Merchants' Trade Week Twice Every Year, Now Planned By Association

Reports of Increased Business Bring Decision to Invite Retailers to Atlanta Next February

That the house sales of Atlanta wholesalers have been doubled during the past year by the friendly overtures from those business men to the southern retailers, was reported by Secretary Harry T. Moore at the 1913 annual meeting and banquet of the Atlanta Merchants and Manufacturers' association in the Piedmont hotel Tuesday night. It was decided to make "Merchants' week" in Atlanta semi-annual instead of a yearly affair, and to hold the next in the week beginning February 16.

Plans were begun at once for that occasion. Atlanta's cordiality toward her merchant visitors in the past will be increased, and an entertaining program will help to express her welcome to them. At C. W. McClure's suggestion, the local wholesalers will put on especially attractive prices for the week. The showing of spring goods will be complete.

The February "Merchants' Week" was recommended by the board of directors. For several years past the southern merchants have been entertained in Atlanta every two years, and a February meeting was held, too. There was no practical discussion of the directors' recommendation. Tuesday night, but it concluded in a unanimous and enthusiastic vote that the matter is well worth the cost.

"I've had twice as many merchants to call on me at my store, and I've done at least 50 per cent more business this November than I did last year," said C. W. McClure.

Other merchants reported similar good results from the association's activity. The association's offer to all southern merchants is that it will refund the railroad fare both ways of any merchant who comes to Atlanta and buys as much as a \$1,000 bill of goods from members.

The advertising committee reported that during the past year it had used 4,000 inches of space in daily and weekly newspapers and thirty-five solid pages in trade journals; and that it has distributed 15,000 pages of advertising literature among a selected list of 20,000 southern merchants.

Another report was that 2,000 merchants registered and were entertained here during the August "Merchants' week."

A campaign for new members was decided upon. Every merchant and manufacturer in Atlanta will be invited to join the association. Secretary W. H. Lewis of the industrial statistics bureau of the Atlanta chamber of commerce promised aid in this movement.

A resolution offered by E. L. Adams, favoring penny postage for freights small and remitting charges, was adopted and representatives to aid in the passage of bills now pending for that purpose were adopted unanimously.

The following directors, who will choose officers for the coming year at a later meeting, were chosen: E. L. Adams, H. H. Baugh, H. M. McLean, H. E. Choate, E. L. Rhodes, E. G. Thomas, W. R. Houghton, J. E. Little, Sanders Jones, L. W. Brown, F. M. Hudson and Henry Wyatt. Mr. Orr, acting president, was made an ex-officio member of the board of directors.

Before 2 o'clock this morning one of the young ladies selling Red Cross Christmas seals for the benefit of the Atlanta Anti-Tuberculosis association, had sold \$7 worth and returned to headquarters in the ladies' sector on the Piedmont hotel for a fresh supply.

This incident is indicative of the rush with which the campaign for the general sale of the seals opened today under the chairmanship of Mrs. C. C. Booth. The young lady members of the Red Cross committee responded promptly and before noon there were fifty or sixty of them on the streets and in the stores, all earnestly offering the seals to every possible prospective buyer.

The general committee is encouraged over the beginning of the campaign and is confident 1,000,000 seals will be sold in Atlanta this year. The first distribution of seals to the young ladies of Mrs. Booth's committee was made by noon it was necessary to make a second distribution of 50,000. There is intense rivalry between the committees to see which can report the best results.

Mrs. Hugh M. Willet, general chairman of the volunteer workers, will be at headquarters daily to assist in the work and receive reports.

Wade Conditling, who has charge of this feature of the work, will distribute the seals to the principals of all the schools Friday and they will be placed with the teachers, who will divide them among the children.

