CONGRESSMEN LINING UP ON EXEMPTION OF TOLLS

Wilson Promised Support in Move to Repeal Provision in Measure

(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—President Wilson pressed forward for repeal of the toll exemption clause of the Panama canal act in conference today with congressmen. He talked with Senator Kern, majority leader, who said afterward that the senate first would dispose of arbitration treaties and probably take up the toll question immediately thereafter. He thought it probable the senate would act on the repeal before the house.

Although Mr. Kern voted for the exemption, he said today the president had told him of various interesting phases of the question which were not before the senate when the act was passed. He added he was not prepared to announce his position.
Friends of the administration claim he will be among the administration supporters.

His leaders, it was announced today, desire some announcement or message to congress by the president before reversing themselves on the toll question so as to be able to make clear to their constituents that international circumstances had arisen requiring a change.
Representative Underwood, it is understood, while still believing in the toll exemption, will not organize any opposition to the president.

ENGINEER DISCUSSES

PROPOSED CITY PLAZA
Plans to Provide for a Concrete Structure Covering Viaducts

C. E. Kaufmann, draughting engineer in the city construction department, delivered a lecture Wednesday evening at a meeting on the plaza which he proposed for Atlanta to build over the railroad tracks from Forsyth street to Washington street.

His plans in a general way provide for a concrete structure on a level with the present viaducts over the railroad tracks, extending across the tracks on both sides, and for a modern skyscraper in place of the present union passenger station. The estimated cost of construction is \$1,200,000.

The plaza on the north is divided into two blocks, one 200 feet wide and one 100 feet wide, and a driveway along the north side of the plaza twenty feet wide with a ten-foot sidewalk, and similar to the other blocks along the south side. The street crossings are at the center of the width of the cross streets. In the middle of the plaza running east and west is a wide park area, to be planted with grass and shrubs and flowers and to be intersected with gravel walks and adorned with fountains.

The length of the plaza is 1,852 feet, the area 250,100 square feet exclusive of the building on the Union depot site. No less than 2,129 linear feet of absolutely new frontage will be the most valuable in the whole city for all time.

Following Mr. Kaufmann's lecture several prominent Atlanta business men spoke briefly in favor of the plan, among them being John W. Grant, William L. Moore, H. H. Williamson, president of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Captain H. M. Clayton, Mr. Buckley is the architect who completed the plan. Mr. Clayton drew the first plan. Mr. Clayton is chief of the city construction department.

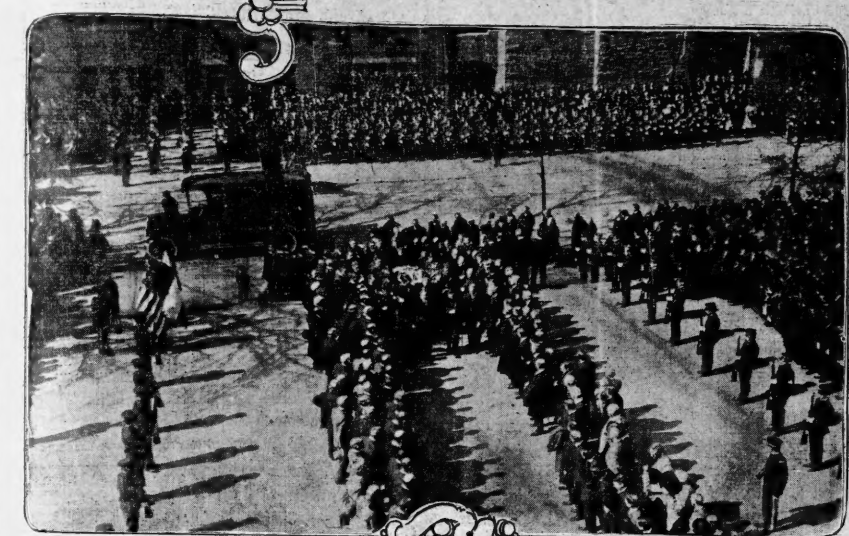

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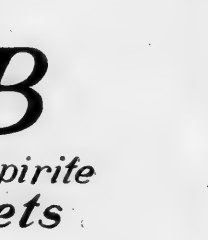

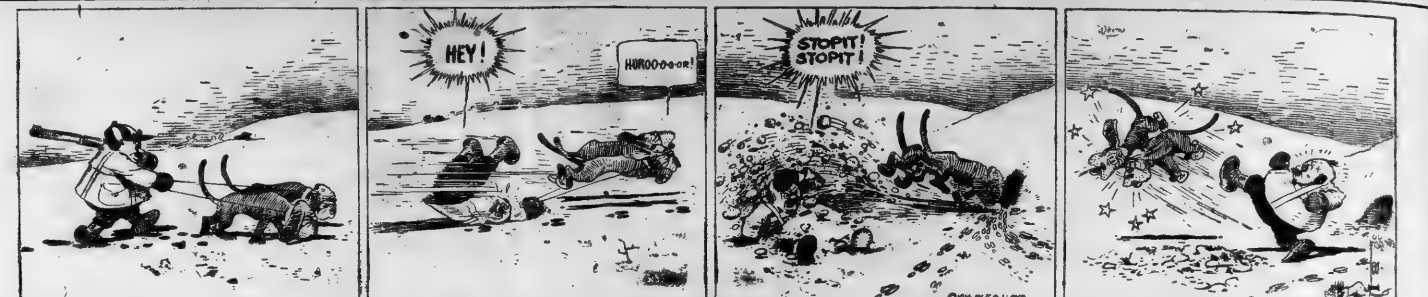
