These and other requirements will go far toward putting an end to wild cat schemes. Explorers of Today.

The Seriousness of a City's Play.

Progressive cities the country over are more and more thought to public recreation nere maintenance of parks and playgrounds, it is being realized, will not suffice the community's need for free and wholesome amusement. Back of all such enterprises and running through them, there should enterprises and running through them, there should be some definite governing purpose, some means of bringing them into useful relationship and making them count more richly for the common life. With this end in view, it has been proposed in Louisville, Ky., that a municipal Board of Recreation.

be formed, made up of five members, the Courier Journal tells us, "one of whom shall be a member of the board of park commissioners, one a member of the board of education, one a member of the board of board of education, one a member of the board of runtees of the free public library, one a member of the board of public safety, and the fifth to be a pri-vate citizen interested in recreation work." This new board, it is proposed, shall serve without pay, shall have charge of playgrounds, baths and other centers of recreation and shall sine be empowered to inspect such places of amusement as dance hall, pictures shows and pool rooms. The Courier-Journal makes the comment that such work properly conducted would "correlate the recreation activities of the city with much more consistency and efficiency than can be secured by the present scattered and haphazard methods."

This plan is interesting for what it suggests rather than for what it actually embodies. A community's play, whether it be that of the children or their elders, should certainly be under sympathetic. their elders, should certainly be under sympathetic, competent supervision. Every sphere of a city's life is concerned in its plays. Parks and playgrounds are as much a part of the system of education as are the schools themselves; obviously, too, they are related to the interests of public health; at vital points they use the department of public safety and they have weighty bearing upon public morals. Of all municipal duties, therefore, once is more important and fewer as of arcraching as that which pertains to public recreation.

Some time ago Manager Carey, of Atlanta's park department, and the well considered suggestion that the province of this apeartment be widened so as to ficilized all fields of common amusement. The park department, he held, is the logical agency to supervise all places to which the public looks for amusement—picture shows, dance halls and the like. He urged

department, he held, is the logical agency to supervise all places to which the public looks for ammement—pleture shows, dance halls and the like. He urged turthermore that censorship should concern itself not only with the moral side of such amusements, but also with their sanitary and hygienic aspect; for instance, that amusement halls, to whatever particular purpose they might be devoted, be well weatilated, free from dangers of fire or panic and so conducted as to give patrons an honest return for their money.

These ideas, it will be noted, are parallel to those most advanced in Louisville and discussed with growing seriousness throughout the country. They signify an increasing demand for more efficient treatment of the public recreation problem. Play is a determining factor in the community's life as well as the child's life; and, paradoxical though it may seem, play should be seriously regarded. Certainly it should be directed, where the people as a whole are concerned, with a view two wholesome, enriching results. And this requires an intelligent covelation of the various oversibit.






