(By Associated Press.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 18.—Hoke Smith's speech before the Senate today was delivered this noon by Senator Hoke Smith, Georgia's representative in the United States Senate, which is in session in Washington. The senator addressed himself to the conservation of the nation's resources, and urged the consideration of problems pertaining to agriculture and rural life.

Smith's speech held the close attention of the delegates to the Senate and many of the statements on agriculture were greeted with applause. He first laid down the broad principles that govern the national policy on agriculture and declared that they have received very little consideration from the national government.

Smith's speech was the most stirring and eloquent ever delivered in the Senate on the subject of agriculture. He pointed out that there are 100 million acres of land in this country, and that only a small portion of it is being used for agriculture. He urged the passage of a bill that would provide for the conservation of the nation's resources, and the improvement of the rural life.

The court held that the railroad commission's order was valid, and that the railroads must comply with it.

The decision is a victory for the Georgia Travelers' Protective Association, which has been fighting the railroads for some time. With favorable climate and abundant soil, they have wisely, diligently, laboring and abundantly harvested. DOCTORS' SYMPOSIUM ON NEGRO ENDS IN TUMULT

Public Health Conference Thrown in Upbraod by Remarks of Colored Member

(By Associated Press.) LEXINGTON, Ky., Nov. 18.—The conference of public health officials, held in connection with the annual convention of the Southern Medical Association, was thrown into uproar Tuesday morning during a symposium on the negro by remarks of P. D. Robinson, a negro physician of Lexington, who attacked a defense of his race on charges that the negro is a disease carrier. Several physicians had addressed the meeting on the subject of disease-infected negro servants and the negro as a communicable disease to members of white families in whose homes they are employed. There was a difference of opinion among the speakers as to whether the condition was hereditary or not, and one speaker suggested the family physician should examine servants of the household at proper intervals and in this way spread of disease would be checked. The negro was declared to be a good infanlar and it was remarked that he usually contracted the same disease from which white persons suffer. "NEGRO GETS FLAME." Adding the privilege of the negro, Robinson said it was true the negro was an imitator and that the negro sometimes imitated the bad traits of the white man as well as the good traits. He declared his experience and observations led him to believe that the negro with good environments, who worked for white persons whose homes were clean and who otherwise were careful in observing theories of sanitation, usually made a decidedly improved citizen. Robinson was interrupted by demands from physicians in all parts of the assembly hall who wanted to know why the negro physician was given the privilege of the floor. After a brief, acrimonious discussion, Robinson's remarks were stopped by Governor Henry D. Hatfield, of West Virginia, himself a doctor of medicine, featured the foremost of the convention this morning. Dr. Facer Tombs, of Memphis, responded to the address by welcoming the negro physician to the assembly after which Dr. Frank A. Jones, of Memphis, president of the association, read his annual address. More than 1,000 physicians and surgeons from all sections of the United States are in attendance.

LEGAL FIGHT IS WAGED OVER MOTHER'S WILL

Daughters of Mrs. Emma G. Lee Go to Court to Settle Dispute

A bitter fight between three sisters over \$60,000 estate left by their mother, Mrs. Emma G. Lee, commenced before Judge George B. Bell in superior court Tuesday morning. The youngest of the sisters, Mrs. Annie Lee Lee Mink, 129 East North avenue, has filed a caveat to the will probated last July by her older sisters, Mrs. Maude Lee Thompson, 32 Houston street, and Mrs. Claude Lee Stamp, 28 Washington street. The will to which exception has been taken divides the estate, which consists principally of realty near Covington, where the Lee family was prominent many years, equally between the three sisters. COUNCIL PROVIDES FOR CITY PURCHASING AGENT

W. E. Chambers, Requisition Clerk, Is Expected to Get New Job

Council Monday afternoon passed an ordinance creating the position of city purchasing agent at a salary of \$1,500 per year, the position to be filled by the mayor, the comptroller and the finance committee chairman acting jointly.

It is generally understood that W. E. Chambers, requisition clerk in the comptroller's office, will get the job. An important part of his work under the present system of purchasing supplies is to obtain competitive bids and examine the samples—the same as if he were a regular purchasing agent—and he is considered well qualified for the new place. He is a brother of Alderman Chambers.

That the city needs a purchasing agent has been generally recognized by council members for years, and several efforts have been made to create the position, but for one reason or another they failed. The call for a purchasing agent was made simultaneously and is not expected to be renewed until the next year.

More than \$1,000,000 annually will be spent by the purchasing agent, and it is believed a competent man can save the city \$100,000 per year at the most conservative figure.

