SESSON FOR STATE TRIAL

Dr. H. F. Harris Admits, When Questioned, That He Examined Under Microscope Strands of Hair Found on Lathe in Metal Room and Compared Them With Mary Phagan's Hair and That They Were Entirely Different in Texture and Could Not Be the Same

FINDING OF HAIR ONE OF LINKS IN CHAIN FIXING THE CRIME ON THE SECOND FLOOR

Defense Will Probably Make Dr. Harris' Statement the Basis for an Extraordinary Motion for a New Trial for Frank—Dr. Harris Says He Reported Result of His Examination to the Solicitor and Thought No More About It. Still Has Specimens of Hair

A new, and what is considered a most important feature of the Frank case, and one upon which the defense, it is believed, will bring an extraordinary motion for a new trial for the condemned man, was developed Friday by The Journal.

The strands of hair found on the lathe handle in the metal room on the second floor of the National Patent factory, which formed one of the state's links to fix the crime as having been committed on the second floor when Leo M. Frank had his office, was not the hair of little Mary Phagan.

Dr. Harris examined both samples of hair under the microscope. He says that the hair taken from the lathe handle was not of the same shade, texture or shape as that taken from Mrs. Phagan's head.

Reported Facts to Solicitor

Dr. Harris says that he reported this fact to the solicitor and the latter told him that he would not see the necessity of going any further with the hair theory.

"I never considered the matter a very material one, and dismissed it from my mind," said Dr. Harris. "And I don't recall that I was asked about the girl's hair while I was upon the witness stand. The only hair, with the exception of the two microscopic sections, were turned back to the solicitor. I have the microscopic sections in my laboratory."

"There was no purpose on my part to conceal the fact that the hair found on the lathe handle was not that of Mary Phagan, and I do not think any one else had such a purpose. When I informed the solicitor that the two specimens of hair were not the same he simply remarked that he would let the matter end there."

Significance of Statement

The defense will, it is said, lay particular stress upon the hair finding in its extraordinary motion for a new trial, alleging that it is newly discovered evidence of a most vital character. In this motion the defense will, it is understood, contend that the testimony introduced by the state relative to the finding of hair on the lathe on the second floor is untrue, and that the evidence of the doctor is true, and that the jury to believe that the murder was committed on the second floor and that this impression resulted in Frank being connected with the crime.

FRANK MOTION SATURDAY. At a late hour Friday afternoon the motion for a rehearing by the supreme court of the Leo M. Frank case had not been filed.

The motion is said to be still incomplete, but it is expected that it will be filed late Friday afternoon that the motion will reach the clerk of the supreme court during the day Saturday.

While the motion will be filed just as soon as it is completed by Attorney Luther & Rosser and Reuben E. Arnold, it is expected that the present program has less than ten days to serve and it will allow this time to expire before the county commissioners act and they will be without authority.

No meeting of the board has been called by Chairman Tull C. Waters, and while the members of the commission have been discussing the convict situation before the present program has yet been agreed upon, it is said.

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MAIL TRAIN BANDITS MAKE CLEAN GET AWAY

Over \$40,000 Obtained on a Queen and Crescent Train Near Birmingham

(By Associated Press.) BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 20.—Definite information as to the amount of money obtained last night by three masked robbers who held up, near here, Queen and Crescent passenger train No. 1, bound from Cincinnati to New Orleans, was lacking today. Estimates based on information available indicated that the loss was more than \$40,000.

Those with bloodstains set out early today to trace the robbers, but had difficulty in following their trail. It was reported today that an automobile was seen near the scene of the robbery shortly before it occurred, and it is thought that robbers may have escaped in it. F. C. Powell, vice president of the Queen and Crescent, is aiding in the search.

Says Husband Worked Her Like a Slave and Scolded Her Severely

Charging her husband, John P. Spake, so abused her he worked her like a slave, Mrs. Spake today filed a divorce suit in superior court of Fulton county Friday for divorce.

Mrs. Spake alleges that despite the fact that she owns a productive farm of 175 acres near Gaffney, and has an interest in an entire block of stores near the center of the little city, her husband forced her to work like a slave, cooking three meals a day for the force of laborers on her plantation.

