Letter to Sidney Ballou Read Before Senate Lobby Probe Saying Press Service Had Guaranteed 50,000 Lines

DR. WILEY AGREED TO
LECTURE FOR LOBBY?

Correspondence Says That the Pure Food Man Had Made Proposition Which Was Accepted; Later Wiley Declined

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, June 15.—More letters from the lobby to the pure food man "lobby" put into the hands of the senate investigating committee today supported to show that the lobby had guaranteed 50,000 lines of space in the Republican newspaper for the lobby. Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, former pure food chief, to deliver before the senate committee, Dr. Wiley's former President Taft's ability to carry on a campaign in California, Idaho and Colorado and added, "I do not believe that we will be able to get a promise relative to the sugar and to the industrial lobby."

Henry T. O'Neal and Truman O. Palmer, attorneys for the lobby, advised that the committee had no authority to bring before it any evidence in the present session of congress on the ground that it was authorized only to investigate a lobby threatened pending legislation. CARNEGIE'S GIFT
TO VANDERBILT IS
SCORED BY BISHOP

Bishop W. A. Candler Declares \$1,000,000 to Vanderbilt University Is Not 'a Donation, but a Denaturing'

'IMPUDENT PROPOSAL OF
AGNOSTIC STEEL-MONGER'

Declares Carnegie Is Dangling Money Before Public to Influence Decision in Litigation Pending Over University

The recently announced gift of \$1,000,000 to the Vanderbilt university, of Nashville, Tenn., by Andrew Carnegie is in the opinion of Bishop W. A. Candler, not so much a donation to the university as an attempt to "denature the institution." The gift, which was announced last week, is the subject of a letter from the bishop to the trustees of the university. The bishop declares that the gift is not a donation, but a denaturing of the university. He also declares that the gift is an impudent proposal of an agnostic steel-monger, and that it is an attempt to influence the decision in a litigation pending over the university.
