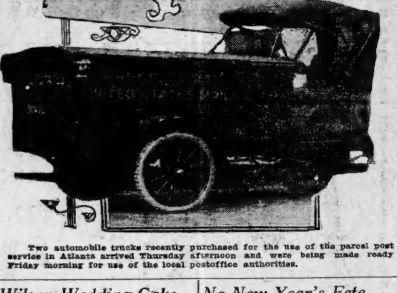

TEMPERANCE UNION WON'T FIGHT "EXTREME" STYLES

Other Organizations Covering Subject Fretty Well, They Say—Heated Discussion

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) BALTIMORE, Oct. 27.—The Georgia branch of the Woman's Christian Temperance union, in session here, late yesterday moved the question of women's dress on one of its special departments of the union and after a heated debate, passed a resolution to prevent the discussion of any topic "except those of vital interest to the work of the union."

It was said in explanation of the resolution to endorse the dress question that the subject is being discussed by nearly all religious and philanthropic organizations in the state, and that ground is being pretty well covered without the W. C. T. U. taking any part.

This action by the temperance union seemed as a great surprise to the ministers of the state, since they had counted on this body co-operating with them in the formation of a joint commission from the various churches and woman's organizations to fight against dance and "extreme" styles.

Mr. T. E. Patterson, of Griffin, state president, declared to the convention that he should strike at the root of the matter by petitioning congress to pass a law against the wearing of such dress for women. "The costume of the world are furthering the cause, and the woman are as much hindered against wearing it."

Mrs. Mary L. McLeod, a delegate from Atlanta, and vice president of the Georgia State Temperance association, hit the action of ministers in condemning new styles by declaring that she opposed any organization of men that should stand against modern dress, and saying that the matter was one that should be handled exclusively by the women.

Scabron Wright spoke last night to a large audience at the Woman's Christian Temperance union convention here. He said in part:

"The decision of supreme court in the recent case absolutely sustains our contention that every near-beer saloon and every club in Georgia can be immediately and finally destroyed by injunctive proceedings. The order of Matthews as amended by the supreme court in this instance was withdrawn by the utility false statement in most of our great daily papers the day before yesterday was a death blow to injunctive proceedings."

Mr. Mary L. McLeod this morning extended the greetings of the local fruitage association to the W. C. T. U. convention, which was accepted with thanks and appreciation.

LESSEES CAN RECOVER FOR SMOKE DAMAGES

Chairman Harwell of Atlanta Board Calls Attention to New York Decision

The effort to abate the smoke nuisance in this and other cities has been decidedly strengthened by a decision recently handed down by the New York supreme court, in which the court ruled that damages may be collected by leaseholders for injuries sustained through the smoke nuisance.

While the decision was handed down in New York, it will tend to influence similar decisions in other states, and R. M. Harwell, chairman of the Atlanta smoke board, said Friday that the New York decision was of much interest and importance.

"It will serve help us out here," said Mr. Harwell.

Commenting on the case one of the New York papers says:

"The owner of a lease on real property has today for the first time in the history of the New York supreme court recovered \$1,000 damages against a landlord for injuries sustained by noxious gas and smoke drifting into his apartments. The verdict was awarded Charles S. Beck, wealthy manufacturer, against the Belmont Realty company."

"The case is important because claims amounting to millions of dollars may be filed as a result of the outcome of the Beck case before Justice Marcus.

"The first effect will probably be that owners of apartment houses will raise their smoke stacks to such a height as to prevent coal gas from blowing down through the chimneys of their neighbors," says the Belmont Realty company.

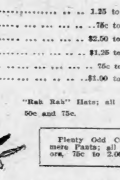
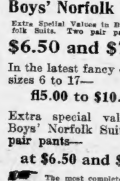

METHODISTS AGAINST ANY CHANGE IN CHURCH NAME

Vote to Continue as Southern Church—Oppose Carnegie's Offer to Vanderbilt

BY REV. EDWARD G. MACRAY, Special Dispatch to The Journal, ATLANTA, Ga., Nov. 21.—Bishop Warren A. Candler was a visitor today to the North Georgia conference and made a short address, dealing with the tendency of change in the church. He placed himself in opposition to the proposal to change the official title of the Methodist Episcopal church, south, by which the word south would be dropped and the name become Methodist Episcopal church in America. He also scored those who wished to alter the historic policy of Methodism, declaring that there was no new truth to be expounded and no better form of government than that which already obtained in Methodism.