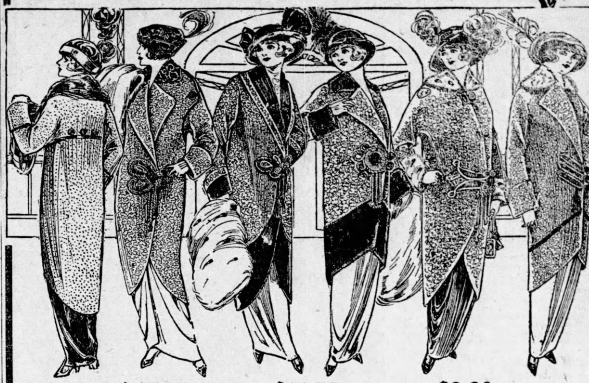

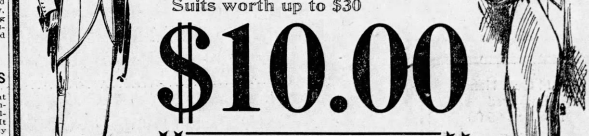

HEAD OF VICE SQUAD IS REMOVED FROM HIS JOB

Police Board Names Patrolman J. A. Hollis to Succeed J. W. Barfield

The demotion of J. W. Barfield, for some time head of the famous vice squad, and the adoption of a report favoring the creation of an inspector, who will endeavor to reduce the number of arrests, featured Tuesday evening's meeting of the board of police commissioners.

Barfield lost his position when the office of roundman, which he held, was abolished and the office of sergeant created. While A. D. Lusk and George American Madison were elected sergeants when the former office was abolished, the board voted not to elect Barfield with them, and J. A. Hollis, a patrolman, who is also the head of the Police Relief association, was named to the third vacancy.

Eight members of the board, including Chairman Carlos Mason, voted for the demotion of Barfield, and Mason, in explaining the vote, asserted most positively that it was not a slight on the crusade of Chief Beavers.

"Barfield," said Chairman Mason, after the action of the board, "is very unpopular with a majority of the uniformed force. I have never talked to the plain-clothes men upon him.

WOULD CREATE DISCORD. "His election would have been certain to create discord among the members of the force, which would have proved to the best interest of the department. I and other members who voted as I did strongly and emphatically recommended Barfield for the office."

Chief J. L. Beavers had recommended the three roundmen for election as sergeants, but when the board voted not to name Barfield, he was called upon to recommend another man for the vacancy, and his choice was Patrolman Hollis. Hollis has been working as head of the plain clothes squad, while Barfield will be on duty watch as a call officer. The abolition of the office of roundman and the naming of the new head of the uniformed force as sergeant is largely a technical change, carrying with it a slight increase in pay.

The board Tuesday evening adopted the recommendation of a committee headed by Commissioner Pate and an appropriation for an inspector or inspector of police to be named from the city council when the 1914 budget is made up.

SEEK TO REDUCE ARRESTS. The principal duty of the proposed official will be an investigation of all cases with a view to the elimination of all unnecessary or frivolous arrests. According to the plan of Mr. Pate, this officer should thoroughly investigate cases before they are placed on the recorder's court docket, and if the arrest is not justifiable in the inspector's opinion, no case will be docketed. He will also be working to an advantage in many other cities.

Philip Wentner, of the Prison Association of Georgia, appeared to urge the adoption of the plan. He quoted statistics, showing Atlanta has many more arrests than other cities of the same population, and also that the recorder's court files in Atlanta are the largest in the amount of the fines imposed annually by the many police magazines in New York.

Mayor James O. Woodward, who was present at the meeting, declared he was heartily in favor of the plan. He said that he would support the plan if it meant the reduction of arrests, saying that the man who kept order on his beat, by the best police force in the city, made the best police force in the city.

"Some arrests in Atlanta are unnecessary," said the mayor, "and the number of prisoners taken annually can be easily reduced. But it can be done most easily by appointing an inspector. It can be done by Chief Beavers, who has controlled the situation better than an inspector and it is up to him to take Atlanta from the head of the criminal statistics column."

