the middle of the forenoon.

Starna and Black Present

Detectives Starna and Black, who were assigned to Solicitor Dorsey to work under his direction on the investigation into the Phagan murder mystery, have been in constant attendance since the hearing began Wednesday.

"The negro woman made a good appearance," said Mrs. Pepin Friday morning, "and seemed to be just the woman I wanted. She remained with me for ten days and on the day on which she left did not miss anything."

MAYOR APPROVES NEW FACTORY LAW

Mayor Woodward has approved the city ordinance regulating sanitation and health in factories where women and girls are employed, and the Board of Health will be notified at its next meeting to enforce the law.

Chairman Claude L. Ashley, of the ordinance and ex-officio member of the Board of Health, said today that the recent strike at the Lion King and Cotton Mills revealed the need on the part of the city of laws to study factory conditions and to make an investigation of all plants in the city which would be immediately begun.

When the Board of Health meets on going to inform the members that it will make a personal investigation of factories where women are employed, he said, it will appoint a special committee to be authorized to make an official probe.

Ogling Starts Fight in Picture Theater; Belligerents Fined

W. J. Murray, motion picture show proprietor, and J. B. Bowen, a plumber, were fined \$5.00 each by Recorder Reeves Thursday afternoon for fighting before a panic-stricken audience in Murray's Whitehall Street Theater Tuesday night.

Murray stated to the court that Bowen was trying to oggle a young woman who sat next to him, and that when Bowen left the theater he (Murray) told Bowen he need not come again. He said that Bowen then called him a liar and struck him. Bowen told a different story, that he did look at a young woman, but that it was after Murray had been staring at her so long he thought something was the matter with her, so he took a look himself. Then, when he started out of the theater, he said Murray accused him of "ogling."

The fight followed, Recorder Reeves stated that he had known Bowen for 20 years and that he had always looked upon him as a gentleman and upright citizen. He recommended Murray for his actions and fined both for fighting.

SIDELIGHTS on GEORGIA POLITICS

By JAMES B. NEVIN

The Georgia Federation of Colored Women's Clubs has presented the Railroad Commission a petition that likely will receive the careful attention of that honorable body, and is almost sure to produce results commendable and worth while.

The petition asks better railroad accommodations in Georgia for colored passengers, without in any way suggesting a withdrawal of a single essential feature of the present segregation arrangements.

The petition asks among other things that the dome now separating (usually) the colored compartment from the white smoker be kept closed and that the colored section be provided with more than one lavatory.

These colored women, who represent in their federation the best element of negro population in Georgia, do not think that their cut-off section of the ordinary cars used for colored passengers should be made virtually a smoking car, which now is often a particularly in view of the fact that they are not permitted to use any other car, and they do not believe that it is right for them to be deprived of lavatory privileges, as they now almost invariably are. They hold that the sexes, at least, should be separated in these cars.

Chairman Chandler, of the Railroad Commission, believes this petition is in every way worthy of the most serious attention of the commission and he will give it consideration at the next meeting of the same.

He holds, as does practically every Southern white person, that the races must be separated on the trains, but that the colored passengers, nevertheless, should have reasonable comforts and accommodations while traveling.

Owner Underwood's forthcoming elevation to the United States Senate being accepted as a foregone conclusion in Washington, Representative William Charles Adamson's friends are boosting him for the Democratic floor leadership in succession to the Alabama.

Mr. Adamson is ranked on the Ways and Means Committee by Representative Hitchcock, and even if he is not named, a Southerner seems destined to win the big plum.

It may be noted as a fact, however, that the Adamson boom is a very real and a very live one, and he is looked upon as amply and completely qualified for the job.

Judge Adamson is now the chairman of the great Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee, and as such takes a very high stand in the House. He is a veteran in point of service and experience, and many members would like to see him made the party leader on the floor.

Governor John M. Slaton was the guest of honor at the Georgia State Fair in Macon Thursday. The day was especially set aside as "Governor's Day," and was so advertised in all the fair literature.

