WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—President Wilson indicated very clearly that while he is in sympathy with the purpose of the cotton futures tax, he regards the question as a foreign to the tariff bill, and is confident that this legislation has not been, and will not be, passed through the inability of the house and senate to agree as to the method of raising the cotton futures subject. The president feels that both the senate and house aim to accomplish the same object through the cotton futures amendment that have been proposed. 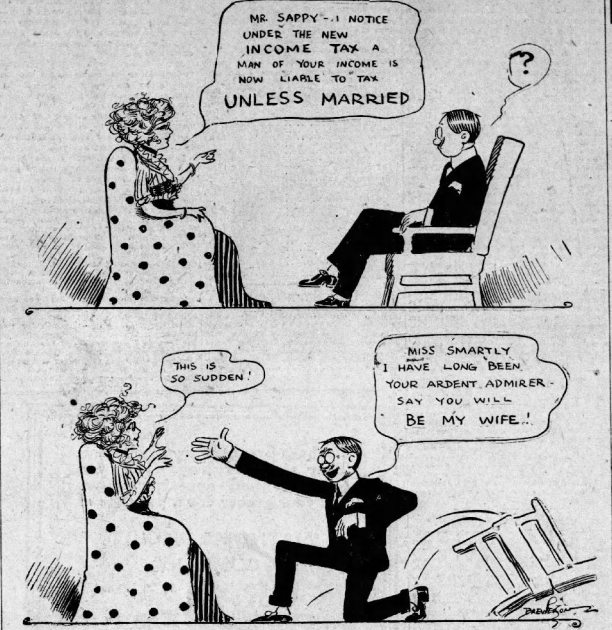

**NEW BRIGADIER GENERAL NATIVE GEORGIAN AND FORMER ATLANTIAN—CLASSMATE OF GEN. R. K. EVANS**

In the appointment last Thursday by the president of Colonel Bill Hoyle as a brigadier general of the United States army, Atlanta may take satisfaction because he once lived here. Georgia may feel proud because he was born at Canton, Cherokee county. Mrs. James W. Morrow, Sr. and William E. Hoyle, his sister, and one of his brothers, find reason for much pleasure. General Robert K. Evans, another native Georgian, and the celebrated classmate of the Gulf U. S. Army, in Atlanta, is gratified and the celebrated classmate of the West Point. Thomson Raps Braselton

Says Braselton is Talking About a Business Administration and Is Not Even a Registered Voter

To the People of Atlanta:

Up to this time, as a candidate for Alderman from the Fourth Ward, I have refrained from personalities with reference to my opponent, Mr. Amos W. Braselton.

It is not my intention to criticize him personally. But inasmuch as he saw fit to make the remark in this morning's Constitution that my supporters are the "ring politicians" and "petty politicians" or words to that effect, I feel justified in calling the public's attention to two facts.

First—Mr. Braselton has not paid his City taxes for 1912, there now being a Fi Fa against him in the City Marshal's office.

Second—His name is not on the registration list for the City Primary to be held tomorrow, September 30th. In other words, he cannot even vote in the Primary in which he is a candidate.

In view of these facts, isn't it rather poor taste for him to make disparaging remarks about the citizens who are supporting my candidacy?

Isn't it rather remarkable for Mr. Braselton to appeal for votes on the platform of a "business administration" when as a citizen and a business man his interest in the City Government is not sufficient to induce him to pay his City taxes?

Isn't it rather "nervy" for Mr. Braselton to ask for the votes of citizens who PAID for the privilege of voting, when he did not think enough of that privilege to pay himself?

Mr. Braselton advocates raising the pay of policemen—which is not a bad idea. But if other citizens refused to contribute to the support of the City Government, as he has done, here wouldn't be enough money in the City Treasury to pay their present salaries, or any other expenses of the City Government.

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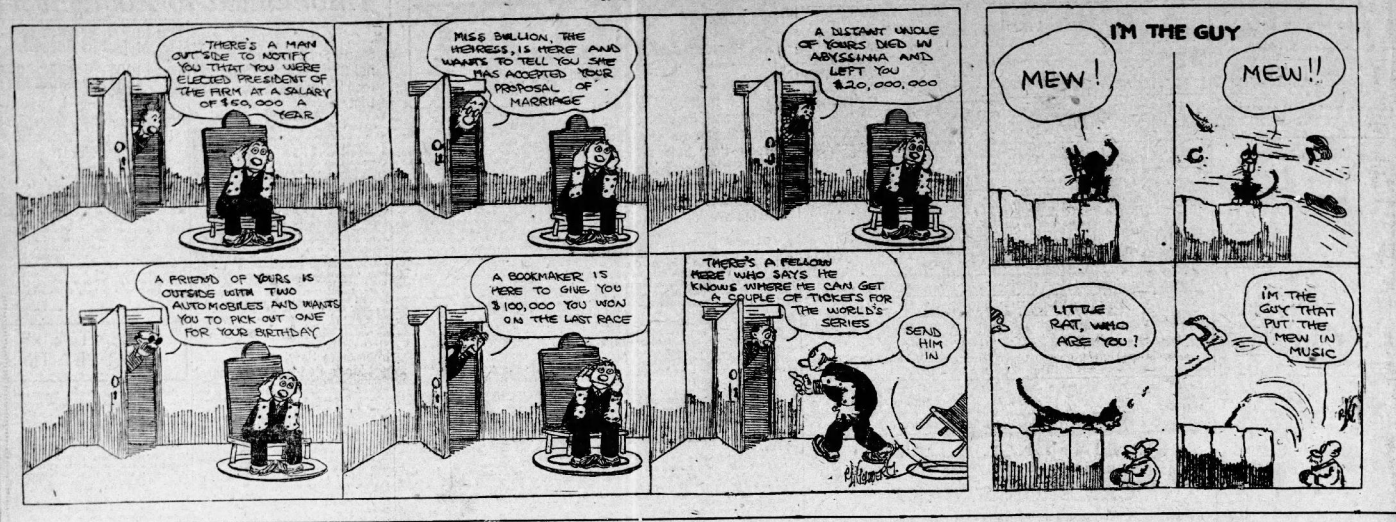
