Baptists and Methodists of Atlanta District, Each With 30 Churches and 12,000 Scholars, May Meet

CHALLENGE OF BAPTISTS WILL BRING ON THE FRAY

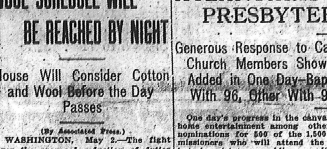