A large class of young ministers were reported into full connection. These were: J. S. Sullivan, C. N. Hays, W. W. Watkins, J. W. Stephens, J. D. Pettit, L. H. Turner, J. L. Hagan, W. R. Morton, G. B. Barton, C. A. Swift, G. S. Praser and V. L. Hays. These men passed their examination successfully and at the close of an address on the duty of ministers they were ordained to the office of deacons.

The conference voted on the proposed change of name of the church and the result was 215 against the change and 43 for. This result was expected. The report of the board of education was read by Dr. C. O. Jones of Atlanta, and contained a strong endorsement of the bishops for refusing to accept the Carnegie gift from Andrew Carnegie to Vanderbilt university, and also condemned the trustees of the latter for their opposition to church control. A lively debate developed over the issue proposed for the election of delegates to the general conference which meets next year in Asheville, N. C., and Saturday's session will be devoted to that work. Fourteen delegates will be elected, seven clerical and seven lay.

The memorial to the general conference asking for a new law that will make headliners get back to the pasture after four consecutive years on a district, is in the hands of the committee and will be reported and voted on tomorrow.

Rev. Hugh Harpe, now connected with Wesley Memorial church, Atlanta, was received from the Methodist Episcopal church.

This afternoon the second vesper address will be delivered by Dr. E. R. Hawkins of Nashville, and tonight at the anniversary of the board of church extension Dr. W. F. McMurry, of Louisville, Ky., will speak.

SLATON MAKES ANSWER TO HARWELL'S CRITICISM

Replying to criticism by Chairman R. M. Harwell, of the city smoke commission, to the effect that various public schools permit violating the anti-smoke ordinance, and that it appears there is nothing left to do but make a case in police court, against Superintendent W. M. Slaton, the latter says: "There's nothing in the world I should like better than to be held before Judge Broyles and have the case take me to task personally for everything that is wrong with the Atlanta schools. I am sure it would result in just one thing, and that would be that the court would order that the city furnish the money to make the necessary improvements, so that many mistakes or conditions which may be termed as such can be abated."

In his statement Chairman Ethwell declares the schools have several times been notified that they must obey the anti-smoke ordinance, but that so far there seems to have been little if any effort to remedy conditions. Superintendent Slaton says he has conferred with W. W. Lotzspesch, inspector of schools, and the latter informed him at least 10,000 would be required to put the furnaces of the schools in condition to comply with the provisions of the anti-smoke ordinance. "I am in thorough sympathy with this ordinance," says Superintendent Slaton, "but without the necessary funds to purchase proper equipment we cannot meet its requirements. If the city would minimize the smoke, I am anxious for the schools to comply with this and all other city ordinances."

What Anne Rittenhouse Says

MRS. JOHN AITON AND MARIE TEMPERT START FASHION FOR BLACK VELVET EVENING GOWN.

NEW YORK—Little progress has been made in America with the fashion for putting into a skirt a lining that makes a sharp contrast. In Paris, the idea was well worked out.

I remember describing to you an afternoon gown of purple velvet which had an opening in front of skirt that showed a bright orange lining to match a rolling collar. Also in walking suits of dull blue drizette and corduroy there were skirt linings of dull red tulle, others of purple and gray and purple and black.

The sharp contrast of the white satin lining in a black velvet gown was only attempted for evening garments, but I saw many contrasts, such as a purple satin lining in a white velvet evening gown, and a shell pink lining in a white satin gown.

It was not necessary to put the skirt in this lining; a slash of six inches to the waist was made and there was a ruffle of white tulle or thin lace used to veil the ankle. As the front of the skirt was cut shorter than the back and the sides were rolled back and the hem raised up, there was no disagreeable display of the vivid colored lining.

