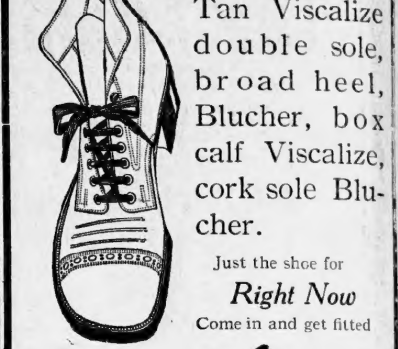

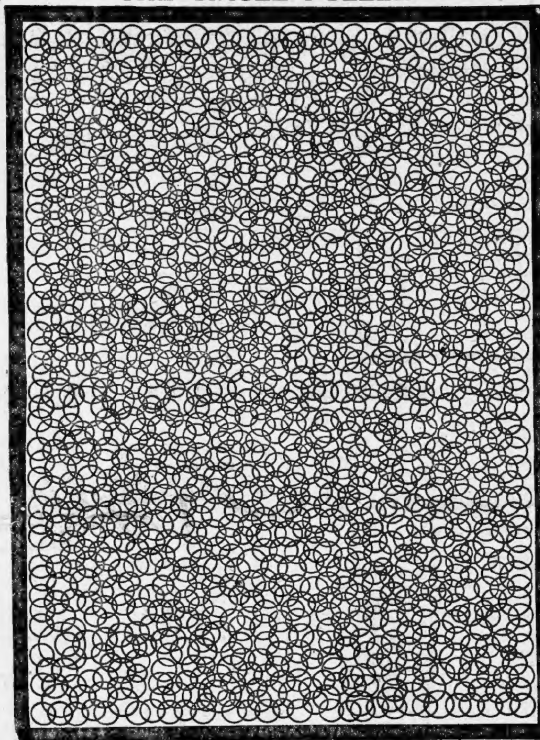

HIGH TREATMENT FOR THE CIRCUS GIRAFFES

CAN CHINESE CHILDREN ENTER LOCAL SCHOOLS?

Board of Education Turns Over Question to City Attorney for Decision

Are the children of a Chinese man and a white woman eligible for admission to the public schools of Atlanta? This is the question the board of education was called upon to decide Tuesday afternoon when Dr. A. M. Haight, pastor of St. Mark's church, appeared before the board to find out why the children of Joseph Jung, a Chinaman who married a Christian woman, have not been received into the schools.

Jung is a member of Dr. Haight's congregation. The minister wanted that he merely wished to see out whether or not the city would admit the children. He said that Jung had been trying for some time to secure admission to the schools for his children. A little girl about seven years old and a boy about nine years old, but were not received into the schools because they had not been successful.

"This man," said the minister, "is a taxpayer, and he wants his children educated. He is an Atlanta resident and he has married a white girl. His children are bright and pretty, and I think you could see them you might consider more readily the question of admission of them to the schools. But I am here merely for information. The board provided a question. Several board members immediately volunteered to know whether or not the city is legally compelled to receive the children into the schools, and whether or not if they are legally entitled to an education in the city system, they must be admitted to white schools or negro schools."

It was the understanding of the board that there is a law against admitting our mixed Chinese children to the schools, but whether or not this would apply to half-breed children was not determined. Dr. Haight said that he was certain that Jung would not consider the admission of his children to the negro schools, and called attention to the fact that any rule governing the education of half-breed children would necessarily have to take into consideration two classes of half-breeds, those of Chinese and white parents and those of Chinese and colored parents. The board solved the whole question for the time by deciding to turn the matter over to the city attorneys for a decision as to whether or not the children are entitled to admission to the schools, and if so whether they shall be received in white or colored schools.

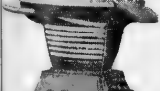

WOULD SHOW ADMIRAL ADDICTED TO DRUGS

At Trial of His Widow for His Murder, Evidence Is Introduced as to Habits

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Oct. 24.—Testimony to support the defense's contention that Rear Admiral Eaton was addicted to drugs, was given today at the trial of the widow, Mrs. Jennie M. Eaton.