She was married in 1897, she sets out, and in 1903 her husband, who would never work himself, commenced to abuse her. His acts of cruelty, she alleges, culminated in 1907, when he arose from the breakfast table one morning and proffered to pour a pot of scalding water over her head and face.

The pain was so terrible she was rendered unconscious, she says, and when she came to her senses she was in a hospital in Atlanta. She has remained here ever since that date, she says. Besides a divorce Mrs. Spake asks for the custody of their one child, Brunson, a boy, fifteen years old.

LEAVING PACKAGES ON MAIL BOXES BAD HABIT

Postmaster Issues Warning That Mail Left on the Outside Is Not Safe

Postmaster William Jones on Friday issued a warning to patrons of the postoffice against the habit some of them have of placing packages on top of mail boxes.

The department is not responsible for packages so placed, and when they are lost or stolen it is impossible to trace them.

Thursday night a lot of packages were placed on top of a mail box and were ruined by the rain that fell during the night.

In many cases porters and other employees are instructed by business concerns to take packages to the postoffice, but to save the extra trouble they deposit them on the top of the nearest mail box if the package happens to be too large to put inside.

SLEUTH GOES TO ATHENS SEEKING STOLEN GOODS

Tip on Location of Property Given by One of Three Alleged Shoplifters

City Detective Butler left for Athens Friday in search of loot said to have been stolen from Atlanta department stores by an alleged gang of women shoplifters who were bound over to the state courts Thursday by Recorder Broyles.

While more than \$1,000 worth of goods found in the homes of some of the women has been recovered, detectives have information that more valuable ones to be found in Athens. Mrs. C. S. James, of 505 Woodward avenue, who is alleged to have made a confession, admitting she had made a cache that others had been shoplifting, is said to have informed the sleuths that additional loot is to be found in Athens. Because she has been assisting the detectives her bond has been reduced from \$3,000 to \$100, and Friday she produced the required bond and was released. Selecting Eggs for Hatching

PEOPLE as a rule pay little attention to the kind of eggs they set. A loss that runs into millions of dollars in the United States is caused every year by people not paying enough attention to this one important detail. People who set thousands of large incubators on a large scale, and who have had much experience in this respect regard the quality of their eggs to look after carefully. They know that usually do a great deal of business and that they had this experience can save themselves a lot of trouble and money by the experience of others in this respect. Furthermore, people who are selling eggs for hatching at very low prices, and who mean to be particular about selecting the best shaped eggs for hatching purposes.

To secure and too high to pay attention to these little details and to neglect the conditions that are necessary to produce a healthy chick, and if this simple thing alone is looked after it will mean the saving of thousands of dollars to the United States and to other countries that are now wasted or thrown away.

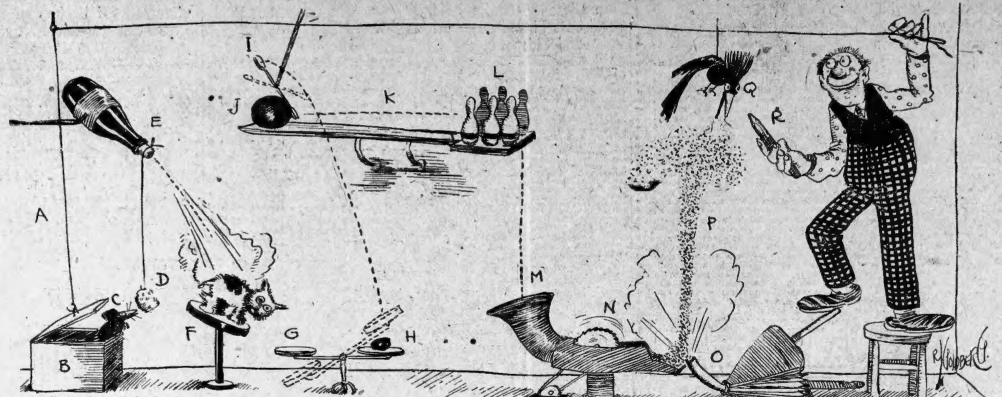