Some of the dressmakers have attempted this idea over here, but the thing is rarely done and has not been received with ardent approval. There is no good reason for this because the American slashes her skirt higher and often than the French woman. In truth, no one is more astonished than the French at the reckless way in which the American woman shows her ankles in evening gowns.

No matter who the woman may be, better French or better American, she is pecked to slash any fashionable skirt for evening wear, because it has arrived at a narrowness that as soon as she walks she shows the points of the skirt which are so grossly exaggerated by some dressmakers who used only one width of narrow material for the lower skirt. This is not exaggeration. Examine some of the new models and you will see how thin it is. The selvages are brought toward the front and fall loosely over it. It is the back and not the front of the skirt which shows in walking. It is a disgrace to women for the material drags across the back of the legs. Not even attempting to conceal that shape.

A piece of this material lies upon the floor like a saucy girl, and is so squared off or cut to a point at the side, that the middle and is usually weighted down by a heavy tassel. It is so difficult to watch this jangling about like a fish on a hook when the wearer gets excited and walks rapidly.

Tassels, however, are such an important feature of our clothes this winter that the dressmakers never lose an opportunity to attach them wherever it is possible. 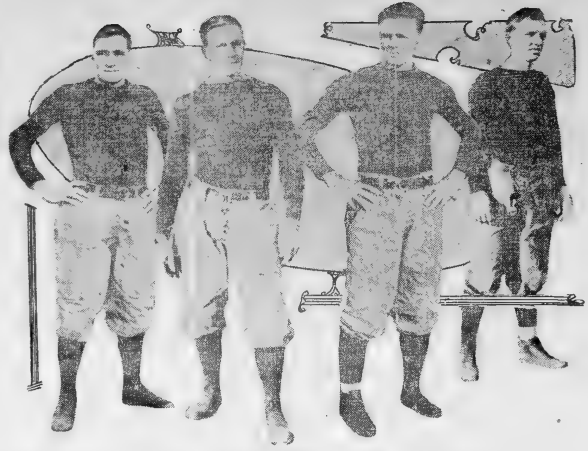
The one slogan now for all of Athens as well as the university is "On to Atlanta. Beat Auburn!"

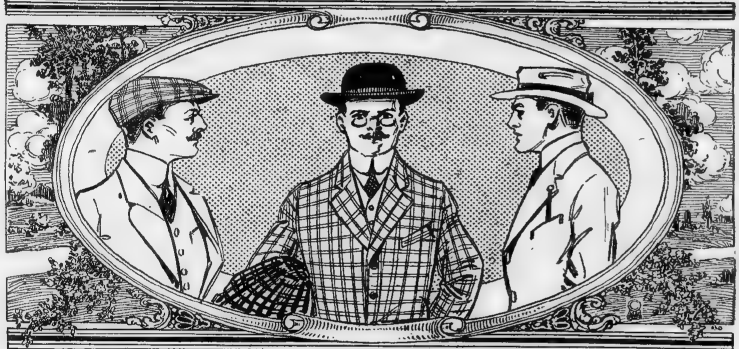

Amateur Forecaster Predicts Big Storms And Drup in Mercury

Atlanta's amateur meteorologist is out with another forecast. This time he predicts that within two or three days there will be severe weather disturbances throughout the United States, marked by snow in the north and wet and rain in the south. A cold wave will follow these storms, he says.

The amateur meteorologist has made many remarkable forecasts, frequently anticipating the United States weather bureau by several days. These forecasts have, in the majority of instances, turned out to have been correct. Following is the amateur meteorologist's latest forecast:

"A period of marked meteorological activity is now beginning in the United States and will extend over all sections during the next four days. The principal feature will be the remarkable storm development and movement, and the greatest activity will be shown November 22 and 23, when a storm of great energy will cross the southern states, attended by general precipitation of snow in the north and west and rain in the south.

"A cold wave will follow this storm about November 24 and November 25, and will extend over nearly the entire United States.