Peter R. McNally, of Boston, told the court that in 1887 and 1888, when Eaton was a captain in command of the training ship Enterprise, he frequently appeared intoxicated, most noticeably to himself and stared vacantly, yet no signs of liquor could be noticed on his breath.

Judge George W. Kelley, of Rockland, friend and legal adviser of the Eaton family, testified concerning the affliction of Admiral Eaton and his wife who is accused of having poisoned him. The admiral once said to Judge Kelley: "I have a remarkable wife, who has been great help to me but she has one obsession, her daughter Jane."

Mrs. Eaton had expressed fondness for the admiral, although she did not always speak of him in affectionate terms. She told Judge Kelley that her husband was becoming insane from the use of drugs, but when the widow was having him arrested or committed to an insane hospital, she declared that she would not allow any one "to harm a hair of the admiral's head."

Judge Kelley had no personal knowledge that Admiral Eaton used drugs. Dr. Jacob W. Brown, formerly a Boston physician but now serving a jail sentence for illegal practices, testified that in 1910 he prescribed a preparation containing arsenic at the request of Admiral Eaton. The prescription called for three pills, each containing 1-100 of a grain of arsenic.

Later the admiral brought some of the pills to the witness, saying that a child had died from eating one of them. He said the admiral had never been intoxicated when he called on him.

Morris, a resident of this county at St. Charles, Thursday morning, by a dispatch from the war department at Washington that among the soldiers killed by lightning in Texas last Wednesday was his son, George C. Morris.

Another dispatch this morning disclosed that rifle and cancelled all arrangements for the reception of the body and its funeral here. Today's dispatch from the war department informed Mr. Morris that a mistake was made yesterday, and that the Georgia boy who was killed was not his son, George C. Morris.

News dispatches in Wednesday's paper relate that a column of the Sixth United States cavalry on the march between Galveston and Texas city had been struck by lightning and that three privates had been killed.

Mr. John L. Morris, of this county, read the dispatch and wired immediately to the war department, asking if the George Morris named in it was his son. The war department answered affirmatively, and preparations were begun here for the funeral.

GENERAL MORTGAGE FOR PENNSYLVANIA LINES

President Rea Says Such Is Being Contemplated to Finance Roads

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24.—In answer to inquiries by stockholders, President Rea, of the Pennsylvania railroad, today confirmed the report that the company is considering the creation of a general mortgage as a basis for the company's financing for many years to come.

"Under this mortgage it is contemplated to issue bonds in such amounts from time to time as may be required to provide necessary additions, betterments and improvements to its rail roads, equipment, property and facilities; the funds that may be necessary to meet maturing obligations, and for such other corporate purposes as may now or hereafter be duly authorized by law. The aggregating amount of bonds that may be issued will not at any time exceed the outstanding capital stock."

"When approved by the directors the whole question will be laid before the stockholders. The company will have a conference that requires immediate financing, but desires to announce the contemplated preparations for the necessary refunding and capital expenditures in 1914, 1915 and later years."

"\$1,000,000,000 General Mortgage" Not Improbable (By Associated Press.) NEW YORK, Oct. 24.—Bankers connected with the Pennsylvania Railroad company declined to discuss the proposed new financing by that system. Wall street has long known that Pennsylvania contemplated some readjustment of its outstanding securities and a \$1,000,000,000 general mortgage is not improbable.

Pennsylvania's authorized stock issue is \$600,000,000, of which \$491,000,000 has been paid up. The railroad's funded debt amounts to \$214,000,000, an offset of the Pennsylvania company, which operates all the lines west of Pittsburgh, but owns none in fee. \$110,000,000. Pennsylvania shares were especially weak today but failed to touch the low price of the early year.

### What Anne Rittenhouse Says

It looks very much as though the craze for the new dances will shortly revolutionize footwear. Ever since women combine pleasure, exercise, grace and social accomplishment in learning how to dance the different varieties of the new step, the Argentine tango, and the Brazilian maxixe, the change in shoes and slippers has been remarkable.

