## ATLANTA'S GIFTS WERE ALL RECEIVED BY THURSDAY NOON

Postoffice and Express Company, With Huge Force of Men, Have Cleared Shelves of All the Bundles

MAIL THREE TIMES AS HEAVY AS LAST YEAR

Express Company Added Many Men to Its Roster and Auto Trucks Hurred Presents to Atlanta People

Carriers of the Atlanta postoffice delivered all Christmas mail by seven o'clock Wednesday night, and were delivering the Christmas parcels by 7 o'clock Thursday morning.

Not a scrap of Christmas mail remained in the postoffice at noon, and agents and clerks were resting from labor that have been unceasing since all Friday.

The Southern Express company had cleared all express parcels by noon in handling the Christmas packages, the mail used twenty-five wagons and five automobile trucks.

The mail delivered in three days as great as the mail last Christmas was, has been neither delay nor confusion. This is due to the supervision of Postmaster Bolling H. Hise, and the assistance of Superintendent of Mails I. G. Hart, and chief carrier under him.

HEAVY FLOOD OF MAIL On the five days before Saturday, 12,978 letters and Christmas cards and 124,000 packages have been received and delivered by the postoffice.

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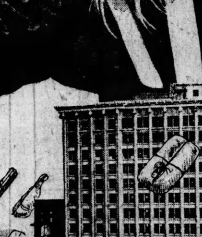

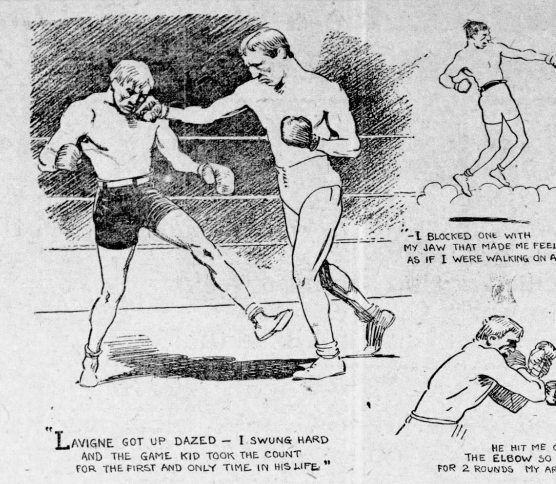

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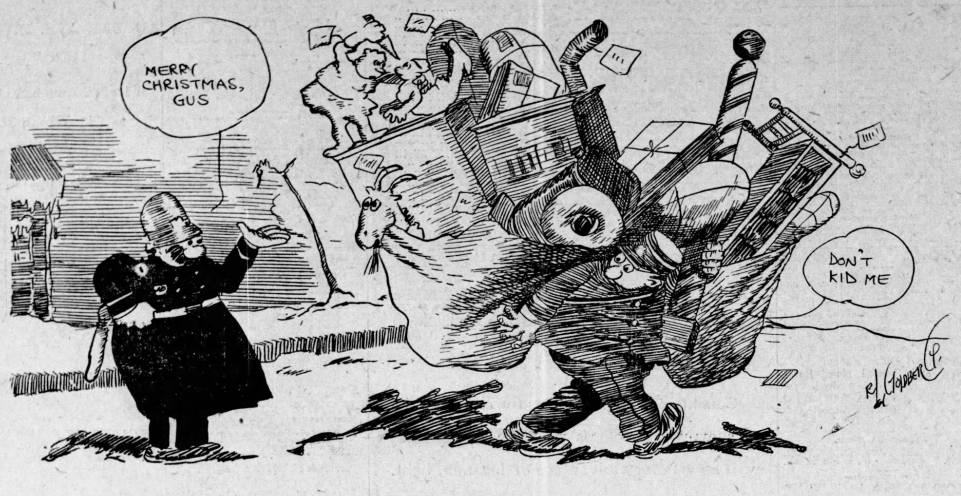

The Real Estate Field

Real Estate Agents as a Whole Are Spending a Happy Christmas, With Every Hope That the New Year Will Bring a Revival of Activity—Some Indications That Point to an Improved Condition of Real Estate Market in 1914

Most of the real estate offices were closed on Christmas day, and if any agents compared with ordinary years, say like came down it was to open their mail and leave again. The real estate fraternity as a whole is spending a happy Christmas, with every hope that the new year will bring a revival of activity and a steady outlook for a rising market. Business has been off in 1913, as compared with boom times like those

of 1912, but it hasn't been so bad, as compared with ordinary years, say like 1908 and 1909. Prices have held up remarkably well, and the bargain hunter hasn't found much satisfaction. The market looks for decidedly better money conditions after the first of the year. At that time dividends are disbursed and funds seek reinvestment. The passage of the currency bill, and the proof that a democratic tariff hasn't

spoiled ruin to the country, have been encouraging events, and some well posted men believe that the country is on the eve of its most prosperous decade.

Cheaper money, which seems assured by the reconstruction of one or two large insurance companies in the real estate market, as well as the offering of private funds, will put life in building operations, which have been off during the year.

But better than these various manifestations is the wonderful cotton crop of Georgia, which will go to 2,600,000 bales, the second largest yield on record, and will bring close to \$200,000,000 to Georgia. This is not saying anything about a record corn crop for the state, as well as an unusual diversity of crops.

As for Atlanta itself, the town continues to grow, more people are coming here to enter business and to find homes, and this means steady enlargement for property. A growing city in the 200,000 class soon passes old realty values and establishes new ones. Real estate can't stand still for any length of time.

All the record rooms including the building inspector's office, were closed, so there were no building permits or property transfers.
