Mr. Felder Makes Positive Announcement Today - Mr. Hardwick Expected to Enter Race in Next Few Days

Attorney General Thomas S. Felder is a candidate in the August primary for the unexpired term of the late Senator A. O. Bacon. The attorney general Friday afternoon authorized his friends in Macon to make a positive announcement to this effect.

It is also known that Congressman Thomas W. Hardwick will also be a candidate for the unexpired senatorial term. His friends have predicted for days that he would run, and although he has made no public announcement of his plans he has written declaration that he would not stand for reelection as congressman from the Tenth district.

There is a strong likelihood that Governor Slaton also will enter this race. His friends expected the governor that early next week the governor will give out a statement in which he will say whether he will accept re-election as governor.

In the event that Governor Slaton does not accept re-election, he will be a candidate. Colonel West has been suggested as a possible candidate. It is believed by some that he will be a candidate.

### MEXICO HASN'T A THING ON US

### CONSPIRACY OF LITTLE SORT, IS CHARGE



Woman Asserts Husband Was Convicted on "Deep-Seated, Insistent Demand" for Murder of Mary Phagan - Solicitor Dorsey Charged With Suppressing Evidence That Would Have Caused Doubt of Frank's Guilt

Quoting the item of Becker, the New York police lieutenant, who has just been granted a new trial, Mrs. Leo St. Frank, wife of the man condemned to die for the murder of Mary Phagan, issued a signed statement to the public Friday morning.

"I should like to say that the people of Georgia are less willing to accord fair play than are the people of New York. Or what the people of this state count themselves to be on a parity with the methods of the 'Yankees'?"

Mrs. Frank refers to "the deep-seated, insistent demand" that a victim be offered "if not compelled to call attention to the anomaly, displayed by the prosecuting officer," says she, declaring that his motive in the matter was to "keep the public from seeing the truth." She charges that the "Yankees" were "more disposed toward principles of justice than the people of Georgia."

Attorney Says White Man Did Not Dictate Notes Found by Girl's Body

Henry A. Alexander, attorney-at-law in Atlanta, has published and is circulating a pamphlet based on the notes found beside the dead body of Mary Phagan in the National Penitentiary last April in which he argues that the notes were not dictated by a white man, James Conley, formerly a sweeper employed in the penitentiary, but that they were written at the dictation of Leo W. Frank, who has been convicted of the murder and is now in the Tower under sentence of death. Mr. Alexander's theory controverts that of the attorney general.

In the pamphlet Mr. Alexander prints a signed statement, reproduced by abstracting both of the notes and a third white man, Conley himself, who admitted he could write and did write the notes; prints the uncorrected version of each note, and then prints a corrected interpretation by himself of each note, "for the first time, what are believed to be correct and complete readings," says Mr. Alexander.

"The two notes are obviously the most important pieces of evidence in the case, and a careful study of them is indispensable in reaching a correct conclusion," says Mr. Alexander.

CONFERENCE IS HELD ON CITY MONEY SHEET

Aldermen's Demands Not All Granted, and Counter Proposition Is Submitted

The four aldermen who are looking up the finance sheet Friday morning submitted to the finance committee a definite statement of the changes they want made to the sheet. Take \$5,000 from the \$75,000 appropriation for ordinary street work, strike the \$1,200 to employ a boiler and elevator inspector; strike the \$1,000 for chassis right-of-way for boulevard over Front street lower; strike the \$1,000 to widen Belmont avenue; take \$5,000 from the \$15,000 appropriation for hospital repairs; take \$5,000 from the appropriation to pay interest on bonds; and add \$10,000 to the estimate of the year.

GABINET CALLS ON ALEXANDER'S PAMPHLET HUERTA TO ANSWER MEXICAN OUTRAGES

Vegara Hanging Main Topic, Believed Benton Indiscreet Calling on Villa With Whom He Was Unfriendly

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—That the American government regards the hanging of Gen. Vega, an American citizen near Hidalgo, Mexico, as a subject for reparation by the Huerta government, became known after today's cabinet meeting.

