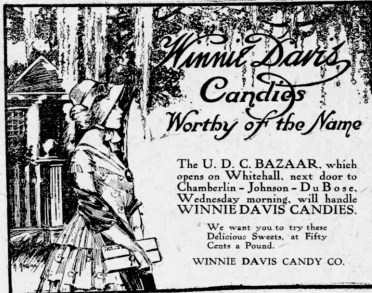

NEW PLEDGES MADE FOR GA. COMMERCE CHAMBER

Enthusiastic Meeting Held, Joseph A. McCord and J. K. Orr Speak

Subscriptions amounting to over \$1,000 a year for three years, bringing the total to about \$3,000 for that period, were pledged as Atlanta's share toward the upkeep of the Georgia chamber of commerce at a luncheon given at the Hotel Astor Tuesday afternoon.

This money is to be a part of the annual \$50,000 subscription fund to be raised by the people of Georgia to perpetuate the work of the chamber of commerce and assist in the fight to keep back the pending invasion of the lily weevil.

The campaign to raise further subscriptions in Atlanta will be continued during next week, when special committees will make a thorough canvass of the city. Many big financial houses, bank corporations, and scores of individuals are prepared to add their names to the list of subscribers. The names of all who subscribe will be published.

J. K. Orr presided over the meeting and the only other speaker was Joseph A. McCord, vice president of the United National bank. In all, there were about seventy guests.

Following the address of Mr. McCord urging an immediate fight on the impending lily weevil, Mr. Orr began talking. Before any one realized how successful he had been, the chairman had taken ten \$100 subscriptions for a period of three years, the money to be used to protect Georgia's cotton crop. Some contributions were in cash and some in kind, with the result that the meeting had pledged \$1,625 a year for three years.

This amount, however, will be only a small part of what the city of Atlanta will contribute as the chamber of commerce has yet to go around and secure hundreds of other pledges.

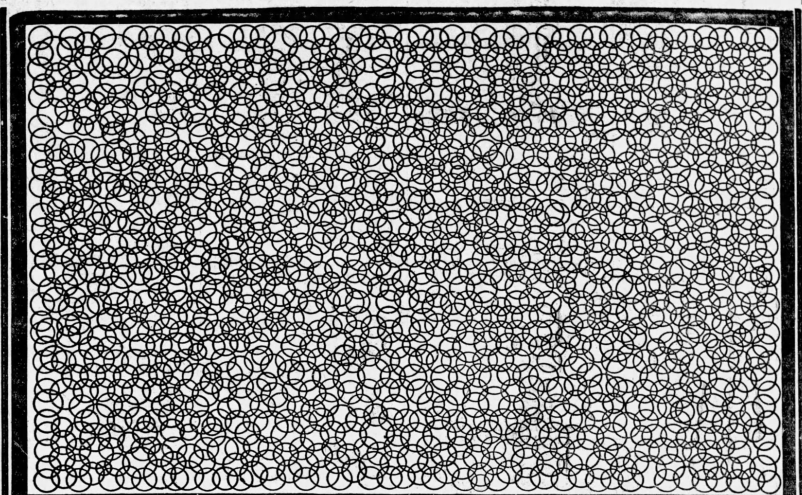

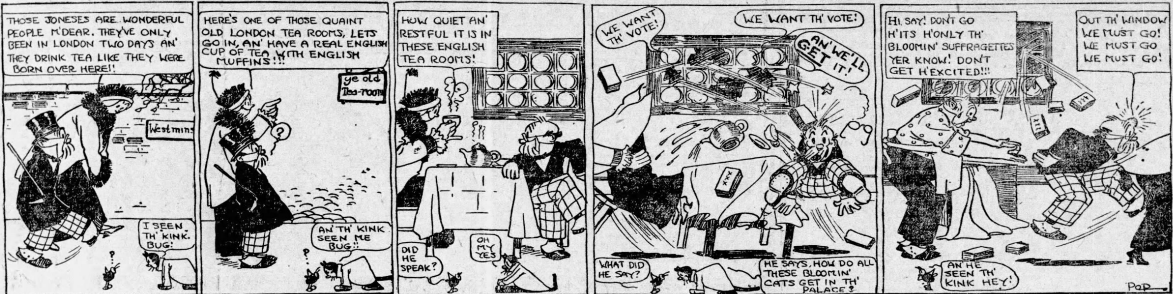

Dixie Products 'Big Tent Stars' \$300,000 YEARLY IS NATION'S GOLF COST

NEW YORK, Dec. 3.—Switching the calcium from the aridion to the trees and putting greens, one discovers there are more golfers than baseball players in the United States today and that the golfing fever is spreading through the nation.

One also discovers that the 2,000,000 golfers of both sexes in this country spend approximately \$300,000 a year in pursuit of the little white ball, a staggering, almost unbelievable total, yet one which is arrived at after the compilation of the most accurate statistics from unquestionable sources.

There are more than 7,000 clubs in the country now where the membership is composed very largely of golfers. New clubs are springing up each year. The membership of the clubs now in existence runs from 100 to 750. Averaging the golfing members of each club at \$400, it means that there are 1,400,000 men and women who are devoted to the Scotch game.

There are at the very least 600,000 persons in the country who play golf, but do not belong to any clubs. They play most of their games on public links, which, until lately, have established, although they often play on this link or that, those who are members of the clubs.

The average golf course rent a club member must pay is \$25. His dues at the most conservative estimate are \$25. Even the most careful regular golfer will use up one ball a week, which means about forty balls a year, average, and the golfing year at forty weeks, although it very often exceeds that figure. Forty balls will cost the golfer \$20 at the cost least, as the most expensive balls are 50 cents each. Carrying charges average from 50 to 75 cents per dozen, which means about \$25 more a year. Most of the regular golfers get a new set of clubs each year at a cost of between \$25 and \$50, but assuming that they get a new set only every other year, it means an average of \$25 for clubs each year of about \$20.

Not only does the cost of the club in another big item of expense. At the very least, the average golfer spends \$20 on each trip for incidental expenses of each trip an ordinary golfer makes 20 times a year. At a round trip of 20 cents a week means that the golfer does out \$9 a week for transportation.

All of these figures are extremely conservative, yet they show that each club golfer spends about \$20 yearly, which makes a grand total of \$200,000,000 for the 10,000,000 golfers spread each year.

The cost to the non-club golfer is somewhat less. He does not have to pay the club fees or for rental of the links.

FATE OF OUTLAW KNOWN WHEN MINE IS RE-OPENED

Man Hunt in Utah Near End, Believed Lopez Now Dead From Fumes

BINGHAM, Utah, Dec. 2.—The fate of Ralph Lopez, slayer of six men, today remained a question which only the removal of the bulkheads and a search of the now blocked Utah-Apex mine, where he took refuge, would answer. Fumes from wet gunpowder were also directed into the underground corridors. These fumes hang close to the floor beneath the lighter gases that have been pouring into the mine since yesterday morning. It was expected the powder fumes would settle into several blind stops not yet penetrated by charges of dynamite.

The seven sheriffs in charge of the man hunt are convinced that Mike Cravovich, who recently shot and secured the wounds of several men, is the mine. Failure of Lopez to attempt a dash from the mine led some to the belief that the renegade outlaw intended to make a secure retreat from the gases.
