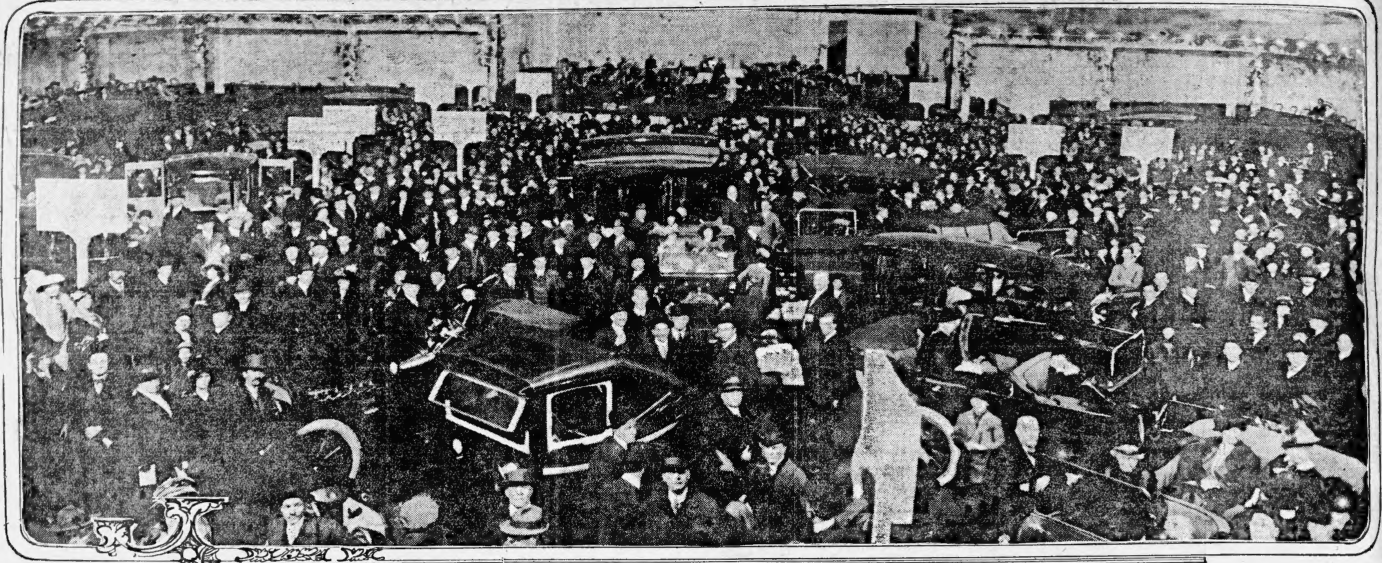

Has Always Been Democrat, Doesn't Know He's Free, and Isn't Well

ATLANTA PEACE JUBILEE WILMER MOORE'S IDEA

Monuments to Walker and McPherson Might Be Unveiled at Celebration in 1914

Suggestions for a great peace jubilee meeting to be held in Atlanta on July 22, 1914, were advanced by President Wilmer L. Moore, of the Atlanta chamber of commerce, at a meeting of the directors Wednesday evening.

Mr. Moore proposes the peace jubilee as a definite and conclusive means of demonstrating to the world that the north and the south have buried their differences and that no sectional feeling now exists as a result of the terrific struggle of the sixties.

It is Mr. Moore's idea that the federal government will advance sufficient funds to erect a handsome joint memorial monument in Atlanta to General Walker, of the Confederacy, and General McPherson, of the union army, both of whom fell in the battle of Atlanta. It is proposed by Mr. Moore that this monument be unveiled during the peace jubilee.

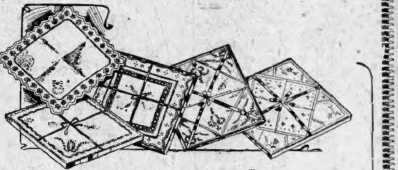

LEGAL BATTLE WAGED OVER FATHER'S ESTATE

Sanford Collier Charges Brothers Took Advantage of Him in Disposing of Property

Trial of the sensational suit of Sanford Collier against his brothers, John W. and George W. Collier, executors of the estate of a father, Wesley G. Collier, was commenced before a jury in Judge W. D. Ellis' division of the superior court Thursday morning.

The suit was filed several years ago and a demurrer to it was sustained by a judge of the superior court. This judgment was reversed by the supreme court with the result that the original suit is now being tried before a jury.

Sanford Collier charges in the suit that his two brothers, deceiving him as to land values, took advantage of him at a time when he was practically penniless as the result of dissipation and a business failure, and bought for themselves interests in the estate for \$10,000 only \$5,000 of which was in cash.

At the time, 1907, he says he was completely ignorant of the value of the land belonging to the estate, \$50 acres between Brookwood and Peachtree creek, and that he trusted the executors because they were his brothers.