The Executive was accompanied to Macon by a number of his military staff officers and numerous friends.

Besides the Governor and the Atlanta party, there were politicians and statesmen, real and near, from all points of the State, gathered in Macon by special invitation to meet the Chief Magistrate and inspect the fair with him.

Indirectly, the big show is being held under the direction of the State.

The committee arranged to send out invitations to the thousands of members of the boys' corn clubs all over the State, and special invitations will also be sent to county school superintendents and farm demonstration agents as far former corn shows.

An interesting feature of Corn Show week will be an extensive moving picture, entitled "The Dawn of Plentiful." This is purely an agricultural picture, in which an interesting story is woven and will deal with the progress of agriculture from early days to the present. Plans are being made to have it presented either in the Grand Opera House or some other building that will accommodate the boys.

An announcement was made that the Southern Express Company has agreed to transport all exhibits for the corn clubs and the girls' canning clubs to Atlanta free of charge. This

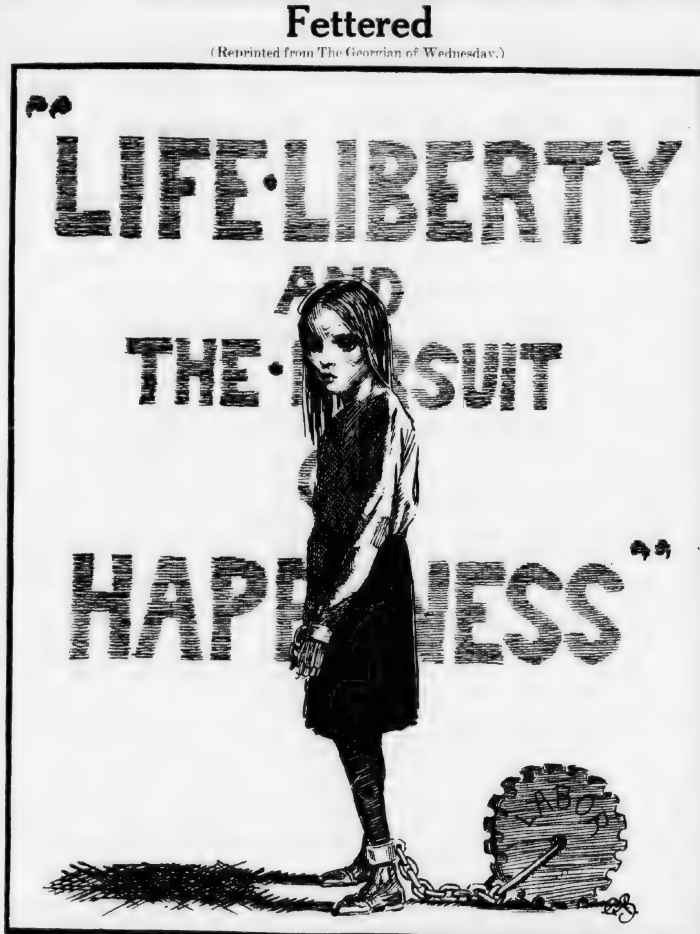

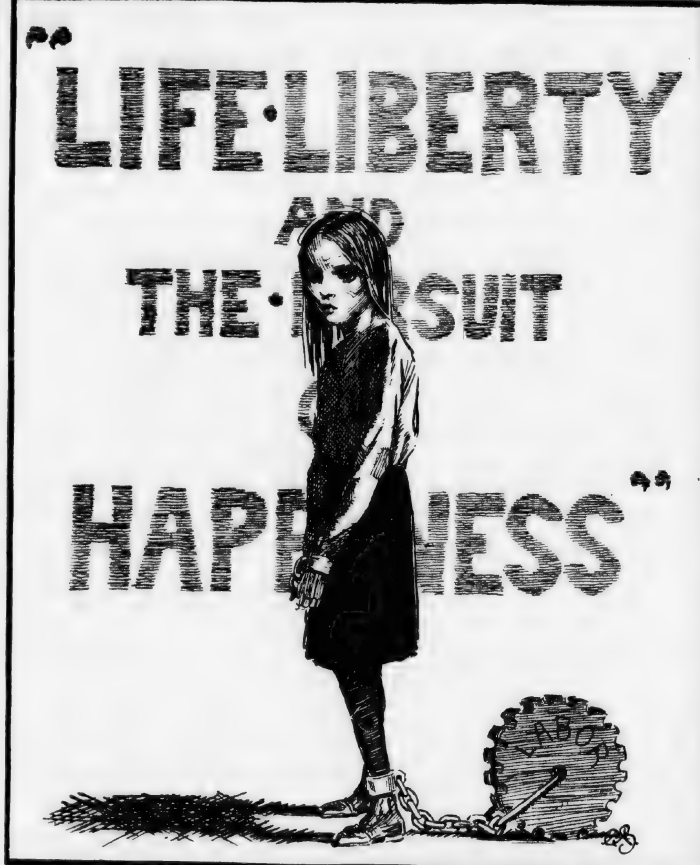
It is legally possible in Georgia for a tot of twelve to stunt and wear its little life and vitality away in a cotton mill!

ON THE Episcopal Convention Why "The American Church" Is an Unwise Name—Drnkness as a Divorce Ground; Make Separation More Difficult.

