The Journal's Letter Box

Dr. Elliot and His Critics.

Editor The Journal: I was much interested in the criticisms appearing in Sunday morning's Journal of the recent utterance of Dr. Charles W. Elliot on what he calls "twentieth century religion."

The point of view from which I would briefly discuss the matter is that of the man in the street. It is not intended particularly in theological disquisitions, but rather in the light of common sense.

We live under a social evolution that is as old as humanity. That evolution gained a great impetus from the reformation of the sixteenth century.

Everyone who reads this will readily recall that the Master himself did not spend much time in the theological discussion. He laid emphasis on the law and the prophets.

The intellect of the present day is not to be compared with the intellect of the ancient Greeks, whether or not the present day is more civilized than theirs.

The ALTRUISTIC SPIRIT IS NEVER BORN OF THE INTELLECT. To refer to the intellect as the source of the altruistic spirit is to make a statement which is not only untrue, but also dangerous.

Certainly, we shall have a "twentieth century religion," or an eighteenth century religion; but it will not be the peculiar product of the twentieth century, and it will not be the result of the intellect.

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SANITARY RIVER SURVEYS

B. FREDERIC J. HASKIN. II.—PRELIMINARY STUDIES.

With the dissemination that diluted sewage adds, nothing adds to the general consciousness of the American in his habits have sought one or two of these establishments.

Popular appreciation of the disadvantages of general drinking water is of comparatively recent date. Generally, the purity or impurity of the water supply has been a matter of indifference among the people.

The purpose of this last investigation was to fulfil the obligations of the waterways treaty of January 11, 1909, between the United States and Great Britain, concerning the protection of international waters.

It was found that dangerous sewage pollution exists in certain localities in the Great Lakes, especially in the neighborhoods of the cities, and in all the connecting waterways.

The examination of the water was essentially a bacteriological one. Samples were collected from 1,447 sampling points, and were analyzed for the presence of bacteria.

Results obtained showed the great bulk of the water of Lake Michigan to be pure, with slight pollution due to boat traffic, while the Detroit river, the western end of the Lake Erie, and the Niagara river showed serious pollution.

Zones of pollution in the lakes extended along the shores and around the mouths of the rivers. The coldest water was found in the upper part of the lake, and the warmest in the lower part.

Impurity of the water around the intakes of the municipal water systems was found to be so high in certain localities that it was necessary to provide for some means of purification.

Dr. McLaughlin made his survey of the Missouri river in 1912 upon the request of Dr. S. J. Crumback, secretary of the state board of health of Kansas, and with the cooperation of the sanitary authorities of Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and Iowa.

The general conclusion reached following this investigation was that there has been an undue prevalence of typhoid fever for years in every city having its water supply from the Missouri river.

The condition of the Missouri water was examined in 1912 upon the request of Dr. S. J. Crumback, secretary of the state board of health of Kansas, and with the cooperation of the sanitary authorities of Kansas, Nebraska, Missouri and Iowa.

All cities situated upon the river discharge their sewage into it, and most of them draw their water supplies from the main source. This sewage discharge into the Missouri river has been a serious cause of pollution.

That sewage pollution is also Missouri river is general from Sioux City to its mouth, and greatest in the vicinity of cities and packing houses. It is a discovery that the present method of sewage disposal is not adequate for the purification of drinking water in operation before 1910.

### Feds Transfer Toronto Team To Brooklyn

After Two Days' Negotiations With Brooklyn Capitalists' Move is Made-Club Will Establish Playing Grounds on Site of Old Washington Park

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Apologizing for his persistent denials during the week of the intention of the Federal League to place a club in Greater New York, President James A. Gilmore tonight announced the new organization had invaded Brooklyn and by the middle of April would have a club established there with playing grounds on the site of the Brooklyn Park old quarters at Washington park.

### TRASHY'S PORT TARGETS

It is a pretty tough assignment for a fellow to sit down and reason it out to himself, that he is "through" on any calling that he has been following out through a number of years. He goes back with a batting average for last season some better than anything he has done since he first stuck under the big top. It is a mark of 332 bang up in one to the best minor league in the country—a circuit in which only seven men got above the .300 mark, of which under three besides himself are mentioned.

What is more, the old war horse led the shortstops of the league with an average of .302. In sixty games he made only fourteen mistakes on the difficult position. He also managed to beat the catchers three or four times in ten times in stealing bases, leading a dozen of sprightly youngsters, who ought to have distanced him by a couple of city blocks.

### Affairs Settled Baseball Men Quit New York

Gathering Which Has Made Diamond History Is Breaking Up-Settled That Federals Will Enter Brooklyn and That John Evers Will Play With Boston

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—With the Federal league baseball circuit practically settled, so that organized baseball knows what it has to contend with and John J. Evers signed with the Boston Nationals for four years at \$10,000 a year and a big bonus, the ranks of the baseball men who have been here for nearly a week began to thin out today.

President Charles Ebbets, of the Brooklyn Nationals, does not appear particularly at the Federal invasion. "Let them come in," he said, "when he heard the news, 'I have no force around Brooklyn but I'll give them a good fight.'"

The makeup of the Federal league circuit as announced here is Brooklyn, Pittsburgh, Buffalo and Baltimore in the east, and Chicago, St. Louis, Kansas City and Indianapolis in the west. The schedule meeting of the Federal league will be held in Baltimore the second week in March.

Charles A. Murphy, of the Chicago Nationals, has thus far received no response in the offer made by the National League by which Evers goes to Boston and Evers and Evers who were to be sent to Chicago for Evers, remained with the Boston club, the league decided.