Before making the sale he says he went to his brothers and tried to borrow money, telling them that he had "broke," and they refused to let him have the offer to purchase his interest in the estate.

At the time he said out, he alleges, a small part of the property had already been sold for \$60,000, but his brothers kept him in ignorance of this fact, he says.

Later, when his mother died, he went to the executors and asked about his share from her estate, and they told him he had also sold that interest to them. He says that the fact that his share was also being disposed of by the sale.

A short time later, he says, his brothers sold the remainder of the property for \$20,000, and he asked the executors to award him a full \$50,000 for his tenth interest in the estate.

Sanford Collier is represented by Attorney P. H. Brewster, and his brothers, John W. and George W. Collier, are represented by Attorney C. T. Landon and L. C. Hopkins, representing the defendant.

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TECHNICALLY TO GIVE LAMER A SECOND TRIAL

Word "Smothered" Instead of "Strangled" May Save Alleged Child-Slayer

Due to a legal technicality, W. C. Lanier, a young Waycross man convicted of murdering his own infant an hour after its birth, will have a new trial. The decision in this case was handed down by the state supreme court Thursday morning.

The lower court is reversed because Judge T. A. Parker, of the Waycross circuit, in his charge to the jury instructed that if the defendant or his wife (the wife being under a joint imprecation with her husband for the same crime) "smothered" the child they would be authorized to convict him of murder.

The point made by the defense and sustained by the supreme court is that the bill of indictment did not include anything about "smothering," that it charged the baby was killed by "choking, strangling, and by beating and striking."

Lanier was convicted of murder with a recommendation to mercy which carried with it the life penalty. His wife, Mrs. Lanier, is yet to be tried. The state contends that the baby was an illegitimate child, that Lanier had and that its parents conspired to get rid of it by strangling and beating it to death.

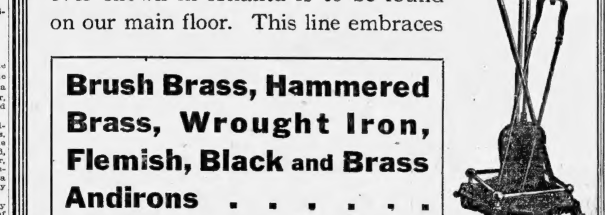

Commission Government Advocates Urge Running Municipality Like Dept. Store

TORONTO, Nov. 12.—The "city manager plan" of the municipal government was explained and heartily indorsed at the nineteenth annual meeting of the National Municipal League today by the special committee appointed two and a half years ago at the Richmond meeting to study the problem of commission government and its development.

Commission government at present costs more than \$200,000 annually to 500 cities and towns. The supporters of the plan are divided as to whether commissioners should be elected for specific terms, as in Lynn, Mass., or for a general ticket with power to divide the departments among themselves at their discretion, as in Galveston and Des Moines. The majority of the commission, however, is of the opinion that the plan was as good as that offered by the plan of electing a commission, purely representative and legislative in function, and that the municipality should only part time to municipal work and receive nominal salaries. The plan leaves the chief executive work to a city manager hired by the commission from anywhere in the country and holding office at its pleasure. This manager appoints and controls the remaining city employees, subject to adequate civil service provisions.

SUMMER FIRST TO TRY IT. The plan was first adopted by the legislature of South Carolina for the city of Beaufort and was in effect there on the first of the present year since then it has been adopted by Hickory and Meriden, N. C.; Dayton and Springfield, Ohio; La Grande, Ore.; Fort Erie, Pa.; and Memphis, Tenn.

The advantages of the plan were pointed out by single-headed administrative establishments instead of the five separate administrative establishments now in use. Moreover, this administrative unit makes for harmony between municipalities and prevents since all are subject to a common law.

"The city manager plan permits experience in administration at the very best, where it is most valuable, namely, at the head of the city government."

"It permits comparative permanency in the office, and it permits the city manager to be a resident of the city at the time of his appointment, and the experienced man can be summoned at advanced salary from other cities."

NO ONE-MAN POWER. "While giving a single-headed administration, it abolishes the one-man government in the old mayor and council plan. The manager has no independence and the city need not be responsible for personal whims or prejudices, since he is subject to the commission or even discharge by the commission. Likewise, in the commission system, the individual whims or prejudices are safely safeguarded and the commission has the combined judgment of the whole commission and not the whims of a single authority in the municipal government and a single voter member of the commission."

"It abolishes all attempts to choose administrators by the people, which is a desirable feature."

"It leaves the city of responsibility unmistakably clear, avoiding the confusion of the one-man government, and the responsibility of the individual commissioners and that of the commission as a whole."