The next step is for the city to have a warehouse where large lots of supplies can be stored, so that the purchasing agent can buy in large quantities and deal out supplies—such as household provisions, gasoline and other various departments by requisition, charging the same to the respective departments. It is not probable steps will be taken to build a warehouse next year.

IVY PROPERTY OWNERS WANT THEIR MONEY BACK

John S. Candler Says Their Pleas Show "Very Poor Taste"

An effort to pass a resolution in council Monday afternoon regarding ivy street property owners' demand for the money donated by them for the improvement of ivy street in a resolution passed by council Monday afternoon, which was a long and bitter argument, in which Candler and others took a strong attitude against refunding the money.

The chairman of the street committee stated that the actual work on ivy street is about completed and that comparatively small amount will take care of the remainder of the work. The adjustment of claims and damages is not taken into consideration as a part of the legitimate expense incurred in repairing the street.

As the committee has about \$11,000 left of the money donated, some of the members of council thought the committee ought to "lay aside about \$5,000 to carry the balance of the work and that the remainder of the money should be returned to the ivy street owners who donated it.

Candler declared that some of the money ought to be returned until the street is repaired completely. He said that the ivy street had no right to even expect that it should be given back.

The matter was referred again to the street committee.

ROADS MUST PULL MILEAGE ON TRAINS FOR GEORGIA TRIPS

(Continued From Page 1.)

ation, which had delayed action on the traveling men's petition until after the routine legislation was disposed of, then took it up and after several hearings issued an order requiring the railroads under certain conditions to pull mileage on trains.

This order was to become effective on February 1, 1914. Before that date the railroads went before Judge Hill and obtained the injunction preventing the railroad commission from enforcing its order.

The decision handed down to the supreme court Tuesday was dissatisfied by Justice Beale, who takes substantially the same position as did Railroad Commissioners C. M. Under and Joseph W. Gray in their litigation on the railroad commission's order. These commissioners questioned the constitutionality of the order and also doubted the effectiveness in meeting the conditions desired by the traveling men.

DISSENTERS OF SUPREME COURT.

In part the headnotes of the supreme court's decision are as follows:

Under the provisions of the code of this state, the railroad commission had authority to pass an order providing that all railroads selling mileage or penny scrip books are hereby required, on and after February 1, 1914, to pull the same on the trains of the company selling the same, when presented by the holder for transportation between points wholly within the state of Georgia, except where passengers board trains in cities of 10,000 population or more, according to the United States census of 1910, in which places mileage or penny scrip shall be exchanged for tickets.

The statute and the order of the railroad commission passed thereunder, were not in violation of the fourteenth amendment of the constitution of the United States as being an unlawful interference with the liberty of contract, or the taking of property without due process of law.

"That a state, through its legislature, the railroad commission cannot fix a reasonable maximum rate for the sale of mileage or penny scrip books issued since the date of the order, the law is.

needed with agriculture and rural life. He said: "It has never furnished anything like adequate means of putting these profits in active use by the farming classes."

Experience has shown that the plan outlined in the bill now pending before the senate is the practical way to make the present expenditure of real service co-operative farm demonstrative work a thing of tested value. Those who have seen what has been accomplished under the direction of Dr. Knapp in the few localities which he could reach know its worth. It has been for years a part of the agriculture system of the prosperous countries of Europe. Agriculture in Denmark and Germany has been revolutionized by it. The cost of production greatly reduced, the profits to the farmers greatly increased, and the prosperity of these countries which have intelligently used the best conservation of the nation's resources. Senator Smith closed by urging the heartiest cooperation from the nation's congress in all those endeavors which better conditions of rural life and add to the preservation and development of our greatest national resource, agriculture.

It was evident when the National Conservation congress met today in its fifth annual convention that a sharp fight was contemplated on federal policies by those delegates who contended the Washington government is usurping the rights of the states to regulate their own possessions. It was reported the committee appointed to consider the water power problem had failed to agree and that the majority would recommend a revision of the government conservation procedure.

The states' rights advocates will meet strenuous opposition. This was apparent in the speech of Charles Lathrop Pack, retiring president of the organization, who declared the "senators' position."

They Lengthen Lives of Horses and Automobiles, Declares Federal Office

(By Associated Press.)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18.—Good roads in the future should be built on the zig-zag plan for the avoidance of hills and steep grades, the federal office of good roads announced today in declaring that the lives of horses and automobiles could be lengthened thereby and the cost of hauling reduced materially. Experts contend that "the longest was around often may be the shortest any road construction to build straight roads whenever they must breast heavy grades."

According to the testimony of farmers consulted, the bureau declares, "where a horse must be able to pull 4,000 pounds on a level road it would have difficulty in pulling 3,000 pounds up a steep hill. The size of the load therefore tends to be measured by the grade of the largest hill on the road to market."