Chief Beavers, following the mayor's statement, told the board he had been doing every thing in his power to cut down the number of arrests.

"The cutting down of the number of arrests in a department the size of Atlanta has to be done by degrees," said the chief, "and I am doing it just as rapidly as possible."

On the motion of Commissioner Clarke, he elected assistant to the chief of police, and the board adjourned. The board also appointed from the eligible list of ten extra supernumeraries, who will work principally with the traffic squad during the holiday season.

Patrolman Bailey Sends Resignation to Board The resignation of Patrolman S. H. Bailey was accepted by the board of police commissioners at Monday's meeting, with the words "with pleasure" accompanying the action.

Bailey was brought to the police headquarters early Monday morning in an alleged condition of intoxication and stripped of the insignia of his rank by the board.

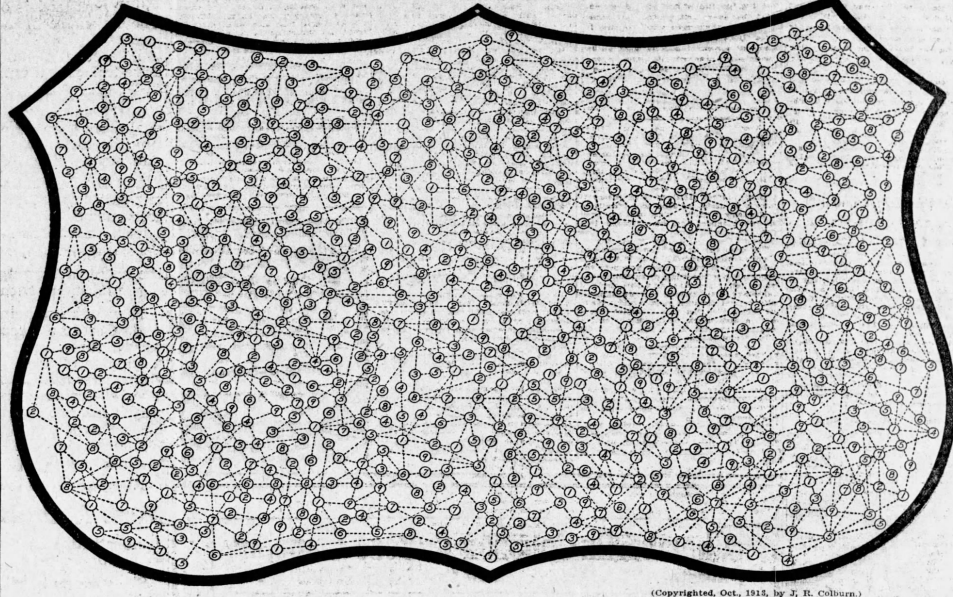

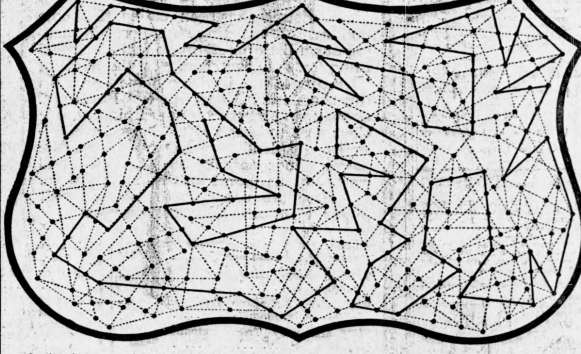

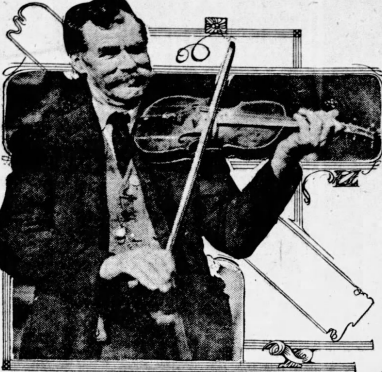