THE North-third annual convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church held its first session October 8. Its proceedings will be watched with interest. The two parties composing its membership are so nearly meshed numerically that the discussion engaged in will be of a seriousness and vigor that will draw to them the attention of all far and near, who are at all concerned in matters of church life and polity.

All Churches Interested in Episcopal Change of Name.

One of the questions that are to come up for debate has to do with the change of name. It is the desire of a considerable element of the Episcopal body that it should be rechristened under the title of "The American Church."

Although this is a matter in which Episcopalians themselves are primarily concerned and which it will be for them and for no one else, to decide, yet it is of interest to other denominations, whether Catholic or Protestant, and even to those who are not actively affiliated with any denomination.

The criticism which has been expressed that such a designation shows a leaning toward the union of Church and State has no great force, for the sharp discrimination which the two are too deeply imbedded in the American mind to allow of any solicitude in that direction, or to warrant the suggestion that any number of Episcopalians are pressing toward such an aim.

Blundering Marriages Only Serve to Feed the Divorce Courts.

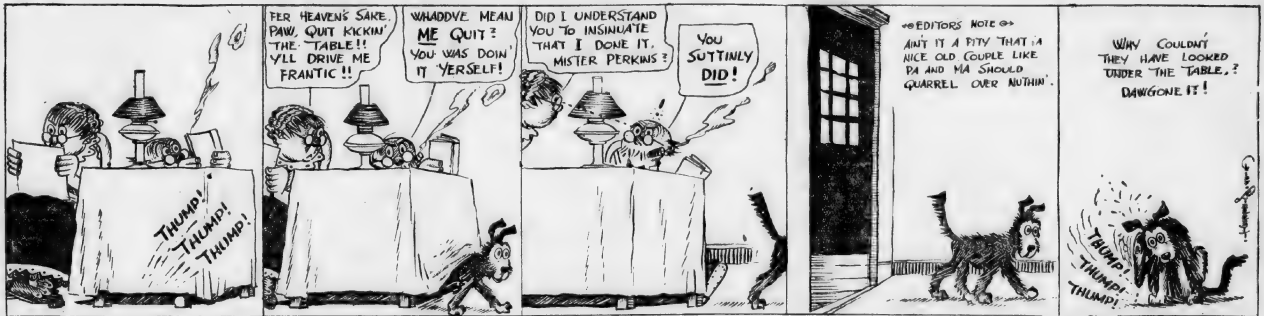