"It provides basis for better discipline and harmony, inasmuch as the city manager administers, not by order with the commission, but in their capacity as department heads, or the mayor with the council in the mayor and council plan."

"It is better adapted for large cities than the one-man government. In many small cities, by providing the services of one man, well-paid instead of five or three paid commissioners, it makes possible a saving in salaries and overhead expense."

"It creates complete responsibility in the commission, which should be in charge of the city government, and the service offers opportunities for high advancement, without interruption of their careers."

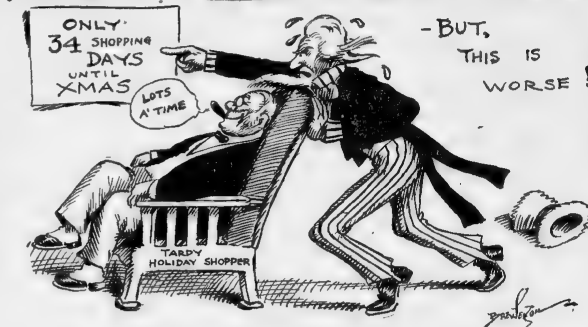

Release Clause To Be Changed

Minor Mugsak Talk Reforms at Columbus Meeting - New Drafting Method, Also

(By Associated Press.)
COLUMBUS, O., Nov. 12--Five committees were announced by President Sexton, of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, during Wednesday's session. One committee was assigned the problem of devising a way whereby a uniform system of contracts can be prepared for players of the five different classes of leagues affiliated with the organization.

In a communication to the convention the national commission made the suggestion of uniformity. The greatest obstacle now apparent, baseball men say, is the possible insertion of a clause requiring a player to be given notice of release ten days prior to that time the release can be made effective. It is understood that Class A leagues are willing to work under this plan, but those in Class B, C and D do not favor the idea of having to carry and pay a useless player for ten days.

REFORM IN DRAFTING RULES.
President Sexton's first committee, the league, started a movement for a reform in the system of drafting players and was supported in fighting against the practice of major league clubs in drafting a large number of players and then making cancellations of the drafts. It was voted that there shall be no such procedure by national association clubs.

Committees will commence reporting tomorrow morning and it is said the business of the convention will be completed during the day.

SECRETARY FARRER READ TO THE CONVENTION Wednesday the list of requests from the players' fraternity. No action was taken on contracts to formulate a code of procedure to be submitted to the convention for ratification. No objection will be made to sending a committee into conference with the national commission and representative players.

GARRY HEHRMANN MAKES SPEECH.
Garry Hehrmann, chairman of the national commission, recommended that the baseball fraternity be represented by a committee of players at conference sessions rather than by persons not connected directly with the game as a player, and declared his own intention to attend the national association. Efforts of the commission to cause contracts to be prepared were pledged and it was contended that players, upon return reservation having been compensated for such privileges, will be held to the agreement.

COMMISSIONERS TO MEET AT COLUMBUS.
Commenting on the list of requests from the players' fraternity, no action was taken on contracts to formulate a code of procedure to be submitted to the convention for ratification. No objection will be made to sending a committee into conference with the national commission and representative players.

NASHVILLE, Nov. 12--We are going to get the convention for Nashville in 1914 or before, declared President W. O. Hirsch of the local baseball club as he boarded the train this morning to go to all the cities. Schwartz, Eugene Shannon, of the industrial bureau, and others, for the annual meeting of the National Association of Baseball Clubs, which meets in Columbus this week.

Nashville, through the industrial bureau, has been waiting an active campaign for the convention since last year, when it was held in Milwaukee, and everything points to a successful termination of their efforts at the present meeting.

It is a little bit early to predict stories about what will happen in baseball next year, but one of the pretty certain things is that Walter Johnson will pass the 1,500 mark in strikeouts--a feat he breaks in fact only three other men have fanned over 1,000 ball players in the length of time. These three are Ed Walsh, Nap Rucker and Christy Mathewson.

The Ed Walsh, the spiritual star of the White Sox, has been Johnson's closest rival for the title of the strike-out king of the majors. The Christian has completed 1,496 to take the white noise in the length since he has a contemporary of the illustrious Washingtonian. Walsh fanned only in seven games last season, but from 1907 to 1913 inclusive, he has been in forty-eight more battles than has the renowned Walter.

Christy Mathewson has fanned 1,327 men in the last seven seasons and Nap Rucker 1,122. Eddie Plank, Connie Mack's portender, almost reached the thousand mark in that time 997 of his adventures taking the strike-out count. Chief Bender claimed 861 victims, Howard Chandler 802, Jack Coombs 784, Maceo Balfour Central 767, Leon Ames 749, George Mullin 747, Harry Little 720, Ed Reulbach 693, and George White 681. He has been Johnson's closest rival for the title of the strike-out king of the majors.
