"I HAVE DONE MY WORK," DECLARES CHIEF LANFORD, "IT IS NOW UP TO GRAND JURY FOR FURTHER ACTION"

The exclusive story in the Journal's home edition Friday afternoon, describing how the city detectives and their representatives dictographed Colonel Thomas B. Felder in Atlanta, has stirred the whole city. Chief Lanford stated Saturday that Mayor Woodward, C. C. Jones and others were also dictographed on the same day that Col. Felder was. The complete dictograph record of these conversations appears in today's Journal.

Chief Lanford Saturday morning made it known that Mayor Woodward, C. C. Jones, E. O. Miller and others were also dictographed. The records of their conversations are given elsewhere in today's paper. Chief Lanford did not discuss the substance of the mayor's dictographed conversation. He gave it as his opinion that the publication revealing Colonel Felder would do no harm or affect the work of the Bureau detectives in their investigation of the Phagan murder case. GRAFT AND CORRUPTION ARE CHARGED TO CITY DETECTIVES AND POLICE BY COL. T. B. FELDER

Attorney Who Was Dictographed by the Detectives Gives Out a Statement, Additional to the One He Made Friday Afternoon, in Which He Goes After Police and Detective Departments, and Intimates That More is to Come in the Sunday Papers

SAYS DETECTIVES ARE DESTROYING EVIDENCE AGAINST FRANK IN THE PHAGAN MURDER CASE

Attorney Thomas B. Felder, who has been charged by city detectives with attempting to bribe Chief of Detectives Lanford's secretary, G. C. Peabury, has made a statement additional to the one he made Friday afternoon, before the dictograph records in the Journal. The attorney's complete and detailed statement, in which he promises sensational exposures of the police, will be given the Sunday press. He says: "Colonel Felder asserts that the police department is corrupt and vile and that Atlanta is fostering a system like that of New York. I had informed the grand jury of the effect that the detectives have been destroying evidence against Leo M. Frank in the Phagan case."

"It was to obtain proof of this that I consented to visit A. S. Colyar's room at the Williams House on Wednesday afternoon. When I got there Colyar and Peabury claimed to have in their possession the police grafter's list. They also claimed to have affidavits showing the immorality of the two chiefs, Lanford and Beavers. They wanted me to buy these papers for \$1,000, and I, of course, refused. "They asked if I knew of any one, who would buy them. I told them that Mayor Woodward and Charles C. Jones, who were after the police officials, could take a fancy to public subscriptions to pay for the documents if they proved what Colyar and Peabury claimed them to be. "I told Colyar that I would introduce him to the gentlemen named, but that I would have to warn them that he is a crook and to be careful in dealing with him. They departed. I did not remain in the Williams House room for more than five minutes and I do not believe they had a dictograph there. Dictographs are not sold or rented to crooks and blackmailers to be used in a blackmailing scheme like these men were trying to perpetrate on me."

DORSEY STEERS CLEAR OF FELDER CONTROVERSY

Says He Will Not Allow Himself to Be Drawn Into Row of Attorney and Detectives

Solicitor General Hugh M. Dorsey said Saturday morning relative to the Felder affair: "This controversy will have no bearing on the prosecution of any one who may be indicted in the Phagan case. I have no reason to question the good faith and integrity of Colonel Thomas B. Felder. Also, I am certain the city detectives are not double-crossing or misleading me as has been suggested. Mr. Dorsey would make no statement relative to the grand jury following Chief Lanford's suggestion that it was "up to them to act" in the Felder matter. In the dictograph manuscript which purports to contain a conversation between Attorney Felder, A. S. Colyar, Chief of Detectives Lanford, Williams House No. 2, Mr. Felder is quoted as saying he could "control" among other officials, the solicitor general. Chief Lanford is quoted as saying in reply: "If there is no use for me to deny any such remarks as those attributed to me, I will not say anything. I do not wish to express my opinion in the matter of the affair except what is generally known to the public. I do not attempt to show graft or fraud on the part of the city police or to discredit the city police. I have only to say that I am satisfied with the action of the grand jury in the Phagan case. Colonel Felder had made my explanation in regard to the prosecution of the case. "The latest conference I had with Chief Lanford was when I stated to him that I had no objection to his coming to my home had Sunday night to confer with me on the Phagan case. I announced publicly some time ago, I worked with him as I have done with other indicted men in probing the matter. I received that information from other sources, but kept my own theories and results of investigations to myself."

DISCUSS FUTURE OF W. & A. RAILROAD

A suggestion that a convention be called in Atlanta of representative southern business men to consider the future of the Western and Atlantic railroad was made Friday afternoon at a meeting of the W. & A. railroad committee at the chamber of commerce. The chairman, W. A. Wimball, read a carefully prepared statement which showed that, while the loss of the road does not expire until 1915, yet it would be advisable to begin consideration of future action at once. Whether the road shall be released or taken over by the state, whether it shall be extended to the sea, whether it shall be leased for a long or short term, whether the terms of the lease should be included in the lease, whether the road should be sold to the W. & A. railroad, or whether there were some of the problems, presented by the chairman, were discussed. The committee suggests that a convention be held soon to look into the matter more fully and to invite the cooperation of other commercial bodies in the south.

NEW LEE WILL GIVE CONVICTING EVIDENCE, ATTORNEY INDICATES

HE LISTENED TO DICTOGRAPH ON COL. THOS. B. FELDER
Bernard L. Chappell, Lawyer for Negro Suspect, Declares His Client's Testimony to Be Invaluable to the Case

Bernard L. Chappell, attorney for New Lee, the negro suspect in the murder of Mary Phagan, has declared that his client will give convincing evidence as to the identity of the murderer.

"I consider his testimony the strongest evidence to the public against the guilty party," said Mr. Chappell, "and the jury would see him released and give the guilty party a chance to get his hands on Lee, I, his attorney, would advise a warrant to hold him for the murder of Mary Phagan."

He is to be interviewed from the tone of Mr. Chappell's card that Lee has given every indication of being truthful to the detectives. Mr. Chappell's card to the Journal follows:

"To the Journal: I request that New Lee, the negro suspect in the Mary Phagan case, should be set free. It is wrong to keep a man in jail who has given every indication of being truthful to the detectives. I am sure that the jury would see him released and give the guilty party a chance to get his hands on Lee, I, his attorney, would advise a warrant to hold him for the murder of Mary Phagan."

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