The cabinet discussed practically nothing else but Mexican affairs, dispatches being read from Consul Lecher, saying General Villa would give permission for a complete medical examination of the body of William B. Benton, British subject at Chihuahua.

While the Benton incident was discussed in great detail, members of the cabinet were particularly concerned over the hanging of Vega. "This act, they believed, had shocked the American people and should not go unpunished. Steps will be taken to impress the Huerta government of the feeling of the United States in the matter, particularly after repeated contracts had been given by the federalists that Vega would not be hanged."

So far as it concerned the cabinet was not inclined to condemn the killing of Benton, but in discussing responsibility for "the act some members were inclined to think Benton was at least indirectly in going into the camp of a military commander, and entering into an agreement with him.

Final judgment was not reached by the cabinet as to the merits of the Benton case, but it was apparent that vigorous steps to procure the body for its widow would be continued.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—Former President Fatt took luncheon at the White House today with President Wilson.

Chinese Americans Anxious to Cast Votes in Chicago

CHICAGO, Feb. 27.—The Chinese-American club of Chicago has been incorporated with the object of asserting the rights of Chinese who are born in America of denaturalized parents. More than 400 members of the organization, it is said, will go to the polls here March 17 and demand that they be listed as electors.

"If the Chinese are challenged the courts will be appealed to. We will cite a decision of the supreme court of the United States in which it is declared that a Chinese is entitled to citizenship when he is born of denaturalized parents," asserted Charles F. Hill, attorney for the club.

IMMIGRATION BILL TO BE CONSIDERED

Literacy Provision Favored by Majority May Be Carried, Italians Protest

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27.—The senate immigration committee planned today to complete its consideration of the Burnett bill as it passed the house, next week and to report it to the senate.

Though the committee has not voted definitely on the question of retaining the literacy provision in the bill, the majority favor it and the formal vote on the provision is expected to carry.

The committee has considered the Italian government's protest against the provision directing United States consular officers and masters to board immigrant ships at foreign ports. Members of the committee hold, however, that such a provision does not constitute an invasion of the rights of any foreign nation.

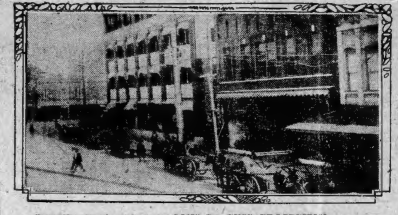

No other ball room dance has as many figures as the tango. Various experts disagree as to the exact number, but I consider fifty an excessive number. Some instructors assert that there are seventy-five, while one recently informed me that there are more than 100 possible combinations of tango figures.

For some unaccountable reason, there is a comparatively "stagnant" attitude in vogue, either in Europe or America. This makes it almost impossible for partners to practice their figures together, unless the lady chooses to be a superlatively good dancer, with a quick perception and responsiveness to the slightest indicated outline of the man.

Before one can hope to make headway with the tango it is compulsory first to gain suppleness of muscles and limbs, and a fair amount of deftness in balancing. Ability to recall steps in a rapid and graceful position, or series of positions, is another requisite. Otherwise, attempts at the tango are not more than attempts.

Tangoing is one of the best health developers I know of, being among the most strenuous because of the many so-called "open" positions of the partners engaged in its execution. It requires a quality of skill that comes only when muscles are responsive, enduring and strong.

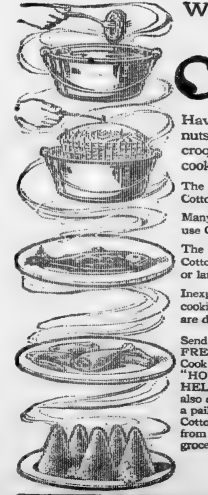

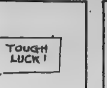

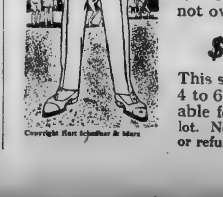