When heelless slippers first came into fashion in Paris, the American woman thought they were impossible, and, now, one year later, she wears them and demands that the shoes keep them.

In small towns where it is not easy to find a variety of fashionable shoes, women have made use of flat bath room slippers.

They have taken off the pompon, and substituted a flat bow or a tiny ornament, sewed crochets along each side and run these through with narrow satin ribbons to match the slipper; this they have creased over the instep three times, then wrapped it around the ankle and tied it at the heel. Not a bad idea!

The popular has the slipper without a heel, because, that fashionable women are relegating the tango French held slippers to formal afternoon wear. The really well dressed American woman does not wear them when she is out when walking; she leaves that to the extreme and to the woman who buys the last cheap fashions.

The woman with a well shaped foot wears lower heels than she has worn for years on a walking boot, and sometimes an entirely flat heel on a Bridget's pump.

It is not possible to dance the new dances well with a high-heeled slipper as every woman who dances knows full well by this time, therefore only the woman who does not and will not dance finds comfort in a slipper that she has copied from the ballet; it has square toes, a short vamp, an absence of heel, and ribbons that lace around the foot and the ankle to keep it in place.

So popular has this slipper become in Europe that the women who could not get it danced in their shoes, the one would see them in decorative satin slippers with short skirts, and then less white tennis shoes. After a while the men began adopting this form of footwear and after a while one was led to creep at seeing white canvas shoes (not dress shoes) with the flat sole, one cannot manage the ordinary pump in fancy dancing.

It looks as though the square-toed slipper will have this winter.

We are laughing at it now, but it is growing in favor every day. It is in keeping with the exceedingly comfortable clothes of the day. The low heels, the short skirts, the absence of unnecessary underwear, the loose shoulder, the broad back and the natural waist measurement are features of fashion which coincide with the flat shoes used slipper tied around the ankle.

**Shoes With Colored Tops.**

Fashion did not accept at first the introduction of colored tops, but today the gray and the bluish color is considered conservative. One can wear it in the morning with a coat frock and a fur coat. But it is considered proper to have dull kid vamps in the morning and patent leather ones in the afternoon.

Beyond this acceptance the well dressed woman does not go. She avoids the slippers with the exceedingly ornate scallops of gold medallions over the colored cloth if she wears a boot with a light cloth top she demands that the lines be clean cut and without ornament.

Although the extremists are wearing the half wear half shoe, which has the leather vamp that curves under the instep and is tied with the back of the shoe made of cloth, the fastidious woman has never taken it up and probably never will.

The revolution in shoes really lies in their shape, and not in their color, now are getting broader and heels flatter, and we are beginning to say: "what smart shoes" when a woman shows her feet this covered.

The doctors are having a say in this new fashion. They are opposed to it, just as they are opposed to the unbound skirt, instead of a corset. They are aware that both methods of dressing are called natural and primitive, but they are also aware that this race of women is countries removed from naturalism, and that our present physical constitution does not allow a heelless shoe and a corsetless waist.

Nature revenges herself when we try to coerce her. We have treated her to our desires and harassed her to our fashions, and she makes us suffer if we turn her loose.

It is designed to pull off the tournament within the next week or two, if possible, so that it may be concluded before winter weather sets in.

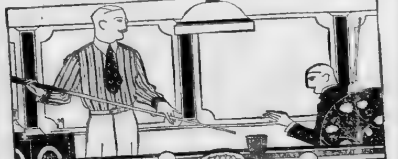
## Sewanee Takes Long Hard Trip

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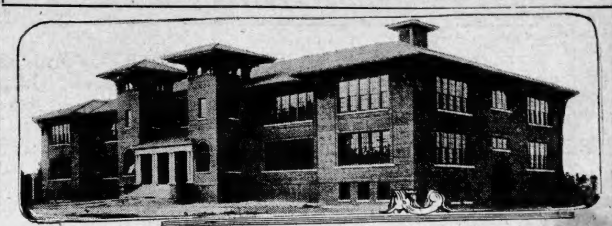
